# GEOMETRIC THETA-LIFTING FOR THE DUAL PAIR $\mathbb{S O}_{2 m}, \mathbb{S p}_{2 n}$

#### Abstract

Let $X$ be a smooth projective curve over an algebraically closed field of characteristic $>2$. Consider the dual pair $H=\mathrm{SO}_{2 m}, G=\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}$ over $X$ with $H$ split. Write Bun ${ }_{G}$ and $\operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ for the stacks of $G$-torsors and $H$-torsors on $X$. The theta-kernel Aut $G_{H} H$ on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ yields theta-lifting functors $F_{G}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ and $F_{H}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ between the corresponding derived categories. We describe the relation of these functors with Hecke operators.

In two particular cases these functors realize the geometric Langlands functoriality for the above pair (in the non ramified case). Namely, we show that for $n=m$ the functor $F_{G}: \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ commutes with Hecke operators with respect to the inclusion of the Langlands dual groups $\check{H} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1} \leftrightharpoons \breve{G}$. For $m=n+1$ we show that the functor $F_{H}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)$ commutes with Hecke operators with respect to the inclusion of the Langlands dual groups $\check{G} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+2} \leftrightharpoons \check{H}$.

In other cases the relation is more complicated and involves the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur. As a step of the proof, we establish the geometric theta-lifting for the dual pair $\mathrm{GL}_{m}, \mathrm{GL}_{n}$. Our global results are derived from the corresponding local ones, which provide a geometric analog of a theorem of Rallis.


Résumé. - Soit $X$ une courbe projective lisse sur un corps algébriquement clos de caracteristique $>2$. On considère la paire duale $H=\mathrm{SO}_{2 m}, G=\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}$ sur $X$ où $H$ est déployé. Notons Bun ${ }_{G}$ et $\mathrm{Bun}_{H}$ les champs de modules des $G$-torseurs et des $H$-torseurs sur $X$. Le faisceau thêta $\mathrm{Aut}_{G, H}$ sur $\operatorname{Bun}_{G} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ donne lieu aux foncteurs de thêta-lifting $F_{G}: \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ et $F_{H}$ : $\mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)$ entre les catégories dérivées correspondantes. On décrit la relation entre ces foncteurs et les opérateurs de Hecke.

Dans deux cas particuliers cela devient la fonctorialité de Langlands géométrique pour cette paire (cas partout non ramifié). À savoir, on montre que pour $n=m$ le foncteur $F_{G}: \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{G}\right)$ commute avec les opérateurs de Hecke par rapport à l'inclusion des groupes duaux de Langlands $\check{H} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1} \leftrightarrows \breve{G}$. Pour $m=n+1$ on montre que le foncteur $F_{H}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)$ commute avec les opérateurs de Hecke par rapport à l'inclusion des groupes duaux de Langlands $\check{G} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+2} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \check{H}$.

Dans d'autres cas la relation est plus complexe et fait intervenir le $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ d'Arthur. Comme une étape de la preuve, on établit le thêta-lifting géométrique pour la paire duale $\mathrm{GL}_{m}, \mathrm{GL}_{n}$. Nos résultats globaux sont déduits de résultats locaux correspondants, qui géométrisent un théorème de Rallis.

## 1. Introduction

1.1. - The Howe correspondence for dual reductive pairs is known to realize the Langlands functoriality in some particular cases (cf. [23], [1], [15]). In this paper, which is a continuation of [16], we develop a similar geometric theory for the dual reductive pairs $\left(\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}, \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}\right)$ and ( $\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}$ ). We consider only the everywhere unramified case.

Recall the classical construction of the theta-lifting operators. Let $X$ be a smooth projective geometrically connected curve over $k=\mathbb{F}_{q}$. Let $F=k(X), \mathbb{A}$ be the adèles ring of $X, \theta$ be the integer adèles. Let $G, H$ be split connected reductive groups over $\mathbb{F}_{q}$ that form a dual pair inside some symplectic group $\mathbb{S p}_{2 r}$. Assume that the metaplectic covering $\widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}_{2 r}(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \mathbb{S p}_{2 r}(\mathbb{A})$ splits over $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A})$. Let $S$ be the corresponding Weil representation of $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A})$. A choice of a theta-functional $\theta: S \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ yields a morphism of modules over the global non ramified Hecke algebras $\mathscr{H}_{G} \otimes \mathscr{H}_{H}$

S^{(G \times H)(\theta)} \rightarrow \operatorname{Funct}((G \times H)(F) \backslash(G \times H)(\mathbb{A}) /(G \times H)(\theta))
$$

sending $\phi$ to the function $(g, h) \mapsto \theta((g, h) \phi)$. The space $S^{(G \times H)(\theta)}$ has a distinguished non ramified vector, its image $\phi_{0}$ under the above map is the classical theta-function. Viewing $\phi_{0}$ as a kernel of integral operators, one gets the classical theta-lifting operators

F_{G}: \operatorname{Funct}(H(F) \backslash H(\mathbb{A}) / H(\theta)) \rightarrow \operatorname{Funct}(G(F) \backslash G(\mathbb{A}) / G(\theta))
$$

and

$$
F_{H}: \operatorname{Funct}(G(F) \backslash G(\mathbb{A}) / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \operatorname{Funct}(H(F) \backslash H(\mathbb{A}) / H(\Theta)) .
$$

For the dual pairs $\left(\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}, \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}\right)$ and $\left(\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}\right)$ these operators realize the Langlands functoriality between the corresponding automorphic representations (as we will see below, its precise formulation involves the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur). We establish a geometric analog of this phenomenon.

Recall that $S 工 \otimes_{x \in X}^{\prime} S_{x}$ is the restricted tensor product of local Weil representations of $G\left(F_{x}\right) \times H\left(F_{x}\right)$. Here $F_{x}$ denotes the completion of $F$ at $x \in X$. The above functoriality in the classical case is a consequence of a local result describing the space of invariants $S_{x}^{G\left(\theta_{x}\right) \times H\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)}$ as a module over the tensor product ${ }_{x} \mathscr{H}_{G} \otimes_{x} \mathscr{H}_{H}$ of local (non ramified) Hecke algebras. In the geomeric setting the main step is also to prove a local analog of this and then derive the global functoriality. The proof of this local result due to Rallis ([23]) does not geometrise in an obvious way, as it makes essential use of functions with infinite-dimensional support. Their geometric counterparts should be perverse sheaves, however the notion of a perverse sheaf with infinite-dimensional support is not known. We get around this difficulty using inductive systems of perverse sheaves rather then perverse sheaves themselves.

Let us underline the following phenomenon in the proof that we find striking. Let $G=\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}, H=\mathrm{SO}_{2 m}$. The Langlands dual groups are $\check{G} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1}$ and $\check{H} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}$ over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$. Write $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ for the category of finite-dimensional representations of $\check{G}$ over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}} \ell$, and similarly for $\check{H}$. There will be ind-schemes $Y_{H}, Y_{G}$ over $k$ and fully faithful functors $f_{H}: \operatorname{Rep}(\breve{H}) \rightarrow \mathrm{P}\left(Y_{H}\right)$ and $f_{G}: \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G}) \rightarrow P\left(Y_{G}\right)$ taking values in the categories of perverse sheaves (pure of weight zero) on $Y_{H}$ (resp., $Y_{G}$ ) with the following properties. Extend $f_{H}$ to a functor

f_{H}: \operatorname{Rep}\left(\check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right) \rightarrow \oplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} P\left(Y_{H}\right)[i] \subset \mathrm{D}\left(Y_{H}\right)
$$

as follows. If $V$ is a representation of $\check{H}$ and $I$ is the standard representation of $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ then $f_{H}\left(V \boxtimes\left(I^{\otimes i}\right)\right) \leftrightharpoons f_{H}(V)[i]$ is placed in perverse cohomological degree $-i$. For $n \geq m$ there will be an ind-proper map $\pi: Y_{G} \rightarrow Y_{H}$ such that the following diagram is 2-commutative

for some homomorphism $\kappa: \check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$. For $n=m$ the restriction of $\kappa$ to $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ is trivial, so $\pi_{!} f_{G}$ takes values in the category of perverse sheaves in this case. Both $f_{G}$ and $f_{H}$ send an irreducible representation to an irreducible perverse sheaf. So, for $V \in \operatorname{Rep}(\breve{G})$ the decomposition of $\operatorname{Res}^{\kappa}(V)$ into irreducible ones can be seen via the decomposition theorem of Beilinson, Bernstein and Deligne ([2]). Actually here $\pi: \Pi(K) \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G} \rightarrow \Pi(K)$ is the projection, where $K=k((t))$, $\Pi$ is a finite-dimensional $k$-vector space, and $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ is the affine grassmanian for $G$. There will also be an analog of the above result for $n<m$ (and also for the dual pair $\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}$ ).

The above phenomenon is a part of our main local results (Proposition 4 in Section 5.1, Theorem 7 in Section 6.2). They provide a geometric analog of the local theta correspondence for these dual pairs. The key technical tools in the proof are the weak geometric analogs of the Jacquet functors (cf. Section 4.7).
1.2. - In the global setting let $\Omega$ denote the canonical line bundle on $X$. Let $G$ be the group scheme over $X$ of automorphisms of $\emptyset_{X}^{n} \oplus \Omega^{n}$ preserving the natural symplectic form $\wedge^{2}\left(\vartheta_{X}^{n} \oplus \Omega^{n}\right) \rightarrow \Omega$. Let $H=\mathrm{SO}_{2 m}$. Write Bun ${ }_{H}$ for the stack of $H$-torsors on $X$, similarly for $G$. Using the construction from [19], we introduce a geometric analog Aut ${ }_{G, H}$ of the above function $\phi_{0}$, this is an object of the derived category of $\ell$-adic sheaves on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$. It yields the theta-lifting functors

F_{G}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)
$$

and

$$
F_{H}: \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)
$$

between the corresponding derived categories. Our main global results for the pair $(G, H)$ are Theorems 3 and 4 describing the relation between the theta-lifting functors and the Hecke functors on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ and $\mathrm{Bun}_{H}$. They agree with the conjectures of Adams ([1]). One of the advantages of the geometric setting compared to the classical one is that the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur appears naturally.

An essential difficulty in the proof was the fact that the complex Aut ${ }_{G, H}$ is not perverse (it has infinitely many perverse cohomologies), it is not even a direct sum of its perverse cohomologies (cf. Section 8.3).

We also establish the global theta-lifting for the dual pair $\left(\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}\right)$ (cf. Theorem 5).
1.3. - Let us briefly discuss how the paper is organized. Our main results are collected in Section 2. In Section 3 we remind some constructions at the level of functions, which we have in mind for geometrization.

In Section 4 we develop a geometric theory for the following classical objects. Let $K=\mathbb{F}_{q}((t))$ and $\theta=\mathbb{F}_{q}[[t]]$. Given a reductive group $G$ over $\mathbb{F}_{q}$ and a finite dimensional representation $M$, the space of invariants in the Schwarz space $\delta(M(K))^{G(\theta)}$ is a module over the non ramified Hecke algebra $\mathscr{H}_{G}$. We introduce the geometric analogs of the Fourier transform on this space and (some weak analogs) of the Jacquet functors. A way to relate this with the global case is proposed in Section 4.6.

In Section 5 we develop the local theta correspondence for the dual pair $\left(\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}\right)$. The key ingredients here are decomposition theorem from [2], the dimension estimates from [21] and hyperbolic localization results from [4].

In Section 6 we develop the local theta correspondence for the dual pair $\left(\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}, \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}\right)$. In addition to the above tools, we use the classical result (Proposition 2) in the proof of our Proposition 7.

In Section 7 we derive the global theta-lifting results for the dual pair $\left(\mathrm{GL}_{n}, \mathrm{GL}_{m}\right)$.
In Section 8 we prove our main global results (Theorems 3 and 4) about theta-lifting for the dual pair $\left(\mathbb{S p}_{2 n}, \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}\right)$. The relation between the local theory and the thetakernel $\mathrm{Aut}_{G, H}$ comes from the results of [16]. In that paper we have introduced a scheme $\mathscr{L}_{d}\left(M\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ of discrete lagrangian lattices in a symplectic Tate space $M\left(F_{x}\right)$ and a certain $\mu_{2}$-gerb $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ over it. The complex $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$ on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ comes from the stack $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ simply as the inverse image. The key observation is that it is much easier to prove the Hecke property of $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$ on $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$, because over the latter stack it is perverse.

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## 2. Main results

### 2.1. Notation

Let $k$ be an algebraically closed field of characteristic $p>2$ (except in Section 3, where $k=\mathbb{F}_{q}$ ). All the schemes (or stacks) we consider are defined over $k$.

Let $X$ be a smooth projective connected curve. Set $F=k(X)$. For a closed point $x \in X$ write $F_{x}$ for the completion of $F$ at $x$, let $\theta_{x} \subset F_{x}$ be the ring of integers. Let $D_{x}=\operatorname{Spec} \theta_{x}$ denote the disc around $x$. Write $\Omega$ for the canonical line bundle on $X$.

Fix a prime $\ell \neq p$. For a $k$-stack $S$ locally of finite type write $\mathrm{D}(S)$ for the category introduced in ([17], Remark 3.21) and denoted by $\mathrm{D}_{c}\left(S, \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$ in loc. cit. It should be thought of as the unbounded derived category of constructible $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-sheaves on $S$. For $*=+,-, b$ we

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have the full triangulated subcategory $\mathrm{D}^{*}(S) \subset \mathrm{D}(S)$ denoted $\mathrm{D}_{c}^{*}\left(S, \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$ in loc. cit. Write $\mathrm{D}^{*}(S)!\subset \mathrm{D}^{*}(S)$ for the full subcategory of objects which are extensions by zero from some open substack of finite type. Write $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}(S) \subset \mathrm{D}(S)$ for the full subcategory of complexes $K \in \mathrm{D}(S)$ such that for any open substack $U \subset S$ of finite type we have $\left.K\right|_{U} \in \mathrm{D}^{-}(U)$. Write $\mathbb{D}: \mathrm{D}^{b}(S) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}(S)$ for the Verdier duality functor.

Write $\mathrm{P}(S) \subset \mathrm{D}^{\prec}(S)$ for the full subcategory of perverse sheaves. Set $\mathrm{DP}(S)=$ $\oplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} \mathrm{P}(S)[i] \subset \mathrm{D}(S)$. For $K, K^{\prime} \in \mathrm{P}(S), i, j \in \mathbb{Z}$ we define

\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{DP}(S)}\left(K[i], K^{\prime}[j]\right)= \begin{cases}\operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{P}(S)}\left(K, K^{\prime}\right), & \text { for } i=j \\ 0, & \text { for } i \neq j\end{cases}
$$

Write $\mathrm{P}^{\mathrm{ss}}(S) \subset \mathrm{P}(S)$ for the full subcategory of semi-simple perverse sheaves. Let $\mathrm{DP}^{\mathrm{ss}}(S) \subset \mathrm{DP}(S)$ be the full subcategory of objects of the form $\oplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} K_{i}[i]$ with $K_{i} \in \mathrm{P}^{\mathrm{ss}}(S)$ for all $i$.

Fix a nontrivial character $\psi: \mathbb{F}_{p} \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{*}$ and denote by $\mathcal{L}_{\psi}$ the corresponding ArtinShreier sheaf on $\mathbb{A}^{1}$. Since we are working over an algebraically closed field, we systematically ignore Tate twists (except in Sections 6.3-6.4). For a morphism of stacks $f: Y \rightarrow Z$ we denote by $\operatorname{dim} . \operatorname{rel}(f)$ the function of a connected component $C$ of $Y$ given by $\operatorname{dim} C-\operatorname{dim} C^{\prime}$, where $C^{\prime}$ is the connected component of $Z$ containing $f(C)$.

If $V \rightarrow S$ and $V^{*} \rightarrow S$ are dual rank $r$ vector bundles over a stack $S$, we normalize the Fourier transform $\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}^{b}(V) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(V^{*}\right)$ by $\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}(K)=\left(p_{V^{*}}\right)!\left(\xi^{*} \mathcal{L}_{\psi} \otimes p_{V}^{*} K\right)[r]$, where $p_{V}, p_{V^{*}}$ are the projections, and $\xi: V \times_{S} V^{*} \rightarrow \mathbb{A}^{1}$ is the pairing.

Write $\mathrm{Bun}_{k}$ for the stack of rank $k$ vector bundles on $X$. For $k=1$ we also write $\operatorname{Pic} X$ for the Picard stack $\operatorname{Bun}_{1}$ of $X$. We have a line bundle $\mathscr{G}_{k}$ on $\operatorname{Bun}_{k}$ with fibre $\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, V)$ at $V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{k}$. View it as a $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-graded placed in degree $\chi(V) \bmod 2$. Our conventions about $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-grading are those of ([19], 3.1).

For a sheaf of groups $G$ on a scheme $S, \mathcal{F}_{G}^{0}$ denotes the trivial $G$-torsor on $S$. For a representation $V$ of $G$ and a $G$-torsor $\mathcal{F}_{G}$ on $S$ we write $V_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}=V \times{ }^{G} \mathcal{F}_{G}$ for the induced vector bundle on $S$.

If $H$ is an algebraic group of finite type and pure dimension, assume given a scheme $Z$ with an action of $H$ and an $H$-torsor $\mathcal{F}_{H}$ over a scheme $Y$. Then to $\& \in \mathrm{D}^{-}(Z / H)$, $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}(Y)$ one associates their twisted external product $K \tilde{\otimes} \& \in \mathrm{D}\left(\mathcal{F}_{H} \times{ }^{H} Z\right)$ defined by $K \tilde{\otimes} \&=p^{*} K \otimes q^{*} \&[\operatorname{dim} H]$, where $Y \stackrel{p}{\leftarrow} \mathcal{F}_{H} \times{ }^{H} Z \xrightarrow{q} Z / H$ are the projections. Here $Z / H$ is the stack quotient.
2.1.1. Hecke operators. - For a connected reductive group $G$ over $k$, let $\mathscr{H}_{G}$ be the Hecke stack classifying $\left(x, \mathcal{F}_{G}, \mathcal{F}_{G}^{\prime}, \beta\right)$, where $\mathcal{F}_{G}, \mathcal{F}_{G}^{\prime}$ are $G$-torsors on $X, x \in X$ and $\beta:\left.\left.\mathscr{F}_{G}\right|_{X-x} \underset{\rightarrow}{\leftrightarrows} \mathscr{F}_{G}^{\prime}\right|_{X-x}$ is an isomorphism. We have a diagram of projections

X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G} \stackrel{\operatorname{supp} \times h_{G}^{\leftarrow}}{\longleftrightarrow} \mathscr{H}_{G} \xrightarrow{h_{G}^{\vec{G}}} \operatorname{Bun}_{G}
$$

where $h_{G}^{\overleftarrow{(r e s p ., ~}} h_{G}$, supp) sends the above collection to $\mathcal{F}_{G}$ (resp., $\mathcal{F}_{G}^{\prime}, x$ ). Write ${ }_{x} \mathscr{H}_{G}$ for the fibre of $\mathscr{H}_{G}$ over $x \in X$.

Let $T \subset B \subset G$ be a maximal torus and Borel subgroup; we write $\Lambda_{G}$ (resp., $\check{\Lambda}_{G}$ ) for the coweights (resp., weights) lattice of $G$. Let $\Lambda_{G}^{+}$(resp., $\check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$) denote the set of dominant coweights (resp., dominant weights) of $G$. Write $\check{\rho}_{G}$ (resp., $\rho_{G}$ ) for the half sum of the positive
roots (resp., coroots) of $G, w_{0}$ for the longest element of the Weyl group of $G$. For $\check{\lambda} \in \check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$ we write $V^{\check{\lambda}}$ for the corresponding Weyl $G$-module.

For $x \in X$ we write $\mathrm{Gr}_{G, x}$ for the affine Grassmanian $G\left(F_{x}\right) / G\left(\theta_{x}\right)$ (cf. [5], Section 3.2 for a detailed discussion). It can be seen as an ind-scheme classifying a $G$-torsor $\mathcal{F}_{G}$ on $X$ together with a trivialization $\beta:\left.\mathcal{F}_{G}\right|_{X-x} \widetilde{\rightarrow}_{\mathcal{F}_{G}^{0}}^{\left.\right|_{X-x}}$ over $X-x$. For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$let $\overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G, x}^{\lambda} \subset \operatorname{Gr}_{G, x}$ be the closed subscheme classifying $\left(\mathscr{F}_{G}, \beta\right)$ for which $V_{\mathcal{G}_{G}^{0}}(-\langle\lambda, \check{\lambda}\rangle x) \subset V_{\mathscr{G}_{G}}$ for every $G$-module $V$ whose weights are $\leq \check{\lambda}$. The unique dense open $G\left(\theta_{x}\right)$-orbit in $\overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G, x}^{\lambda}$ is denoted by $\mathrm{Gr}_{G, x}^{\lambda}$.

Let $\mathscr{\varphi}_{G}^{\lambda}$ denote the intersection cohomology sheaf of $\overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}$. Write $\check{G}$ for the Langlands dual group to $G$ over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$. Write $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ for the category of $G\left(\theta_{x}\right)$-equivariant perverse sheaves on $\mathrm{Gr}_{G, x}$. By ([21]), this is a tensor category, and there is a canonical equivalence of tensor categories Loc : $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G}) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$, where $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ is the category of $\check{G}$-representations over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$. Under this equivalence $\mathscr{Q}_{G}^{\lambda}$ corresponds to the irreducible representation of $\check{G}$ with h.w. $\lambda$.

Write $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, x}$ for the stack classifying $\mathcal{F}_{G} \in \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ together with a trivialization $\left.\mathcal{F}_{G} \leadsto \mathcal{F}_{G}^{0}\right|_{D_{x}}$. Following ([5], Section 3.2.4), write $\mathrm{id}^{l}, \mathrm{id}^{r}$ for the isomorphisms

$$
{ }_{x} \mathscr{H}_{G} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, x} \times{ }^{G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)} \operatorname{Gr}_{G, x}
$$

such that the projection to the first factor corresponds to $h_{G}^{\overleftarrow{ }}, h_{\vec{G}}$ respectively. Let ${ }_{x} \overline{\mathcal{H}}_{G}^{\lambda} \subset{ }_{x} \mathscr{H}_{G}$ be the closed substack that identifies with $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, x} \times{ }^{G\left(\partial_{x}\right)} \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{G, x}^{\lambda}$ via id ${ }^{l}$.

To $\& \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}, K \in \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ one attaches their twisted external products $(K \tilde{\otimes} \phi)^{l}$ and $(K \tilde{\boxtimes} \phi)^{r}$ on ${ }_{x} \mathcal{H}_{G}$, they are normalized to be perverse for $K, \&$ perverse (cf. [5], Section 0.4.4). The Hecke functors

$$
{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow},{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\rightarrow}: \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)
$$

are given by

$$
{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\&, K)=\left(h_{G}^{\leftarrow}\right)!(* \& \tilde{\boxtimes} K)^{r} \quad \text { and } \quad{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}(\&, K)=\left(h_{G}\right)!(\& \tilde{\boxtimes} K)^{l}
$$

We have denoted by $*: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \leadsto \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ the covariant equivalence of categories induced by the map $G\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow G\left(F_{x}\right), g \mapsto g^{-1}$. Write also $*: \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G}) \leadsto \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ for the corresponding functor (in view of Loc), it sends an irreducible $\breve{G}$-module with h.w. $\lambda$ to the irreducible $\check{G}$-module with h.w. $-w_{0}(\lambda)$ (cf. [7], Theorem 5.2.6).

The Hecke functors preserve the full subcategory $\mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)!\subset \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$. By ([6], Proposition 5.3.9), we have canonically

{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(* \&, K) \leftrightarrows{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}(\varnothing, K)
$$

Besides, the functors $K \mapsto{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\gamma, K)$ and $K \mapsto{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}(\mathbb{D}(\varnothing), K)$ are mutually (both left and right) adjoint.

Letting $x$ move around $X$, one similarly defines Hecke functors

$$
\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}, \mathrm{H}_{G}: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(S \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times S \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)
$$

where $S$ is a scheme. The Hecke functors are compatible with the tensor structure on $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ and commute with Verdier duality for locally bounded objects (cf. loc. cit). Sometimes we write $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ instead of $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ in the definition of Hecke functors in view of Loc.
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2.1.2. - We introduce the category

$$
\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}:=\oplus_{r \in \mathbb{Z}} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}[r] \subset \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right) .
$$

It is equipped with a tensor structure, associativity and commutativity constraints so that the following holds. There is a canonical equivalence of tensor categories $\operatorname{Loc}^{\mathfrak{r}}: \operatorname{Rep}\left(\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right) \Longrightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\boldsymbol{S p h}}{ }_{G}$ such that $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ acts on $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}[r]$ by the character $x \mapsto x^{-r}$. So, the grading by cohomological degrees in $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ corresponds to grading by the characters of $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ in $\operatorname{Rep}\left(\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right)$. In cohomological degree zero the equivalence Loc ${ }^{\mathfrak{r}}$ specializes to Loc.

The action of $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ on $\mathrm{D}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{G}\right)$ extends to an action of $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$. Namely, we still denote by

$$
{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow},{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}:{\mathrm{D} \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)}
$$

the functors given by ${ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\phi[r], K)={ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\delta, K)[r]$ and ${ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}(\phi[r], K)={ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}(\delta, K)[r]$ for $\delta \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$.

We still denote by $*: \mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ the functor given by $*(\&[i])=(* \&)[i]$ for $\& \in \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$. Write Loc${ }_{X}$ for the tensor category of local systems on $X$. Set

$$
\mathrm{DLoc}_{X}=\oplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} \operatorname{Loc}_{X}[i] \subset \mathrm{D}(X)
$$

We also equip it with a tensor structure so that a choice of $x \in X$ yields an equivalence of tensor categories $\operatorname{Rep}\left(\pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right) \rightrightarrows \mathrm{D}^{\boldsymbol{L}} \boldsymbol{c}_{X}$. The cohomological grading in $\mathrm{D} \operatorname{Loc}_{X}$ corresponds to grading by the characters of $\mathbb{G}_{m}$.

For the standard definition of a Hecke eigen-sheaf we refer the reader to ([10], Section 2.7). Since we need to take into account the maximal torus of $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur, we modify this standard definition as follows.

Definition 1. - Given a tensor functor $E: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DLoc}_{X}$, an $E$-Hecke eigensheaf is a complex $K \in \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ equipped with an isomorphism

$$
\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\delta, K) \widetilde{\rightrightarrows} E(\delta) \boxtimes K[1]
$$

functorial in $\& \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ and satisfying the compatibility conditions (as in loc. cit.). Note that once $x \in X$ is chosen, a datum of $E$ becomes equivalent to a datum of a homomorphism $\sigma: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$. In other words, we are given a homomorphism $\mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ of algebraic groups over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$, and a continuous homomorphism $\pi_{1}(X, x) \rightarrow Z_{\breve{G}}\left(\mathbb{G}_{m}\right)$, where $Z_{\check{G}}\left(\mathbb{G}_{m}\right)$ is the centralizer of $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ in $\check{G}$.

Given $\sigma: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ as above we write $\sigma^{e x}: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}$ for the homomorphism, whose first component is $\sigma$, and the second component $\pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \mathbb{G}_{m}$ is the projection.

Example 1. - The constant perverse sheaf $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\left[\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right]$ on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ is a $\sigma$-Hecke eigensheaf for the homomorphism $\sigma: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ given by $2 \rho: \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ and trivial on $\pi_{1}(X, x)$.

### 2.2. Theta-sheaf

Let $G_{r}$ denote the sheaf of automorphisms of $\theta_{X}^{r} \oplus \Omega^{r}$ preserving the natural symplectic form $\wedge^{2}\left(\theta_{X}^{r} \oplus \Omega^{r}\right) \rightarrow \Omega$. The stack Bun $_{G_{r}}$ of $G_{r}$-torsors on $X$ classifies $M \in \operatorname{Bun}_{2 r}$ equipped with a symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M \rightarrow \Omega$.

Recall the following objects introduced in [19]. Write $\mathscr{G}_{G_{r}}$ for the line bundle on $\mathrm{Bun}_{G_{r}}$ with fibre $\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, M)$ at $M$. We view it as a $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-graded line bundle purely of degree zero. Denote by $\widetilde{\operatorname{Bun}}_{G_{r}} \rightarrow \operatorname{Bun}_{G_{r}}$ the $\mu_{2}$-gerbe of square roots of $\mathscr{G}_{G_{r}}$. The theta-sheaf Aut $=\mathrm{Aut}_{g} \oplus \mathrm{Aut}_{s}$ is a perverse sheaf on $\widetilde{\mathrm{Bun}}_{G_{r}}$ (cf. [19] for details).

### 2.3. Dual pair $\mathrm{SO}_{2 m}, \mathrm{Sp}_{2 n}$

2.3.1. - Let $n, m \geq 1, G=G_{n}$ and $\mathscr{C}_{G}=\mathscr{C}_{G_{n}}$. Let $H=\mathrm{S}_{2 m}$ be the split orthogonal group of rank $m$ over $k$. The stack $\operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ of $H$-torsors on $X$ classifies: $V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{2 m}$, a nondegenerate symmetric form $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} V \rightarrow \theta_{X}$, and a compatible trivialization $\gamma: \operatorname{det} V \stackrel{ }{\rightarrow} \Theta_{X}$. Let $\mathscr{Q}_{H}$ be the $\left(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}\right.$-graded) line bundle on $\operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ with fibre $\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, V)$ at $V$.

Write $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}=\operatorname{Bun}_{G} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$. Let

$$
\tau: \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \rightarrow \operatorname{Bun}_{G_{2 n m}}
$$

be the map sending $(M, V)$ to $M \otimes V$ with the induced symplectic form $\wedge^{2}(M \otimes V) \rightarrow \Omega$. The following is proved in ([20], Proposition 2).

Lemma 1. - There is a canonical $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-graded isomorphism of line bundles on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$

\tau^{*} \mathscr{C}_{G_{2 n m}} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathscr{Q}_{H}^{2 n} \otimes \mathscr{U}_{G}^{2 m} \otimes \operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, \theta)^{-4 n m} \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let $\tilde{\tau}: \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \rightarrow \widetilde{\operatorname{Bun}}_{G_{2 n}}$ be the map sending $\left(\wedge^{2} M \rightarrow \Omega, \operatorname{Sym}^{2} V \rightarrow \theta\right)$ to $\left(\wedge^{2}(M \otimes V) \rightarrow \Omega, \mathscr{B}\right)$, where

\mathcal{B}=\frac{\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, V)^{n} \otimes \operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, M)^{m}}{\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, \mathscr{\theta})^{2 n m}}
$$

and $\mathcal{B}^{2}$ is identified with $\operatorname{det} \mathrm{R} \Gamma(X, M \otimes V)$ via (1).
Definition 2. - Set $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}=\tilde{\tau}^{*} \operatorname{Aut}[\operatorname{dim} . \operatorname{rel}(\tau)] \in \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$. As in ([20], Section 3.2) for the diagram of projections

$$
\begin{gathered}
\operatorname{Bun}_{H} \stackrel{\mathfrak{q}}{\leftarrow} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \stackrel{\mathfrak{p}}{\rightarrow} \operatorname{Bun}_{G} \\
\text { define } F_{G}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right) \text { and } F_{H}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right) \text { by } \\
F_{G}(K)=\mathfrak{p}_{!}\left(\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H} \otimes \mathfrak{q}^{*} K\right)\left[-\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right] \\
F_{H}(H)=\mathfrak{q}_{!}\left(\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H} \otimes \mathfrak{p}^{*} K\right)\left[-\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right] .
\end{gathered}
$$

Since $\mathfrak{p}$ is not representable, a priori $F_{G}$ may send a complex from $\mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ ! to a complex, which is unbounded even over some open substack of finite type. We do not know if this really happens (similarly for $F_{H}$ ).

The Langlands dual groups are $\check{G} \leftrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 n+1}$ and $\check{H} \rightrightarrows \mathrm{SO}_{2 m}$ over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$. For convenience of the reader, we first formulate our main result in particular cases that yield Langlands functoriality.

Theorem 1. - 1) Case $n=m$. There is an inclusion $\check{H} \hookrightarrow \check{G}$ such that there exists an isomorphism

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(V, F_{G}(K)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}\left(\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{G}\right)\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{\tilde{H}}^{\check{G}}(V), K\right)\right) \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

over $X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ functorial in $V \in \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)!$. Here we denoted by $\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{G}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ the corresponding theta-lifting functor.
2) Case $m=n+1$. There is an inclusion $\check{G} \hookrightarrow \check{H}$ such that there exists an isomorphism

\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\vec{H}}\left(V, F_{H}(K)\right) \rightrightarrows\left(\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{H}\right)\left(\mathrm{H}_{G}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{\stackrel{G}{H}}^{\check{H}}(V), K\right)\right) \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

over $X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ functorial in $V \in \operatorname{Rep}(\check{H})$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)!$. Here we denoted by $\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{H}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ the corresponding theta-lifting functor.

We will derive Theorem 1 from the following Hecke property of Aut $_{G, H}$.
Theorem 2. - 1) Case $n=m$. There is an inclusion $\check{H} \rightarrow \check{G}$ such that there exists an isomorphism

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(V, \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{H}_{H}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{\tilde{H}}^{\stackrel{\zeta}{G}}(V), \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$ functorial in $V \in \operatorname{Rep}(\breve{G})$.
2) Case $m=n+1$. There is an inclusion $\breve{G} \hookrightarrow \check{H}$ such that there exists an isomorphism

\mathrm{H}_{H}\left(V, \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \rightrightarrows \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{\stackrel{G}{K}}^{\check{H}}(V), \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$ functorial in $V \in \operatorname{Rep}(\check{H})$.
2.3.2. - In the case $m \leq n$ define the map $\kappa: \check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ as follows.

Set $W_{0}=\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{n}$, write $W_{0}=W_{1} \oplus W_{2}$, where $W_{1}$ (resp., $W_{2}$ ) is the subspace generated by the first $m$ (resp., last $n-m$ ) base vectors. Equip $W_{0} \oplus W_{0}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ with the symmetric form given by the matrix

\left(\begin{array}{ccc}
0 & E_{n} & 0 \\
E_{n} & 0 & 0 \\
0 & 0 & 1
\end{array}\right)
$$

where $E_{n} \in \mathrm{GL}_{n}\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$ is the unity. Realize $\check{G}$ as $\mathrm{SO}\left(W_{0} \oplus W_{0}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$. Equip the subspace $W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*} \subset W_{0} \oplus W_{0}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ with the induced symmetric form, and realize $\check{H}$ as $\operatorname{SO}\left(W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*}\right)$. This fixes the inclusion $i_{\kappa}: \check{H} \hookrightarrow \check{G}$. The centralizer of $\check{H}$ in $\check{G}$ contains the group $\mathbb{O}\left(W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$. Let $\check{T}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{2}\right)}$ be the maximal torus of diagonal matrices in $\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{2}\right)$. We have $\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathbb{G}_{m}, \check{T}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{2}\right)}\right)=\mathbb{Z}^{n-m}$ canonically, and we let $\alpha_{\kappa}=(2,4, \ldots, 2 n-2 m) \in$ $\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathbb{G}_{m}, \check{T}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{2}\right)}\right)$. View $\alpha_{\kappa}$ as a map $\mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$. Finally, set $\kappa=\left(i_{\kappa}, \alpha_{\kappa}\right): \check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$.

Another way to think of $\alpha_{\kappa}$ is to say that $W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ admits an irreducible representation of the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur, and $\alpha_{\kappa}$ is its restriction to the standard maximal torus

$$
\mathbb{G}_{m} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SL}_{2} \xrightarrow{\sigma} \mathrm{SO}\left(W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right) .
$$

As predicted by Adams ([1]), the representation $\sigma$ corresponds to the principal unipotent orbit in $\mathrm{SO}\left(W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$, so $\alpha_{\kappa}=2 \rho_{\mathrm{SO}\left(W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)}$ for a suitable choice of positive roots of $\mathrm{SO}\left(W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*} \oplus \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$.

Write $\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa}: \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{H}$ for the geometric restriction functor corresponding to $\kappa$. By this we mean the restriction functor $\operatorname{Rep}(\breve{G}) \rightarrow \operatorname{Rep}\left(\check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right)$ composed with the Satake equivalences.

In the case $m>n$ define $\kappa: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ as follows. Set in this case $W_{0}=\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{m}$, let $W_{1}$ (resp., $W_{2}$ ) be the subspace of $W_{0}$ generated by the first $n$ (resp., last $m-n$ ) base vectors. Equip $W_{0} \oplus W_{0}^{*}$ with the symmetric form given by the matrix

\left(\begin{array}{cc}
0 & E_{m} \\
E_{m} & 0
\end{array}\right)
$$

where $E_{m} \in \mathrm{GL}_{m}\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)$ is the unity. Realize $\check{H}$ as $\mathrm{SO}\left(W_{0} \oplus W_{0}^{*}\right)$.
Write $\left\{e_{i}\right\}$ for the standard base of $W_{0}$, and $\left\{e_{i}^{*}\right\}$ for the dual base in $W_{0}^{*}$. Write $W_{2}=W_{3} \oplus W_{4}$, where $W_{3}$ (resp., $W_{4}$ ) is spanned by $e_{n+1}$ (resp., by $e_{n+2}, \ldots, e_{m}$ ). Let $\bar{W} \subset W_{3} \oplus W_{3}^{*}$ be any nondegenerate one-dimensional subspace. Equip $W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*} \oplus \bar{W}$ with the induced symmetric form and set $\breve{G}=\mathrm{S} \mathbb{O}\left(W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*} \oplus \bar{W}\right)$. This fixes the inclusion $i_{\kappa}: \check{G} \hookrightarrow \check{H}$.

Let $\bar{W}^{\perp}$ denote the orthogonal complement of $\bar{W}$ in $W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*}$. The centralizer of $\check{G}$ in $\check{H}$ contains $\mathbb{O}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)$. Realize $\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{4}\right)$ as the Levi subgroup of $\mathrm{S} \mathbb{O}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)$ using the standard inclusion $W_{4} \oplus W_{4}^{*} \subset \bar{W}^{\perp}$. Let $\check{T}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{4}\right)}$ be the maximal torus of diagonal matrices in $\operatorname{GL}\left(W_{4}\right)$. Set

$$
\alpha_{\kappa}=(-2,-4, \ldots, 2-2 m+2 n) \in \mathbb{Z}^{m-n-1}=\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathbb{G}_{m}, \check{T}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{4}\right)}\right)
$$

View $\alpha_{\kappa}$ as a map $\mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$, set $\kappa=\left(i_{\kappa}, \alpha_{\kappa}\right): \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$.
Another way to think of $\alpha_{\kappa}$ is to say that $\bar{W}^{\perp}$ can be thought of as an irreducible representation of the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur, and $\alpha_{\kappa}$ is the restriction to the standard maximal torus

$$
\mathbb{G}_{m} \hookrightarrow \mathrm{SL}_{2} \xrightarrow{\sigma} \mathrm{~S} \mathbb{O}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)
$$

As predicted by Adams ([1]), the representation $\sigma$ corresponds to the principal unipotent orbit in $\mathrm{SO}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)$, so $\alpha_{\kappa}=2 \rho_{\mathrm{SO}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)}$ for a suitable choice of positive roots of $\mathrm{S} \mathbb{(}\left(\bar{W}^{\perp}\right)$. As above, the geometric restriction functor corresponding to $\kappa$ is denoted by gRes ${ }^{\kappa}: \operatorname{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$.

Here is our main global result.
Theorem 3. - 1) Case $m \leq n$. There exists an isomorphism

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\delta, F_{G}(K)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}\left(\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{G}\right)\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa}(\delta), K\right)\right) \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ functorial in $\& \in \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)$ !. Here we denoted by $\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{G}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{G}\right)$ the corresponding theta-lifting functor.
2) Case $m>n$. There exists an isomorphism

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\delta, F_{H}(K)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}\left(\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{H}\right)\left(\mathrm{H}_{G}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(* \delta), K\right)\right) \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ functorial in $\& \in \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)_{!}$. Here we denoted by $\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{H}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{G}\right)!\rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{H}\right)$ the corresponding theta-lifting functor.

We will derive Theorem 3 from the following Hecke property of $\mathrm{Aut}_{G, H}$.

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Theorem 4. - 1) Case $m \leq n$. There exists an isomorphism

\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\ell, \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \underset{\rightarrow}{\leftrightarrows} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(* \operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\phi), \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$ functorial in $\delta \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$.
2) Case $m>n$. There exists an isomorphism

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\&, \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa}(* \&), \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\right) \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$ functorial in $\& \in \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$.
2.3.3. - There is an automorphism $\sigma_{H}: \check{H} \rightrightarrows \check{H}$ inducing the functor $*: \operatorname{Rep}(\check{H}) \rightrightarrows \operatorname{Rep}(\check{H})$ defined in Section 2.1.2. For $m>n$ write $\tilde{\kappa}=\sigma_{H} \circ \kappa$. Note also that the functor * : $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G}) \underset{\rightarrow}{\sim} \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ is isomorphic to the identity functor. From Theorem 3 one derives the following.

Corollary 1. - 1) For $m \leq n$ let $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ ! be a $\sigma$-Hecke eigensheaf for some $\sigma: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$. Let $\tau$ be the composition

$$
\pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\sigma^{e x}} \check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\kappa} \check{G},
$$

where $\sigma^{e x}$ is as in Definition 1. Then $F_{G}(K)$ is equipped with a structure of a $\tau$-Hecke eigensheaf.
2) For $m>n$ let $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G}\right)$ ! be a $\sigma$-Hecke eigensheaf for some $\sigma: \pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$. Let $\tau$ be the composition

$$
\pi_{1}(X, x) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\sigma^{e x}} \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\tilde{\kappa}} \check{H}
$$

where $\sigma^{e x}$ is as in Definition 1. Then $F_{H}(K)$ is equipped with a structure of a $\tau$-Hecke engeinsheaf.

### 2.4. Dual pair $\mathrm{GL}_{m}, \mathrm{GL}_{n}$

Let $n, m \geq 0$. Recall that $\mathrm{Bun}_{n}$ denotes the stack of rank $n$ vector bundles on $X$. Our convention is that $\mathrm{GL}_{0}=\{1\}$ and $\mathrm{Bun}_{0}=\operatorname{Spec} k$.

Let $\mathcal{W}_{n, m}$ denote the stack classifying $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}, U \in \mathrm{Bun}_{m}$ and a section $s: \Theta_{X} \rightarrow L \otimes U$. We have a diagram

$$
\operatorname{Bun}_{n} \stackrel{h_{n}}{\longleftarrow} W_{n, m} \xrightarrow{h_{m}} \mathrm{Bun}_{m}
$$

where $h_{m}$ (resp., $h_{n}$ ) sends $(L, U, s)$ to $U$ (resp., to $L$ ). Let $W_{n, m}^{\prime}$ be the stack classifying $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}, U \in \operatorname{Bun}_{m}$ and a section $s^{\prime}: L \otimes U \rightarrow \Omega$. We have a diagram

$$
\operatorname{Bun}_{n} \stackrel{h_{n}^{\prime}}{\longleftarrow} W_{n, m}^{\prime} \xrightarrow{h_{m}^{\prime}} \operatorname{Bun}_{m}
$$

where $h_{m}^{\prime}$ (resp., $h_{n}^{\prime}$ ) sends $\left(L, U, s^{\prime}\right)$ to $U$ (resp., to $L$ ).
Definition 3. - The theta-lifting functors $F_{n, m}, F_{n, m}^{\prime}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{n}\right)_{!} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\mathrm{Bun}_{m}\right)$ are given by
$F_{n, m}(K)=\left(h_{m}\right)!h_{n}^{*} K\left[\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{m}+a_{n, m}\right]$ and $F_{n, m}^{\prime}(K)=\left(h_{m}^{\prime}\right)_{!}\left(h_{n}^{\prime}\right)^{*} K\left[\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{m}-a_{n, m}\right]$. Here $a_{n, m}$ is a function of a connected component of $\operatorname{Bun}_{n} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{m}$ given by $a_{n, m}=\chi(L \otimes U)$ for $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}, U \in \operatorname{Bun}_{m}$. By restriction under $h_{n} \times h_{m}$ (resp., under $h_{n}^{\prime} \times h_{m}^{\prime}$ ), we view $a_{n, m}$ in the above formulas as a function on $\mathcal{W}_{n, m}$ (resp., on $\mathcal{W}_{n, m}^{\prime}$ ).

Since $h_{m}$ and $h_{m}^{\prime}$ are not representable, a priori $F_{n, m}$ and $F_{n, m}^{\prime}$ may send a bounded complex to an unbounded one. The following result can be thought of as a functional equation for the theta-lifting functors.

Lemma 2. - There is a canonical isomorphism of functors $F_{n, m}^{\prime} \xrightarrow{\sim} F_{n, m}$.
Proof. - Write $\phi, \phi^{\prime}$ for the projections from $W_{n, m}$ and from $W_{n, m}^{\prime}$ to $\operatorname{Bun}_{n} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{m}$. As in ([5], Lemma 7.3.6) one shows that $\phi_{!} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\left[a_{n, m}\right] \stackrel{\sim}{\leftrightarrows} \phi_{!}^{\prime} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\left[-a_{n, m}\right]$ canonically. The assertion follows.

For the rest of Section 2.5 assume $m \geq n$ and set $G=\mathrm{GL}\left(L_{0}\right)$ and $H=\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{0}\right)$ for $U_{0}=k^{m}, L_{0}=k^{n}$. Write $U_{0}=U_{1} \oplus U_{2}$, where $U_{1}$ (resp., $U_{2}$ ) is the subspace generated by the first $n$ (resp., last $m-n$ ) base vectors. Let $M=\operatorname{GL}\left(U_{1}\right) \times \operatorname{GL}\left(U_{2}\right) \subset H$ be the corresponding Levi factor.

Define $\kappa: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ as the composition

$$
\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{id} \times 2 \check{\rho}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}} \check{G} \times \check{\mathrm{GL}}\left(U_{2}\right)=\check{M} \hookrightarrow \check{H}
$$

Write gRes ${ }^{\kappa}: \mathrm{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ for the corresponding geometric restriction functor.
The analog of Theorem 3 for the dual pair $(G, H)$ is as follows.
Theorem 5. - We assume $m \geq n$. There exists an isomorphism

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\ell, F_{n, m}(K)\right) \underset{\rightarrow}{\left.\left(\operatorname{id} \boxtimes F_{n, m}\right)\left(\mathrm{H}_{G}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\delta), K\right)\right), ~\right)} \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

in $\mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{m}\right)$ functorial in $\& \in \operatorname{Sph}_{H}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{n}\right)_{!}$. Here we denoted by $\mathrm{id} \boxtimes F_{n, m}: \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{n}\right)_{!} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(X \times \mathrm{Bun}_{m}\right)$ the corresponding theta-lifting functor.

If $n=m$ or $m=n+1$ then the restriction of $\kappa$ to $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ is trivial, so Theorem 5 in this case says that $F_{n, m}$ realizes the (non ramified) geometric Langlands functoriality with respect to an inclusion $\check{G} \hookrightarrow \check{H}$. For example, for $n=m$ one may show the following. For an irreducible rank $n$ local system $E$ on $X$ write Aut $_{E}$ for the automorphic sheaf on Bun $_{n}$ corresponding to $E$ (cf. [7]). Then $F_{n, n}\left(\right.$ Aut $\left._{E}\right)$ is isomorphic to Aut $E^{*}$ tensored by some constant complex.

Write ${ }_{\infty} W_{n, m}$ for the stack classifying $x \in X, L \in \mathrm{Bun}_{n}, U \in \mathrm{Bun}_{m}$ and a section $s: \theta_{X} \rightarrow L \otimes U(\infty x)$, which is allowed to have an arbitrary pole at $x$. This is an indalgebraic stack. For a closed point $x \in X$ let ${ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m} \subset \infty \mathcal{W}_{n, m}$ be the closed stack given by fixing $x$.

In Section 7 we will define Hecke functors

$$
\begin{align*}
& \left.{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow},{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{-}: \operatorname{Sph}_{H} \times \mathrm{D}^{b}{ }_{(x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right)  \tag{11}\\
& { }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow},{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\rightarrow}: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right) \tag{12}
\end{align*}
$$

and their family versions acting on $\mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{\infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right)$. Set

$$
\begin{equation*}
I=\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)_{W_{n, m}}\left[\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{m}+\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{n}+a_{n, m}\right] \tag{13}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $a_{n, m}$ is a function of a connected component of $W_{n, m}$ defined above. View $I$ as a complex on $\mathcal{W}_{n, m}$ extended by zero to $x_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{n, m}$. Write also $\infty \mathcal{I}$ for $\mathcal{I} \boxtimes \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}[1]$ over $\mathcal{W}_{n, m} \times X$ extended by zero to $\infty W_{n, m}$. We will derive Theorem 5 from the following 'Hecke property' of $\vartheta$.

Theorem 6. - The two functors $\operatorname{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{\infty} \mathcal{W}_{m, n}\right)$ given by

$$
\mathcal{T} \mapsto{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, \infty_{\infty} \mathcal{J}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \mathcal{G} \mapsto{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\mathcal{T}), \infty_{\infty} \mathcal{J}\right)
$$

are isomorphic.

## 3. Classical setting and motivations

In Section 3 we assume $k=\mathbb{F}_{q}$.

### 3.1. Weil representation of $\mathrm{GL}_{m} \times \mathrm{GL}_{n}$

Let $U_{0}$ (resp., $L_{0}$ ) be a $k$-vector space of dimension $m$ (resp., $n$ ). For Section 3.1 set $G=$ $\mathrm{GL}\left(L_{0}\right)$ and $H=\operatorname{GL}\left(U_{0}\right)$. Let $\Pi_{0}=U_{0} \otimes L_{0}$ and $\Pi=\Pi_{0}(\theta)$.

Let $x \in X$ be a closed point. Recall that the Weil representation of $G\left(F_{x}\right) \times H\left(F_{x}\right)$ can be realized in the Schwarz space $\delta\left(\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ of locally constant compactly supported $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-valued functions on $\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)$. The action of $G\left(F_{x}\right) \times H\left(F_{x}\right)$ on this space comes from its natural action on $\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)$.

Write $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ for the Hecke algebra of the pair $\left(G\left(F_{x}\right), G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)\right)$, and similarly for $\mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$. Recall that $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ identifies canonically with the Grothendieck group $K(\operatorname{Rep}(\breve{G}))$ of the category $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ of $\check{G}$-representations over $\overline{\mathbb{Q}} \ell$.

The space of invariants $\delta\left(\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)\right)^{G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right) \times H\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)}$ is naturally a module over $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G) \otimes \mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$. Let $\phi_{0} \in \delta(\Pi(F))$ be the characteristic function of $\Pi(\theta)$. The following result is well known (cf. [22], [23]), in Section 5 we prove its geometric version.

Lemma 3. - Assume $m \geq n$. The map $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G) \rightarrow \phi(\Pi(F))^{(G \times H)\left(\Theta_{x}\right)}$ sending $h$ to $h \phi_{0}$ is an isomorphism of $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$-modules. There is a homomorphism $\kappa: \mathscr{H}_{x}(H) \rightarrow \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ such that the $\mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$-action on $\delta\left(\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)\right)^{G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right) \times H\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)}$ factors through $\kappa$.

For $n=m$ the homomorphism $\kappa$ comes from the functor $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{H}) \rightarrow \operatorname{Rep}(\check{G})$ of restriction with respect to an isomorphism $\check{G} \rightrightarrows \breve{H}$. For $m \geq n$ we will see that $\kappa$ comes from the functor $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{H}) \rightarrow \operatorname{Rep}\left(\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right) \rightrightarrows \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ of restriction with respect to a homomorphism $\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$. For $m>n+1$ the restriction of this homomorphism to $\mathbb{G}_{m}$ is nontrivial.

### 3.2. Weil representation of $\mathrm{SO}_{2 m} \times \mathbb{S p}_{2 n}$

3.2.1. - In this subsection we introduce some objects on the level of functions whose geometric analogs are used in the proof of Theorem 3. Keep the notation of Section 2.3. Let $U_{0}=\emptyset_{X}^{m}$ and $V_{0}=U_{0} \oplus U_{0}^{*}$; we equip $V_{0}$ with the symmetric form $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} V_{0} \rightarrow \Theta_{X}$ given by the pairing between $U_{0}$ and $U_{0}^{*}$, so $U_{0}$ and $U_{0}^{*}$ are isotropic subbundles in $V_{0}$. Think of $V_{0}$ as the standard representation of $H$.

Let $P(H) \subset H$ be the parabolic subgroup preserving $U_{0}$, let $U(H) \subset P(H)$ be its unipotent radical, so $U(H) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \wedge^{2} U_{0}$ canonically.

Let $L_{0}=\theta_{X}^{n}$ and $M_{0}=L_{0} \oplus L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega$. We equip $M_{0}$ the symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M_{0} \rightarrow \Omega$ given by the pairing $L_{0}$ with $L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega$. So, $L_{0}$ and $L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega$ are lagrangian subbundles in $M_{0}$. Recall that $G$ is the group scheme over $X$ of automorphisms of $M_{0}$ preserving the symplectic form.

Let $P(G) \subset G$ be the parabolic subgroup preserving $L_{0}$, write $U(G) \subset P(G)$ for its unipotent radical. We have $U(G) \rightrightarrows \Omega^{-1} \otimes \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L_{0}$ canonically.

Set $\mathcal{M}_{0}=V_{0} \otimes M_{0}$, it is equipped with a symplectic form, which is the tensor product of forms on $V_{0}$ and $M_{0}$.

Set $F=k(X)$. Let $\mathbb{A}$ be the adèles ring of $F, Q \subset \mathbb{A}$ be the entire adèles. Let $\chi: \Omega(\mathbb{A}) / \Omega(F) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{*}$ denote the character

\chi(\omega)=\psi\left(\sum_{x \in X} \operatorname{tr}_{k(x) / k} \operatorname{Res} \omega_{x}\right)
$$

Let $\mathrm{Hs}=\mathcal{M}_{0} \oplus \Omega$ be the Heisenberg group over $X$ constructed out of the symplectic bundle $\mathcal{M}_{0}$. The product in Hs is given by

\left(m_{1}, \omega_{1}\right)\left(m_{2}, \omega_{2}\right)=\left(m_{1}+m_{2}, \omega_{1}+\omega_{2}+\frac{1}{2}\left\langle m_{1}, m_{2}\right\rangle\right)
$$

For the generalities on the metaplectic extension $\widetilde{\operatorname{Sp}}\left(\mathcal{M}_{0}\right)$ of $\mathbb{S p}\left(\mathcal{M}_{0}\right)$ and its Weil representation we refer the reader to [19]. The natural $\operatorname{map} G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \mathbb{S p}\left(\mathcal{M}_{0}\right)(\mathbb{A})$ lifts naturally to a homomorphism $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}\left(\mathcal{M}_{0}\right)(\mathbb{A})$. We use two Schrödinger models of the corresponding Weil representation of $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A})$.

Set $\mathscr{L}_{0}=V_{0} \otimes L_{0} \subset V_{0} \otimes M_{0}$; this is a Lagrangian subbundle in $\mathcal{M}_{0}$. Let

\chi_{\mathscr{L}}: \mathscr{L}_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{*}
$$

denote the character $\chi_{\mathscr{L}}(u, \omega)=\chi(\omega)$. Let $\wp_{\mathscr{L}, \psi}$ denote the induced representation of $\left(\mathcal{L}_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A}), \chi_{\mathscr{L}}\right)$ to $\operatorname{Hs}(\mathbb{A})$. By definition, $\delta_{\mathscr{L}, \psi}$ is the space of functions $f: \operatorname{Hs}(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ satisfying:
$-f(a h)=\chi_{\mathscr{L}}(a) f(h)$ for $a \in \mathscr{L}_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A}), h \in \operatorname{Hs}(\mathbb{A}) ;$

- there is an open subgroup $U \subset \mathcal{M}_{0}(\mathbb{A})$ such that $f(h(u, 0))=f(h)$ for $u \in U$, $h \in \operatorname{Hs}(\mathbb{A})$;
- $f$ is of compact support modulo $\mathscr{L}_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A})$.

For a free $\mathbb{A}$-module (or free $F_{x}$-module) $R$ of finite type denote by $\gamma(R)$ the Schwarz space of locally constant compactly supported $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-valued functions on $R$. We have an isomorphism $\beta_{\mathcal{L}, \psi} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right)$ sending $f$ to $\phi$ given by $\phi(v)=f(v, 0)$, $v \in V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})$.

The theta-functional

$$
\Theta_{\mathscr{L}}: \psi\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}
$$

is given by

\Theta_{\mathscr{L}}(\phi)=\sum_{v \in V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)} \phi(v) \quad \text { for } \phi \in \phi\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right)
$$

Set $U_{0}=U_{0} \otimes M_{0}$; this is a Lagrangian subbundle in $\mathcal{M}_{0}$. Let

\chi_{u}: U_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A}) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}^{*}
$$

be the character $\chi_{u}(u, \omega)=\chi(\omega)$. Let $\delta_{u, \psi}$ denote the induced representation of $\left(U_{0}(\mathbb{A}) \oplus \Omega(\mathbb{A}), \chi_{u}\right)$ to $\operatorname{Hs}(\mathbb{A})$. As above, we identify it with the Schwarz space $\&\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})\right)$.

The theta-functional $\Theta_{\mathcal{U}}: \phi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})\right) \rightarrow \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ is given by

\Theta_{u}(\phi)=\sum_{t \in U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(F)} \phi(t) \quad \text { for } \phi \in \phi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})\right) .

For a locally free $\theta_{X}$-module $\mathscr{y}$ of finite type write $\chi(\mathscr{y})$ for the Euler characteristic of $\mathscr{Y}$. Set $\epsilon=q^{\chi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes L_{0}\right)}$. Let us construct a diagram of $H(\mathbb{A}) \times G(\mathbb{A})$-representations

\delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right), & \nearrow \theta_{\ell}
\end{align*}

where $H(\mathbb{A}) \times G(\mathbb{A})$ acts on the space of functions Funct $((H \times G)(F) \backslash(H \times G)(\mathbb{A}))$ by right translations. The map $\theta_{u}$ sends $\phi$ to $\theta_{u, \phi}$ given by $\theta_{u, \phi}(h, g)=\Theta_{u}((h, g) \phi)$. The map $\theta_{\mathcal{L}}$ sends $\phi$ to $\theta_{\mathscr{L}, \phi}$ given by

\theta_{\mathscr{L}, \phi}(h, g)=\Theta_{\mathscr{L}}((h, g) \phi) .
$$

For $\phi \in \delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right)$ let $\zeta \phi \in \delta\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})\right)$ be given by

(\zeta \phi)(b)=\int_{U_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})} \chi\left(\left\langle a, b_{1}\right\rangle\right) \phi\left(a+b_{2}\right) d a . \tag{15}

Here for $b \in U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})$ we write $b=b_{1}+b_{2}$ with $b_{1} \in U_{0}^{*} \otimes L_{0}(\mathbb{A})$ and $b_{2} \in U_{0}^{*} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})$, and $d a$ is the Haar measure on $U_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})$ normalized by requiring that the volume of $U_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\theta)$ is one. It is known that $\zeta$ is an isomorphism of $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A})$-modules (cf. [22]).

Let $\phi_{0, u}$ (resp., $\phi_{0, \mathscr{L}}$ ) be the characteristic function of $U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\theta)$ (resp., of $\left.V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\theta)\right)$. An easy calculation shows that $\zeta \phi_{0, \mathscr{L}}=\phi_{0, \psi}$.

Lemma 4. - The diagram (14) commutes.
Proof. - We have $\Theta_{\mathscr{L}}\left(\phi_{0, \mathscr{L}}\right)=q^{\operatorname{dim} H^{0}\left(X, V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\right)}$ and $\Theta_{\mathcal{U}}\left(\phi_{0}, u\right)=q^{\operatorname{dim} H^{0}\left(X, U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\right)}$. Since

\operatorname{dim} \mathrm{H}^{0}\left(X, U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\right)=\chi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes L_{0}\right)+\operatorname{dim} \mathrm{H}^{0}\left(X, V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\right),
$$

we get $\Theta_{\mathcal{U}} \circ \zeta=\epsilon \Theta_{\mathscr{L}}$. Since $\zeta$ is an isomorphism of $G(\mathbb{A}) \times H(\mathbb{A})$-modules, our assertion follows.

Write $\mathcal{H}(H)$ for the Hecke algebra of the pair $(H(\theta), H(\mathbb{A}))$, and similarly for $G$. Passing to the $(G \times H)(\theta)$-invariants, one gets from (14) the commutative diagram

of $\mathscr{H}(H) \otimes \mathscr{H}(G)$-modules. The notation $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ is that of Section 2.3.1.
Let $\phi_{0} \in \operatorname{Funct}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}(k)\right)$ be the function trace of Frobenius of Aut ${ }_{G, H}$. Then $\theta_{u} \phi_{0, u}$ equals $\phi_{0}$ up to a multiple.

For $x \in X$ let $\phi_{0, u, x} \in \phi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ be the characteristic function of $U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)$, let $\phi_{0, \mathscr{L}, x} \in \phi\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ be the characteristic function of $V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)$.

Denote by $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ the Hecke algebra of the pair $\left(G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right), G\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$, and similarly for $H$. Recall the decomposition as a restricted tensor product

\mathscr{H}(G) \widetilde{\rightrightarrows} \underset{x \in X}{\otimes^{\prime}} \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)

Similarly, we have

In view of this isomorphism $\delta\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}(\mathbb{A})\right)$ is generated as a $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-vector space by functions of the form $\otimes_{x} \phi_{x}$ with $\phi_{x} \in \phi\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$, where $\phi_{x}=\phi_{0, u, x}$ for all but finite number of $x \in X$.

In particular, we have a canonical diagram

\uparrow \zeta_{x} & \uparrow \zeta \\
\delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)\right)^{(H \times G)\left(\theta_{x}\right)} & \hookrightarrow \delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})\right)^{(H \times G)(\theta)},
\end{array}
$$

where $\zeta_{x}$ is given by (15) with $U_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega(\mathbb{A})$ replaced by $U_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)$.
Set

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \text { Weil }_{G, H}(k)=\left\{\left(f_{1}, f_{2}\right) \mid f_{1} \in \delta\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)\right)^{(H \times G)\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)},\right. \\
& \left.\qquad f_{2} \in \delta\left(U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}\left(F_{x}\right)\right)^{(H \times G)\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)} \text { such that } \zeta_{x}\left(f_{1}\right)=f_{2}\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

The Hecke property of $\phi_{0}$ (a classical analog of Theorem 4) is as follows.
Proposition 1. - 1) Assume $m \leq n$. There is a homomorphism $\kappa: \mathscr{H}_{x}(G) \rightarrow \mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$ such that for $h \in \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ we have

2) Assume $m>n$. There is a homomorphism $\kappa: \mathscr{H}_{x}(H) \rightarrow \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ such that for $h \in \mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$ we have

{ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(h, \phi_{0}\right)={ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}\left(\kappa(h), \phi_{0}\right) .
$$

The above discussion reduces the proof of Proposition 1 to the following local result.
Proposition 2. - 1) Assume $m \leq n$. There is a homomorphism $\kappa: \mathscr{H}_{x}(G) \rightarrow \mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$ such that for $h \in \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ we have

Moreover, Weil $G_{G, H}(k)$ is a free module of rank one over $\mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$ generated by $\phi_{0, \mathscr{L}, x}$.
2) Assume $m>n$. There is a homomorphism $\kappa: \mathscr{H}_{x}(H) \rightarrow \mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ such that for $h \in \mathscr{H}_{x}(H)$ we have

\zeta_{x}\left({ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(h, \phi_{0, \mathscr{L}, x}\right)\right)={ }_{x} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\vec{~}}\left(\kappa(h), \phi_{0, u, x}\right) .
$$

Moreover, $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}(k)$ is a free module of rank one over $\mathscr{H}_{x}(G)$ generated by $\phi_{0, u, x}$.

To the author's best knowledge, there are three different proofs of Proposition 2 available in the literature. First part of both statements 1) and 2) is proved by Rallis ([23]) by some explicit calculation based on the following description of the Jacquet module. By ([14], Lemma 5.1) we have an isomorphism of $\mathrm{GL}\left(L_{0}\right)\left(F_{x}\right) \times H\left(F_{x}\right)$-representations

Here $\operatorname{Cr}\left(V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)\right) \subset V_{0} \otimes L_{0}^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)$ is the subset of maps $v: L_{0}\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow V_{0} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)$ such that $s_{\mathscr{L}}(v)=0$, where $s_{\mathscr{L}}(v)$ denotes the composition

$$
s_{L}(v): \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L_{0}\left(F_{x}\right) \xrightarrow{\operatorname{Sym}^{2} v} \operatorname{Sym}^{2}\left(V_{0} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{x}\right)\right) \rightarrow \Omega^{2}\left(F_{x}\right) .
$$

A different proof due to Howe is found in [22], where the space $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}$ is described completely (a revisited version is given in [12]). One more proof is given by Kudla in [15]. Namely, in [14] it was shown that the Howe correspondence is compatible with the parabolic induction, this allows one to describe explicitely the image of a principal series representation under the Howe correspondence (cf. [15], Proposition 3.2, p. 96), hence, to derive the functoriality ([15], Theorem on p. 105).
3.2.2. - In Section 6 we prove Theorem 7, which is a geometric analogue of Proposition 2. The main difficulty is that the existing proofs of Proposition 2 do not geometrize in an obvious way. Our approach, though inspired by [23], is somewhat different.

One more feature is that classical proofs of Proposition 2 do not reveal a relation with the $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur, though it is believed to be relevant here (cf. the conjectures of Adams in [1]). In our approach at least the maximal torus of $\mathrm{SL}_{2}$ of Arthur appears naturally. In Section 8 we derive Theorem 4 from Theorem 7.

## 4. Geometric model of the Schwarz space and Hecke functors

4.1. - Set $\theta=k[[t]] \subset F=k((t))$, write $D^{*}=\operatorname{Spec} F \subset D=\operatorname{Spec} \theta$. Let $\Omega$ be the completed module of relative differentials of $\theta$ over $k$.

For a free $\theta$-module $M$ of finite rank we introduce the categories $P(M(F)) \subset \mathrm{D}(M(F))$ as follows. For $N, r \geq 0$ set ${ }_{N, r} M=t^{-N} M / t^{r} M$. Given positive integers $N_{1} \geq N_{2}, r_{1} \geq r_{2}$ we have a cartesian diagram

N_{2}, r_{1} M \stackrel{i}{\hookrightarrow} & N_{1}, r_{1} M  \tag{18}\\
\downarrow p & \downarrow p \\

\end{array}
$$

where $i$ is the natural closed immersion, and $p$ is the projection.
By ([9], Lemma 4.8), the functor $\mathrm{D}\left({ }_{N, r_{2}} M\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left({ }_{N, r_{1}} M\right)$ given by $K \mapsto p^{*} K[\operatorname{dim} . \operatorname{rel}(p)]$ is fully faithful and exact for the perverse $t$-structures, and similarly for the functor $i_{*}$. These functors yield a diagram of full triangulated subcategories

$$

\mathrm{D}\left(N_{2}, r_{1} M\right) & \uparrow \mathrm{D}\left(N_{1}, r_{1} M\right) \\
\uparrow & \uparrow  \tag{19}\\
\mathrm{D}\left(N_{2}, r_{2} M\right) & \hookrightarrow \mathrm{D}\left({ }_{N_{1}, r_{2}} M\right) .
\end{array}
$$

We let $\mathrm{P}(M(F))$ (resp., $\mathrm{D}(M(F))$ ) be the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{P}\left({ }_{N, r} M\right)$ (resp., of $\mathrm{D}\left({ }_{N, r} M\right)$ ) as $r, N$ go to infinity. The category $\mathrm{P}(M(F))$ is a geometric analog of the Schwarz space of locally constant functions with compact support on $M(F)$.

Set ${ }_{N} M=t^{-N} M$ viewed as a $k$-scheme (not of finite type).
4.2.1. - Let $G$ be a connected reductive group over $k$, assume that $M=M_{0} \otimes_{k} \theta$, where $M_{0}$ is a given finite-dimensional representation of $G$.

For $N+r>0$ the group $G(\theta)$ acts on $N, r M$ via its finite-dimensional quotient $G\left(\theta / t^{N+r} \theta\right)$. For $r_{1} \geq N+r>0$ the kernel of $G\left(\theta / t^{r_{1}} \theta\right) \rightarrow G\left(\theta / t^{N+r} \theta\right)$ is a contractible unipotent group. So, the projection between the stack quotients

The stack quotient of (18) by $G\left(\theta / t^{N_{1}+r_{1}} \theta\right)$ yields a diagram

where each arrow is a fully faithful (and exact for the perverse t -structures) functor. Define $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}(M(F))$ as the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}(N, r M)$ as $N, r$ go to infinity. Write $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F))$ for the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(N, r M)$ as $N, r$ go to infinity.

Since $G\left(\theta / t^{N+r} \theta\right)$ is connected, the category $\mathrm{P}_{G(\theta)}(N, r M)$ of $G\left(\theta / t^{N+r} \theta\right)$-equivariant perverse sheaves on ${ }_{N, r} M$ is a full subcategory of $\mathrm{P}\left({ }_{N, r} M\right)$. The category $\mathrm{P}_{G(\theta)}(M(F))$ is defined along the same lines. A similar construction has been used in ([13]).

Since the Verdier duality is compatible with the transition functors in (20) and (19), we have the Verdier duality self-functors $\mathbb{D}$ on $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F))$ and on $\mathrm{D}(M(F))$, they preserve perversity.
4.2.2. - Write $\mathrm{Gr}_{G}$ for the affine Grassmanian $G(F) / G(\theta)$ of $G$. Let us define the equivariant derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(M(F) \times \mathrm{Gr}_{G}\right)$.

For $s_{1}^{\prime} \geq s_{1}, s_{2}^{\prime} \geq s_{2}$ we have a closed embedding $s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{G} \hookrightarrow s_{1}^{\prime}, s_{2}^{\prime} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$, and the union of all $s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ is $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}$. The map $g \mapsto g^{-1}$ yields an isomorphism $s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} G(F) \widetilde{s_{s_{2}, s_{1}} G(F) .}$

Assume for simplicity that $M_{0}$ is a faithful $G$-module, then the action of $G(0)$ on $s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ factors through an action of $G\left(\theta / t^{s_{1}+s_{2}}\right)$.

For $N, r, s_{1}, s_{2} \geq 0$ and $s \geq \max \left\{N+r, s_{1}+s_{2}\right\}$ we have the equivariant derived category

As in Section 4.2.1, define $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(M(F) \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ as the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left({ }_{N, r} M \times{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$. The subcategory of perverse sheaves

The connected components of $\mathrm{Gr}_{G}$ are indexed by $\pi_{1}(G)$. For $\theta \in \pi_{1}(G)$ the component $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}$ is the one containing $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$ for any $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$whose image in $\pi_{1}(G)$ equals $\theta$. For $\theta \in \pi_{1}(G)$ set ${s_{1}, s_{2}}^{\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}}=\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta} \cap_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$.

In the rest of Section 4.3.1 we construct an inverse image functor

Here act sends $(m, g)$ to $g^{-1} m$, the map $q_{G}$ sends $(m, g)$ to $(m, g G(\theta))$, and $\mathrm{pr}, \mathrm{pr}_{2}$ denote the projections. All the vertical arrows are the stack quotient maps for the action of a
corresponding group. One checks that act descends to a map act ${ }_{q}$ between the corresponding quotients.

For $s \geq \max \left\{s_{1}+s_{2}, N+r\right\}$ the group $G\left(\theta / t^{s} \theta\right)$ acts diagonally on ${ }_{N, r} M \times{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$, and $\mathrm{act}_{q}$ is equivariant with respect to this action. Consider the functors

From (23) one gets that the functors (25) commute with the Verdier duality, namely

Remark 1. - Call $K \in \mathrm{P}_{G(\theta)}\left({ }_{R} M\right)$ smooth if it comes from a $G(0)$-equivariant local system on ${ }_{R, r} M$ for some $r$. Let us make the above definition explicit in this case.

Let us above $\check{\mu} \in \check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$denote the character $\operatorname{det} M_{0}$, so the virtual dimension $\operatorname{dim}(M / g M)=\langle\theta, \check{\mu}\rangle$ for $g G(\theta) \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}$. Let $\mathcal{T} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ be the extension by zero from $s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$. For $r$ large enough, let ${ }_{R, r} M \tilde{\times}_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ be the scheme of pairs $(m, g G(\theta))$ with $g G(\theta) \in s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ and $m \in t^{-R} g M / t^{r} M$. Then $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{-}(\mathscr{T}, K)=\operatorname{pr}_{!}(K \tilde{\otimes} \mathscr{G})$. We see once again that indeed the shift in (24) must depend on $\check{\mu}$.
4.4. - Let $I_{0}$ denote the constant sheaf $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ on ${ }_{0,0} M$, this is an object of $P_{G(\theta)}(M(F))$. For $K=I_{0}$ the above definition of $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}(K)$ simplifies as follows.

Assume that all the weights of $M_{0}$ are less than or equal to a $G$-dominant weight $\check{\lambda}$. Then for a dominant coweight $\lambda$ of $G$ we have $\overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \subset{ }_{r, N} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ and $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(N, r M)$ with $r=\langle\lambda, \check{\lambda}\rangle$ and $N=\left\langle-w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\lambda}\right\rangle$.

Let $M \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}$ be the scheme classifying pairs $g G(\theta) \in \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}, m \in g M$. Let $\pi_{\text {pro }}: M \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{N} M$ be the map sending $(m, g G(\theta))$ to $m \in{ }_{N} M$. Write ${ }_{0, r} M \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}$ for the scheme classifying $g G(\theta) \in \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}, m \in g M / t^{r} M$. The map $\pi_{\text {pro }}$ gives rise to a proper map

\pi:{ }_{0, r} M \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{N, r} M \tag{26}
\end{equation*}
$$

sending $(m, g G(\theta))$ to $m$. By Remark $1, \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)$ identifies with $\pi_{!}\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \tilde{\boxtimes} \mathscr{Q}_{G}^{\lambda}\right)\left[\operatorname{dim}_{0, r} M\right]$.
4.5. - The group of automorphisms of the $k$-algebra $\theta$ is naturally the group of $k$-points of a (reduced) affine group scheme $\operatorname{Aut}^{0} \theta$ over $k$. The group scheme $\operatorname{Aut}^{0} \theta$ acts naturally on $M(F), G(F), G(\theta)$ and $\mathrm{Gr}_{G}$. We write $\delta:$ Aut $^{0} \Theta \times M(F) \rightarrow M(F)$ and $\delta:$ Aut $^{0} \Theta \times G(F) \rightarrow G(F)$ for the corresponding action maps, and $G(F) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0} \ominus$ for the corresponding semi-direct product with operation

$$
\left(g_{1}, c_{1}\right)\left(g_{2}, c_{2}\right)=\left(g_{1} \delta\left(c_{1}, g_{2}\right), c_{1} c_{2}\right), \quad c_{i} \in \operatorname{Aut}^{0} \Theta, g_{i} \in G(F) .
$$

Then $G(F) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0} \vartheta$ acts on $M(F)$ via the map $\left(G(F) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0} \theta\right) \times M(F) \rightarrow M(F)$ sending $((g, c), m)$ to $g \delta(c, m)$. For $r>0$ we similarly have a semi-direct product $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right) \rtimes$ $\operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$ and a surjective homomorphism $G(\theta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}(\theta) \rightarrow G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$, whose kernel is pro-unipotent.

Let us define the equivariant derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta) \rtimes \text { Aut }^{0}}{ }_{\theta}(M(F))$. As in 4.2, for $r_{1} \geq N+r>0$ the projection between the stack quotients

yields an (exact for the perverse $t$-structures) equivalence of the equivariant derived categories

\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}(N, r M) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{r_{1}}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{r_{1}}\right)}(N, r M) .
$$

Denote by $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0} \theta}(N, r M)$ the equivariant derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{r_{1}}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{r_{1}}\right)}(N, r M)$ for any $r_{1} \geq N+r$.

The stack quotient of (18) by $G\left(\theta / t^{N_{1}+r_{1}}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{N_{1}+r_{1}}\right)$ yields a diagram

& \left.\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \text { Aut }^{0} \vartheta\left(N_{2}, r_{1}\right.} M\right) \hookrightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0} \Theta}\left(N_{1}, r_{1} M\right) \\
& \uparrow \quad \uparrow  \tag{27}\\
& \left.\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0}} \theta\left(N_{2}, r_{2} M\right) \hookrightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0} \Theta\left(N_{1}, r_{2}\right.} M\right),
\end{align*}
$$

where each arrow is a fully faithful (and exact for the perverse $t$-structures) functor. Define $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{\mathrm{o}} \theta}(M(F))$ as the inductive 2-limit of $\left.\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{\mathrm{o}} \theta(N, r} M\right)$ as $N, r$ go to infinity. Similarly, one defines the category of perverse sheaves

As in 4.3, one defines a natural action of $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ on $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0}}^{b}(M(F))$. For our purposes note that the map (26) is $\operatorname{Aut}^{0} \Theta$-equivariant, so that all the perverse cohomologies of $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)$ are objects of $\mathrm{P}_{G(\theta) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0} \theta}(M(F))$.
4.6. - If $X$ is a smooth projective connected curve and $x \in X$ then one can consider the following global version of the category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(M(F))$.

Let ${ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}$ be a stack classifying a $G$-torsor $\mathscr{F}_{G}$ on $X$ together with a section $\theta_{X} \xrightarrow{s} M_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}(\infty x)$. The stack $x, \infty W_{G}$ is ind-algebraic. We have a diagram

$$
x, \infty \mathcal{W}_{G} \stackrel{h_{W}^{\overleftarrow{W}}}{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G} \times_{\operatorname{Bun}_{G} x} \mathscr{H}_{G} \xrightarrow{h_{W}^{\vec{W}}}{ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}
$$

where we used $h_{G}^{\overleftarrow{~}}$ to define the fibre product, the map $h_{W}^{\overleftarrow{ }}$ (resp., $h_{\vec{W}}$ ) sends $\left(\mathscr{F}_{G}, \mathscr{F}_{G}^{\prime}, \beta, \ominus_{X} \xrightarrow{s} M_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}(\infty x)\right)$ to $\left(\mathscr{F}_{G}, s\right)$ (resp., to $\left(\mathscr{F}_{G}^{\prime}, s^{\prime}\right)$ with $s^{\prime}=s \circ \beta$ ). As in Sections 2.1.1 and 4.3, one defines the Hecke functors

$$
\left.\left.\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\cdot, \cdot), \mathrm{H}_{G}(\cdot, \cdot): \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{b}{ }_{(x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}{ }_{(x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right) .
$$

Let ${ }_{x, \leq N} W_{G} \subset{ }_{x, \infty} W_{G}$ be the closed substack given by requiring that $\theta_{X} \xrightarrow{s} M_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}(N x)$ is regular.

For $r \geq 1$ let $D_{r, x}=\operatorname{Spec} \theta_{x} / t_{x}^{r}$, where $\theta_{x}$ is the completed local ring at $x \in X$, and $t_{x} \in \Theta_{x}$ is a local parameter. Pick a trivialization $\theta_{x} \widetilde{\rightarrow}$. For $N, r \geq 0$ it yields a map

{ }_{N, r} p_{W}: x_{x, \leq N} \mathcal{W}_{G} \rightarrow G\left(\Theta / t^{N+r}\right) \backslash_{N, r} M
$$

sending $\left(\mathscr{F}_{G}, \Theta_{X} \xrightarrow{t} M_{\mathscr{G}_{G}}(N x)\right) \quad$ to $\left.\mathscr{F}_{G}\right|_{D_{N+r, x}} \quad$ equipped with the induced $G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)$-equivariant map $\left.\mathscr{F}_{G}\right|_{D_{N+r, x}} \rightarrow{ }_{N, r} M$. We get a functor $\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}^{b}(N, r M) \rightarrow$ $\left.\mathrm{D}^{b}{ }_{(x, \leq N} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right)$ given by

K \mapsto{ }_{N, r} p_{W}^{*} K\left[a+\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{G}+N \operatorname{dim} M_{0}-\operatorname{dim} G\left(\Theta / t^{N+r}\right) \backslash_{N, r} M\right] ;
$$

here $a$ is a function of a connected component of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ sending $\mathcal{F}_{G}$ to $\chi\left(M_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}\right)$. The shift in the above formula should be thought of as 'the corrected relative dimension' of ${ }_{N, r} p_{\mathcal{W}}$, over a suitable open substack of $x, \leq N \mathcal{W}_{G}$ it is indeed the relative dimension. These functors are compatible with the transition functors in (20), thus we get a well defined functor

\operatorname{glob}_{x}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right),
$$

here glob stands for 'globalization'. One checks that it commutes with the functors $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}, \mathrm{H}_{G}$. Along the same lines, one defines a functor $\left.\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0} \vartheta}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}{ }_{(x, \infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right)$ that does not depend on a choice of a trivialization $\theta_{x} \widetilde{ } \rightarrow$.

Write $\infty \mathcal{W}_{G}$ for the stack classifying $x \in X$, a $G$-torsor $\mathscr{F}_{G}$ on $X$, and a section $s: \vartheta_{X} \rightarrow M_{\mathscr{F}_{G}}(\infty x)$. As above, one defines the Hecke functors

$$
\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\cdot, \cdot), \mathrm{H}_{G}(\cdot, \cdot): \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\infty \mathcal{W}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\infty_{\infty} \mathcal{W}_{G}\right)
$$

Let ${ }_{\leq N} \mathcal{W}_{G} \subset{ }_{\infty} W_{G}$ be the closed substack given by the condition that $s: \theta_{X} \rightarrow M_{\mathscr{G}_{G}}(N x)$ is regular. Along the same lines one gets a map

$$
\leq N W_{G} \rightarrow\left(G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\Theta / t^{N+r}\right)\right) \backslash_{N, r} M,
$$

the corresponding functors

$$
\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}^{b}\left(N_{N, r} M\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\leq N W_{G}\right)
$$

are compatible with the transition functors in (27). The resulting functor

\operatorname{glob}_{\infty}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta) \rtimes \operatorname{Aut}^{0}(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\infty \mathcal{W}_{G}\right)
$$

commutes with the action of $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}, \mathrm{H}_{G}$.

### 4.7. Weak analogues of Jacquet functors

4.7.1. - Let $P \subset G$ be a parabolic subgroup, $U \subset P$ its unipotent radical and $L=P / U$ the Levi quotient. In classical setting, an important tool is the Jacquet module $\delta(M(F))_{U(F)}$ of coinvariants with respect to $U(F)$. We do not know how to geometrize the whole Jacquet module. However, let $V_{0} \subset M_{0}$ be a $P$-invariant subspace, on which $U$ acts trivially. Set $V=V_{0}(\theta)$. We have a surjective map of $L(F)$-representations $\&(M(F))_{U(F)} \rightarrow \&(V(F))$ given by restriction under $V(F) \hookrightarrow M(F)$. We rather geometrize the composition map $\delta(M(F)) \rightarrow \delta(M(F))_{U(F)} \rightarrow \delta(V(F))$.

As in 4.2 , we have the derived categories $\mathrm{D}(V(F)), \mathrm{D}_{L(\theta)}(V(F))$. We are going to define natural functors

$$
\begin{equation*}
J_{P}^{*}, J_{P}^{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{L(\vartheta)}(V(F)) \tag{28}
\end{equation*}
$$

they will preserve boundedness of a complex. To do so, for $N+r \geq 0$ consider the natural closed embedding $i_{N, r}:{ }_{N, r} V \hookrightarrow{ }_{N, r} M$. Recall that ${ }_{N, r} V=t^{-N} V / t^{r} V$. Consider the diagram of stack quotients

where $p$ comes from the inclusion $P \subset G$ and $q$ is the natural quotient map. Using (29), define functors

J_{P}^{*}, J_{P}^{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}(N, r) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{L\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}(N, r)
$$

by

& q^{*} \circ J_{P}^{*}[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}(q)]=\left(i_{N, r}\right)^{*} p^{*}[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}(p)-r a] \\
& q^{*} \circ J_{P}^{!}[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}(q)]=\left(i_{N, r}\right)^{!} p^{*}[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}(p)+r a]
\end{aligned}
$$

Since $q^{*}[\operatorname{dim} . \operatorname{rel}(q)]: \mathrm{D}_{L\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}(N, r V) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{P\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)}\left({ }_{N, r} V\right)$ is an equivalence (exact for the perverse t-structures), the functors $J_{P}^{*}, J_{P}^{!}$are well defined. Here we have set $a=\operatorname{dim} M_{0}-\operatorname{dim} V_{0}$.

Further, $J_{P}^{*}, J_{P}^{!}$are compatible with the transition functors in (20), so they give rise to the desired functors (28). We underline that $J_{P}^{*}, J_{P}^{!}$do not depend on a choice of a section of $P \rightarrow P / U$. Note also that $\mathbb{D} \circ J_{P}^{*} \widetilde{\rightarrow} J_{P}^{!} \circ \mathbb{D}$ naturally.
4.7.2. - Due to its importance, recall the definition of the geometric restriction functor $\operatorname{gRes}_{L}^{G}: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \operatorname{Sph}_{L}$ from ([5], Proposition 4.3.3). The diagram $L \leftarrow P \rightarrow G$ yields by functoriality the diagram

\mathrm{Gr}_{L} \stackrel{\mathfrak{t}_{P}}{\rightleftarrows} \mathrm{Gr}_{P} \xrightarrow{\mathfrak{t}_{G}} \mathrm{Gr}_{G}
$$

The connected components of $\mathrm{Gr}_{G}$ are indexed by $\pi_{1}(G)$. For $\theta \in \pi_{1}(G)$ the component $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}$ is the one containing $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$ for any $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$whose image in $\pi_{1}(G)$ equals $\theta$.

For $\theta \in \pi_{1}(L)$ let $\mathrm{Gr}_{P}^{\theta}$ be the preimage of $\mathrm{Gr}_{L}^{\theta}$ under $\mathfrak{t}_{P}$. The following strengthened version of ([5], Proposition 4.3.3) is derived from ([21], Theorem 3.5) (cf. also [3], Sections 5.3.275.3.30).
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Proposition 3. - For any $\& \in \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ and $\theta \in \pi_{1}(L)$ the complex

\left(\mathfrak{t}_{P}\right)!\left(\left.\delta\right|_{\operatorname{Gr}_{P}^{\theta}}\right)\left[\left\langle\theta, 2\left(\check{\rho}-\check{\rho}_{L}\right\rangle\right]\right.

lies in $\mathrm{Sph}_{L}$. The functor $\mathrm{gRes}_{L}^{G}: \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{Sph}_{L}$ given by

\& \mapsto \underset{\theta \in \pi_{1}(L)}{\oplus}\left(\mathfrak{t}_{P}\right)!\left(\left.\&\right|_{\operatorname{Gr}_{P}^{\theta}}\right)\left[\left\langle\theta, 2\left(\check{\rho}-\check{\rho}_{L}\right\rangle\right]\right.
$$

has a natural structure of a tensor functor. The following diagram is 2-commutative

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
\operatorname{Sph}_{G} & \xrightarrow{\operatorname{gRes}_{L}^{G}} & \operatorname{Sph}_{L} \\
\uparrow \operatorname{Loc} & & \uparrow \operatorname{Loc} \\
\operatorname{Rep}(\check{G}) \xrightarrow{\operatorname{Res}_{L}^{G}} & \operatorname{Rep}(\check{L}) .
\end{array}
$$

For the purposes of Lemma 5 below we renormalize $\operatorname{gRes}_{L}^{G}$ as follows. We let $\operatorname{gRes}_{L}^{G}: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{D} \operatorname{Sph}_{L}$ be given by $\operatorname{gRes}_{L}^{G}(\mathcal{T})=\left(\mathfrak{t}_{P}\right)!\mathrm{t}_{G}^{*} \mathcal{J}$.

Corollary 2. - The diagram is 2-commutative

where $\kappa_{0}: \check{L} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ is the map whose first component is a Levi factor $\check{L} \xrightarrow{i_{L}} \check{G}$, and the second is

\mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{2\left(\check{\rho}-\check{\rho}_{L}\right)} Z(\check{L}) \hookrightarrow \check{L} \stackrel{i_{L}}{\longrightarrow} \check{G} .

Here $Z(\check{L})$ is the center of $\check{L}$.
Write $\check{\mu}=\operatorname{det} M_{0}$ and $\check{\nu}=\operatorname{det} V_{0}$, view them as cocharacters of the center $Z(\check{L})$ of $\check{L}$. Let $\kappa: \check{L} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$ be the homomorphism, whose first component is $i_{L}: \check{L} \rightarrow \check{G}$, and the second component is $2\left(\check{\rho}-\check{\rho}_{L}\right)+\check{\mu}-\check{\nu}$. Let $\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{L}$ denote the corresponding geometric restriction functor.

Lemma 5. - For $\mathcal{T} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}, K \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F))$ there is a filtration on $J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K)$ in the derived category such that the corresponding graded complex identifies with

it is stable by left and right multiplication by $P(\theta)$, and ${ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{P}:=\left({ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} P(F)\right) / P(\theta)$ is closed in $\operatorname{Gr}_{P}$. We have a natural map $s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{P} \rightarrow s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$, and at the level of reduced schemes the connected components of $s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \mathrm{Gr}_{P}$ form a stratification of $s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \mathrm{Gr}_{G}$. Set

s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{L}=\left\{x \in L(\theta) \backslash L(F) \mid t^{s_{1}} V \subset x V \subset t^{-s_{2}} V\right\}
$$

The map $\mathfrak{t}_{P}: \operatorname{Gr}_{P} \rightarrow \operatorname{Gr}_{L}$ yields a map still denoted by $\mathfrak{t}_{P}:{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{P} \rightarrow{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{L}$.

Let $N, r \geq 0$, assume that $\mathcal{G}$ is the extension by zero from $s_{1}, s_{2} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$, and $K \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(N+s_{1}, r-s_{1} M\right)$. For the diagram

N, r M \stackrel{\mathrm{pr}}{\rightleftarrows}{ }_{N, r} M \times{s_{1}, s_{2}}^{\operatorname{Gr}_{G} \xrightarrow{\mathrm{act}_{q}} G\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \backslash_{N+s_{1}, r-s_{1}} M}
$$

we calculate the direct image

\operatorname{pr}_{!}\left(\operatorname{act}_{q}^{*} K \otimes \operatorname{pr}_{2}^{*} \mathscr{G}\right)[\operatorname{dim}]
$$

with respect to the stratification of ${s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ by the connected components of $s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{P}$. We have the diagram
where act sends $(m, p)$ to $p^{-1} m$, the map $q_{P}$ sends $(m, p)$ to $(m, p P(\theta))$, and $q_{U}$ is the stack quotient under the action of $P\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right)$. Moreover, act ${ }_{q, P}$ fits into the diagram

{ }_{N, r} V \times{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{P} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{act}_{q, P}} P\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \backslash_{N+s_{1}, r-s_{1}} V \\
\downarrow{\text { id } \times \mathfrak{t}_{P}}^{\downarrow q} \\
{ }_{N, r} V \times s_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{L} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{act}_{q, L}} L\left(\theta / t^{N+r}\right) \backslash_{N+s_{1}, r-s_{1}} V .
\end{gathered}
$$

Our assertion follows (the shifts can be checked using Remark 1).
Let $\delta_{U}: \mathbb{G}_{m} \times M_{0} \rightarrow M_{0}$ be an action, whose fixed points set is $V_{0}$. Assume that $\delta_{U}$ contracts $M_{0}$ onto $V_{0}$. We will apply Lemma 5 under the following form.

Corollary 3. - Let $K \in \mathrm{P}_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F))$ be $\mathbb{G}_{m}$-equivariant for a $\delta_{U}$-action on $M(F)$. Assume that $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K)$ is also $\mathbb{G}_{m}$-equivariant for a $\delta_{U}$-action on $M(F)$. Assume that $K$ admits a $k^{\prime}$-structure for some finite subfield $k^{\prime} \subset k$ and, as such, is pure of weight zero. Then $J_{P}^{*}(K)$ is also pure of weight zero, and there is an isomorphism

$$
J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K) \rightrightarrows \mathrm{H}_{L}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\mathscr{T}), J_{P}^{*}(K)\right)
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{L(\vartheta)}(V(F))$.
Proof. - Under our assumptions, $J_{P}^{*}$ is the hyperbolic localization functor with respect to the $\delta_{U}$-action on $M(F)$, the assertion follows from ([4], Theorem 2) and Lemma 5.

Remark 2. - In our applications $\delta_{U}$ will be of the form $\delta_{U}(x)=\nu(x) x^{-r}, x \in \mathbb{G}_{m}$, where $\nu: \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow L$ is a cocharacter of the center of $L$ acting on $V_{0}$ by $x \mapsto x^{r}$ for some $r \in \mathbb{Z}$. If $K \in \mathrm{P}_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F))$ is $\mathbb{G}_{m}$-equivariant under homotheties on $M(F)$ then both $K$ and $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K)$ are $\mathbb{G}_{m}$-equivariant for a $\delta_{U}$-action on $M(F)$.

### 4.8. Fourier transform

Recall the notation $\Omega$ from Section 4.1. Let us define the Fourier transform functors Four $_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right)$ and

\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) . \tag{30}

We actually will use the following a bit more general functor. Given a decomposition $M_{0} 工 M_{1} \oplus M_{2}$ into direct sum of vector spaces, one defines the Fourier transform

as follows. For $N \geq 0$ we have a natural evaluation map $e v:{ }_{N, N} M_{1} \times{ }_{N, N}\left(M_{1}^{*} \otimes \Omega\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{A}^{1}$ sending $\left(m, m^{*}\right)$ to $\operatorname{Res}\left\langle m, m_{1}\right\rangle$. It gives rise to the usual Fourier transform functor

\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{N, N} M\right) \underset{\rightarrow}{ } \mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{N, N} M_{1}^{*} \otimes \Omega \oplus_{N, N} M_{2}\right)

For $N^{\prime} \geq N$ these functors are compatible with the transition functors $\mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{N, N} M\right) \rightarrow$ $\mathrm{D}^{b}\left({ }_{N^{\prime}, N^{\prime}} M\right)$ in (19), so give rise to the desired functor (31). From the usual properties of the Fourier transform we learn that (31) is an equivalence of triangulated categories, which preserves the perversity.

Assume in addition that $M_{0} \widetilde{\rightarrow} M_{1} \oplus M_{2}$ is a decomposition of $M_{0}$ into a direct sum of $G$-modules. Then similarly the usual Fourier transform functors

\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left({ }_{N, N} M\right) \xrightarrow[\rightarrow]{\longrightarrow} \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(N, N M_{1}^{*} \otimes \Omega \oplus_{N, N} M_{2}\right),
$$

being compatible with the transition functors in (19), give rise to the functor

\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F)) \underset{\rightarrow}{\sim} \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(M_{1}^{*} \otimes \Omega(F) \oplus M_{2}(F)\right), \tag{32}
\end{equation*}
$$

which satisfies the same formal properties.
Remark 3. - The following diagram commutes

\downarrow \mathrm{Four}_{\psi} \\

that is, the composition of two partial Fourier transforms identifies with the complete Fourier transform.

Lemma 6. - The functor (30) commutes with Hecke operators. Namely, there is an isomorphism functorial in $\mathcal{T} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(M(F))$

Proof. - Step 1. Pick $s_{1}, s_{2} \geq 0$ so that $\mathcal{T}$ is the extension by zero from ${ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$. Pick $r, r_{1}, N, N_{1}$ large enough compared to $s_{i}$ and $K$. In particular, we assume

& G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \backslash\left(N_{1}, r_{1}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega\right) \times_{N, r} M\right) \stackrel{\mathrm{pr}}{\longleftarrow} G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \backslash\left(N_{1}, r_{1}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega\right) \times_{N, r} M \times{ }_{s_{1}, s_{2}} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right) \\
& \downarrow \beta \\
& G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \backslash\left(N_{1}, r_{1}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega\right)\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

where the square is cartesian, all the quotients are taken in the stack sense, the action of $G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$ on all the involved schemes is diagonal. We have denoted by $\alpha$ and $\beta$ the projections.

By our assumptions,

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K) \rightrightarrows \operatorname{pr}_{!}\left(\mathcal{T} \otimes \operatorname{act}_{q, s}^{*} K\right)[\operatorname{dim}]
$$

for a suitable shift. Assuming $K \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(\tilde{N}, \tilde{r} M)$ with $N_{i}, r_{i}$ sufficiently large with respect to $\tilde{N}, \tilde{r}$, we get

Here ev : $G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \backslash\left({ }_{N_{1}, r_{1}}\left(M^{*} \otimes \Omega\right) \times_{N, r} M\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{A}^{1}$ is the evaluation map, it is correctly defined because $r-N_{1}$ and $r_{1}-N$ are nonnegative.

Consider the diagram

where $\alpha^{\prime}, \beta^{\prime}, \operatorname{pr}^{\prime}$ are the projections. The square in the above diagram is not cartesian, write

for the map obtained from act ${ }_{q, s}^{\prime}$ by the base change $\beta^{\prime}$. Then

be the evaluation map, it is correctly defined due to (33). By our assumptions,

\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}(K) \leftrightarrows \beta_{!}^{\prime}\left(e v^{*} \mathscr{L}_{\psi} \otimes \alpha^{\prime *} K\right)\left[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}\left(\alpha^{\prime}\right)\right]
$$

and

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{G}, \operatorname{Four}_{\psi}(K)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \operatorname{pr}_{!}^{\prime}\left(\mathcal{T} \otimes\left(\operatorname{act}_{q, s}^{\prime}\right)^{*} \operatorname{Four}_{\psi}(K)\right)[\operatorname{dim}] .
$$

Since $N, r$ are large enough compared to $\tilde{N}, \tilde{r}$, it follows that $b^{*}\left(\alpha^{\prime}\right)^{*} K$ is the extension by zero under (34). The desired result follows now from the base change theorem.

Note that for the functor (30) we have $\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} I_{0}$ canonically.

### 4.9. Extensions of actions

Let $G$ be a connected reductive group, $P$ and $P^{-}$two opposite parabolic subgroups in $G$ with common Levi subgroup $L=P \cap P^{-}$.

Lemma 7. - Let $Y$ be a scheme (of finite type over $k$ ) with a $G$-action. Then we have a diagram of equivariant categories of perverse sheaves

$$
\begin{array}{cc}
P_{P}(Y) \subset & P_{L}(Y) \\
\cup & \cup \\
P_{G}(Y) \subset & P_{P-}(Y),
\end{array}
$$

where all the functors are fully faithful embeddings. Moreover, $P_{P}(Y) \cap P_{P^{-}}(Y)=P_{G}(Y)$, that is, if an object $K \in P_{L}(Y)$ lies in both $P_{P}(Y)$ and $P_{P^{-}}(Y)$ then $K \in P_{G}(Y)$.

Proof. - The natural maps between the stack quotients $Y / L \rightarrow Y / P \rightarrow Y / G$ are smooth of fixed relative dimension, surjective, and have connected fibres. By ([9], Lemma 4.8), they induce the corresponding fully faithful embeddings of categories.

Now assume $K$ is an object of $P_{P}(Y) \cap P_{P^{-}}(Y)$. Let $W$ be the image of the product map $m: P \times P^{-} \rightarrow G$. We have a diagram

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
P \times P^{-} \times Y & \xrightarrow{\mathrm{act}^{\prime}} & Y \\
\quad \downarrow m \times \mathrm{id} & \downarrow \mathrm{id} \\
W \times Y & \xrightarrow{\mathrm{act}_{W}} Y,
\end{array}
$$

where act' sends $\left(p_{1}, p_{1}, y\right)$ to $p_{1} p_{2} y$. The map $m: P \times P^{-} \rightarrow W$ is smooth and surjective with connected fibres. So, by loc. cit., the equivariance isomorphism (act') ${ }^{*} K \leadsto \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \boxtimes K$ descends to an isomoprhism act ${ }_{W}^{*} K \rightrightarrows \widetilde{\mathbb{Q}} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \boxtimes K$ over $W \times Y$.

Further, the product map $m_{W}: W \times W \rightarrow G$ is smooth and surjective with connected fibres. Indeed, any fibre of $m_{W}$ is isomorphic to $z P P^{-} \cap P^{-} P$ for some $z \in G$. The latter intersection is connected, because it is open in $G$. So, for the action map $\operatorname{act}_{W \times W}: W \times W \times Y \rightarrow Y$ the equivariance isomorphism act ${ }_{W \times W}^{*} K \widetilde{\rightarrow} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \boxtimes K$ descends to the desired isomorphism act ${ }^{*} K \rightrightarrows \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \boxtimes K$ over $G \times Y$.

Now assume $M_{0}$ is a finite-dimensional representation of $G$, set $M=M_{0} \otimes_{k} \theta$. Let $U$ be the unipotent radical of $P$. The following result will be used in Section 6.2.

Lemma 8. - i) We have a diagram of fully faithful embeddings of categories

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
P_{P(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \subset & P_{L(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \\
\cup & \cup \\
P_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \subset & P_{P-(\vartheta)}(M(F)) .
\end{array}
$$

The intersection $P_{P(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \cap P_{P^{-}(\theta)}(M(F))$ inside $P_{L(\theta)}\left(M(F)\right.$ equals $P_{G(\vartheta)}(M(F))$.
ii) We have fully faithful embeddings $P_{L(\theta)}(M(F)) \subset P(M(F)) \supset P_{U(\theta)}(M(F))$. The intersection $P_{L(\vartheta)}(M(F)) \cap P_{U(\theta)}(M(F))$ equals $P_{P(\vartheta)}(M(F))$.

Proof. - i) Given $N, r \geq 0$, by ([9], Lemma 4.8), we get a diagram of fully faithful embeddings

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
P_{P\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \subset & P_{L\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \\
\cup & \cup \\
P_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \subset & P_{P^{-}\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M)
\end{array}
$$

with $s=N+r$. Let $K$ be an object of $P_{P\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \cap P_{P-\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M)$.
Let $m: P \times P^{-} \rightarrow W$ and $m: W \times W \rightarrow G$ be as in Lemma 7. The induced maps $m: P\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \times P^{-}\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \rightarrow W\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$ and $m: W\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \times W\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \rightarrow G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$ are again smooth and surjective. Indeed, if $Y_{1} \rightarrow Y_{2}$ is a smooth surjective morphism of affine algebraic varieties, $A$ is an Artin $k$-algebra then $Y_{1}(A)$ is a scheme, and the induced map $Y_{1}(A) \rightarrow Y_{2}(A)$ is smooth and surjective. As in Lemma 7, one shows now that $K \in P_{G\left(\partial / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M)$. The first assertion follows.
ii) Given $N, r \geq 0$ as above for $s=N+r$ one gets a diagram of fully faithful embeddings

$$
P_{L\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \subset P(N, r M) \supset P_{U\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) .
$$

If $K \in P_{L\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M) \cap P_{U\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r M)$ then the equivariance isomorphisms for $L$ and $U$ yield an isomorphism $a^{*} K \xrightarrow{\rightarrow} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{l} \boxtimes K$, where $a: L\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \times U\left(\Theta / t^{s}\right) \times{ }_{N, r} M \rightarrow{ }_{N, r} M$ is the map sending $(g, u, m)$ to gum. The product induces an isomorphism $L\left(\theta / t^{s}\right) \times U\left(\Theta / t^{s}\right) \rightrightarrows P\left(\Theta / t^{s}\right)$, so $K$ lies in the full subcategory $\mathrm{P}_{P\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}\left({ }_{N, r} M\right) \subset \mathrm{P}\left({ }_{N, r} M\right)$. Our assertion follows.
5. Geometric model of the Weil representation of $\mathrm{GL}_{m} \times \mathrm{GL}_{n}$
5.1. - Let $U_{0}=k^{m}, L_{0}=k^{n}$ be the standard $k$-vector spaces of dimensions $m$ and $n$. For Section 5 we let $G=\operatorname{GL}\left(L_{0}\right)$ and $H=\operatorname{GL}\left(U_{0}\right)$. Let $\Pi_{0}=U_{0} \otimes L_{0}$.

Set $U=U_{0}(\theta), L=L_{0}(\theta)$ and $\Pi=\Pi_{0}(\theta)$. Let $T_{G} \subset B_{G} \subset G$ be the torus of diagonal matrices and the Borel subgroup of upper-triangular matrices. We identify $\Lambda_{G} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathbb{Z}^{n}$ in the usual way. Let $\check{\omega}_{i} \in \check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$be the h.w. of the representation $\wedge^{i} L_{0}$ of $G$. The objects $T_{H} \subset B_{H} \subset$ $H$ are defined similarly for $H$. By some abuse of notation, $\check{\omega}_{i} \in \check{\Lambda}_{H}^{+}$will also denote the h.w. of the $H$-representation $\wedge^{i} U_{0}$. Keep the notations of Section 4, in particular we write $N, r \Pi=t^{-N} \Pi / t^{r} \Pi$, and $I_{0}$ is the constant sheaf on ${ }_{0,0} \Pi$.

We are going to describe the submodule over $\operatorname{Sph}_{G}\left(\right.$ resp., over $\left.\mathrm{Sph}_{H}\right)$ in $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}^{b}(\Pi(F))$ generated by $I_{0}$. Assume $m \geq n$.

Let $U_{1} \oplus U_{2} \widetilde{\rightarrow} U_{0}$ be the direct sum decomposition, where $U_{1}$ (resp., $U_{2}$ ) is generated by the first $n$ (resp., last $m-n$ ) base vectors. Let $P \subset H$ be the parabolic subgroup preserving $U_{1}, U_{H} \subset P$ be its unipotent radical. Let $M=\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right) \times \mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right) \subset P$ be the standard Levi factor. Let $\kappa: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ be the composition

$$
\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\text { id } \times 2 \check{\rho}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}} \check{G} \times \check{\mathrm{GL}}\left(U_{2}\right)=\check{M} \hookrightarrow \check{H} .
$$

Write $\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa}: \mathrm{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ for the functor corresponding (in view of Loc and Loc ${ }^{\mathrm{r}}$ ) to the restriction $\operatorname{Rep}(\check{H}) \rightarrow \operatorname{Rep}\left(\breve{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}\right)$ with respect to $\kappa$. Here is the main result of Section 5.

Proposition 4. - The two functors $\mathrm{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\vartheta)}^{b}(\Pi(F))$ given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathscr{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathscr{T}, I_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \mathcal{G} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{ges}^{\kappa}(\mathscr{T}), I_{0}\right) \tag{35}
\end{equation*}
$$

are isomorphic.
Let $N, r \in \mathbb{Z}$ with $N+r \geq 0$. Think of $v \in \Pi(F)$ as a map $v: U^{*}(F) \rightarrow L(F)$. For $v \in{ }_{N, r} \Pi$ let $U_{v, r}=v\left(U^{*}\right)+t^{r} L$, this is a $\theta$-lattice in $L(F)$. For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$satisfying

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\langle-w_{0}^{G}(\lambda), \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle \leq N \quad \text { and }\left\langle\lambda, \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle \leq r \tag{36}
\end{equation*}
$$

let $\lambda_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0} \subset{ }_{N, r} \Pi$ be the locally closed subscheme of those $v \in{ }_{N, r} \Pi$ for which $t^{a_{n}} L /\left(v\left(U^{*}\right)+t^{a_{1}} L\right)$ is isomorphic to $\Theta / t^{a_{1}-a_{n}} \oplus \cdots \oplus \Theta / t^{a_{n}-a_{n}}$ as $\theta$-module. Here $\lambda=\left(a_{1} \geq \cdots \geq a_{n}\right)$. In other words, for $v \in_{N, r} \Pi$ we have $v \in_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}$ iff $U_{v, r} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$.

One checks that the $G(\theta) \times H(\theta)$-orbits on ${ }_{N, r} \Pi$ are exactly $\lambda_{, r} \Pi^{0}$ for $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$satisfying (36). The fact that the set of $(G \times H)(0)$-orbits on $N, r \Pi$ is finite also follows from ([11], Theorem 3.2.1), because $\Pi_{0}$ is a spherical $G \times H$-variety.

Given $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$let now $N=\left\langle-w_{0}^{G}(\lambda), \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle$ and $r=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle$. By 4.4, $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \in$ $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(N, r \Pi)$. Define the closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi \subset{ }_{N} \Pi$ as follows. A point $v \in{ }_{N} \Pi$ lies in ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ iff for $i=1, \ldots, n$ the map

$$
\wedge^{i} U^{*} \xrightarrow{\wedge^{i} v}\left(\wedge^{i} L\right)\left(-\left\langle w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\omega}_{i}\right\rangle\right)
$$

is regular. The scheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ is stable under translations by $t^{r} \Pi(\theta)$, so there is a unique closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi \subset{ }_{N, r} \Pi$ such that ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ is the preimage of ${ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi$ under the projection ${ }_{N} \Pi \rightarrow{ }_{N, r} \Pi$. Under our assumptions the map (26) factors as

$$
{ }_{0, r} \Pi \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \xrightarrow{\pi}{ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi \hookrightarrow{ }_{N, r} \Pi .
$$

Proposition 5. - For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$we have a canonical isomorphism $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \leftrightharpoons \mathrm{IC}\left(\lambda, r \Pi^{0}\right)$ with the intersection cohomology sheaf of $\lambda, r \Pi^{0}$.

Proof. - Note that $\lambda_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0} \subset{ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi$ is an open subscheme. The map ${ }_{0, r} \Pi \tilde{x} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \xrightarrow{\pi}{ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi$ is an isomorphism over ${ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}$, in particular $\operatorname{dim}_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}=r n m+\left\langle\lambda, 2 \check{\rho}_{G}-m \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle$.

The scheme ${ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi$ is stratified by locally closed subschemes $\mu, r \Pi^{0}$, where $\mu \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$satisfies (36) and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\langle w_{0}^{G}(\lambda-\mu), \check{\omega}_{i}\right\rangle \leq 0 \tag{37}
\end{equation*}
$$

for $i=1, \ldots, n$. Further, ${ }_{0, r} \Pi \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}$ is stratified by locally closed subschemes ${ }_{0, r} \Pi \tilde{\times} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\mu}$ with $\mu \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}, \mu \leq \lambda$. Let us show that $\pi$ is stratified small (in the sense of [21]) with respect to these stratifications.

Let $\mu \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$satisfy (36) and (37), take $v \in{ }_{\mu, r} \Pi^{0}$. Let $Y$ be the fibre of $\pi: 0, r \Pi \tilde{\times} \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi$ over $v$. We must show that $2 \operatorname{dim} Y \leq\left\langle\lambda-\mu, 2 \check{\rho}_{G}-m \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle$.

From (37) it follows that $\left\langle\lambda-\mu, \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle \leq 0$. So, to finish the proof it suffices to show that $2 \operatorname{dim} Y \leq\left\langle\lambda-\mu, 2 \check{\rho}_{G}-n \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle$.

The scheme $Y$ classifies $\theta$-lattices $L^{\prime} \subset L(F)$ such that $L^{\prime} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$ and $U_{v, r} \subset L^{\prime}$. Stratify $Y$ by locally closed subschemes $Y_{\tau}$ indexed by $\tau \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$, which are very positive. We call

$$
\tau=\left(b_{1} \geq \cdots \geq b_{n}\right)
$$

very positive iff $b_{n} \geq 0$. By definition, the subscheme $Y_{\tau}$ classifies $L^{\prime} \in Y$ such that $U_{v, r}$ is in the position $\tau$ with respect to $L^{\prime}$. Now by ([21], Lemma 4.4), if $Y_{\tau}$ is nonempty then

$$
\operatorname{dim} Y_{\tau} \leq\left\langle\lambda+\tau-\mu, \check{\rho}_{G}\right\rangle
$$

So, we have to show that $\left\langle\tau, 2 \check{\rho}_{G}\right\rangle \leq\left\langle\lambda-\mu,-n \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle$. The formula for virtual dimensions $\operatorname{dim}\left(L / L^{\prime}\right)+\operatorname{dim}\left(L^{\prime} / U_{v, r}\right)=\operatorname{dim}\left(L / U_{v, r}\right)$ reads $\left\langle\tau+\lambda-\mu, \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle=0$. Thus, we are reduced to show that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\langle\tau, n \check{\omega}_{n}-2 \check{\rho}_{G}\right\rangle \geq 0 . \tag{38}
\end{equation*}
$$

This inequality follows from the fact that $\tau$ is very positive, because

$$
n \check{\omega}_{n}-2 \check{\rho}_{G}=(1,3,5, \ldots, 2 n-1)
$$

is very positive. Moreover, the inequality (38) is strict unless $\tau=0$. Since $\tau=0$ iff $\lambda=\mu$, we are done.

Corollary 4. - i) The functor $\operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\vartheta)}^{b}(\Pi(F))$ given by $\mathcal{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ takes values in $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$. The corresponding functor

$$
\operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))
$$

is fully faithful, its image is the full subcategory $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}^{\mathrm{ss}}(\Pi(F))$ of semi-simple objects in $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$.
ii) For any $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$we have $\operatorname{Ext}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}^{1}\left(\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}\right), \operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}\right)\right)=0$.

Proof. - For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$let $r=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle$ and $N=\left\langle-w_{0}^{G}(\lambda), \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle$. Pick $s \geq N+r$. The stabilizor, say $K$, in $(G \times H)\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$ of a point of $\lambda_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}$ is connected. So, the irreducible objects of $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\vartheta)}(\Pi(F))$ are exactly $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}\right), \lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$. Part i) follows.

We have a canonical equivalence $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}\left(\lambda, r \Pi^{0}\right) \widetilde{\leftrightharpoons} \mathrm{P}_{K}(\operatorname{Spec} k)$. By ([9], Lemma 4.8), the connectedness of $K$ implies that $\mathrm{P}_{K}(\operatorname{Spec} k)$ is equivalent to the category of vector spaces. If $0 \rightarrow \operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}\right) \rightarrow \mathcal{K} \rightarrow \operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, r} \Pi^{0}\right) \rightarrow 0$ is an exact sequence in $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}(N, r \Pi)$ then $\mathcal{K}$ is the intermediate extension from $\lambda_{, r} \Pi^{0}$. Part ii) follows.

Remark 4. - i) As in Section 4.5, one may strengthen Corollary 4i) saying that the functor $\mathcal{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ takes values in the category $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\vartheta) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0} \emptyset}(\Pi(F))$. The functors in Proposition 4 may also be seen as taking values in the $\operatorname{Aut}^{0}(\theta)$-equivariant version of the corresponding derived category.
ii) The category $\mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$ is not semi-simple in general. To have an example, take $n=m=2$ and $\lambda=(1,0)$. Let $Y \subset{ }_{0,1} \Pi$ be the support of $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, 1} \Pi^{0}\right)$ then $\operatorname{dim} Y=3$ and $\operatorname{dim}_{0,1} \Pi=4$. The restriction to $Y$ yields a nontrivial map $I_{0} \rightarrow \operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, 1} \Pi^{0}\right)[1]$ in $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(0,1 \Pi)$.

Proof of Proposition 4. - Step 1. - Assume first $n=m$. Interchanging $U_{0}$ and $L_{0}$, one derives from Proposition 5 that the functors $\operatorname{Rep}\left(\mathrm{GL}_{n}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$ given by

$$
V \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(V, I_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad V \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(V, I_{0}\right)
$$

are isomorphic. For $n=m$ we are done.
Step 2. - For $m \geq n$ consider the Jacquet functors

$$
J_{P}^{*}: \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}(\Pi(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{(G \times M)(\theta)}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right) .
$$

We have $J_{P}^{*}\left(I_{0}\right) \rightrightarrows I_{0}$ canonically. The action of $\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)$ on $U_{1} \otimes L_{0}$ is trivial, so $\& \in \operatorname{Sph}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}$ acts on $I_{0} \in \mathrm{D}_{(G \times M)(\theta)}\left(U_{1}^{*} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right)$ as

$$
\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}^{\leftarrow}\left(\&, I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} I_{0} \otimes \mathrm{R} \Gamma\left(\operatorname{Gr}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}, \phi\right)
$$

As a representation of $H, \operatorname{det}\left(U_{0} \otimes L_{0}\right)$ is the character $n \check{\omega}_{m} \in \check{\Lambda}_{H}^{+}$. As a representation of $M, \operatorname{det}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}\right)$ is the character $n \check{\omega}_{n} \in \check{\Lambda}_{H}^{+}$. Thus, let $\kappa_{1}: \operatorname{GLL}\left(U_{1}\right) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ be the composition

$$
\check{\mathrm{GL}}\left(U_{1}\right) \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{i \times\left(2 \check{\rho}_{H}-2 \check{\rho}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right)}-n \check{\omega}_{n}+n \check{\omega}_{m}\right)} \check{M} \hookrightarrow \check{H}
$$

where $i: G \check{L}\left(U_{1}\right) \hookrightarrow \check{M}$ is the natural inclusion. Let $\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa_{1}}: \operatorname{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right)}$ be the corresponding restriction functor. From Corollary 3 we get for $\mathscr{T} \in \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$ an isomorphism

$$
J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathscr{T}, I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right)}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{ges}^{\kappa_{1}}(\mathcal{G}), I_{0}\right)
$$

Let $\kappa_{2}: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ be the map obtained from $\kappa_{1}$ via the canonical identification $\breve{G L}\left(U_{1}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \breve{G}$. By Step 1 , we have an isomorphism

$$
\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right)}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa_{1}}(\mathscr{T}), I_{0}\right) \rightrightarrows \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa_{2}}(\mathscr{T}), I_{0}\right)
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times M)(\theta)}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right)$.
Further, we may think of $J_{P}^{*}$ as the Jacquet functor corresponding to the parabolic subgroup $P \times G$ of $H \times G$. As a representation of $G$, $\operatorname{det}\left(U_{0} \otimes L_{0}\right) \otimes \operatorname{det}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}\right)^{-1}$ is the character $(m-n) \check{\omega}_{n} \in \check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$. So, let $\kappa_{3}: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m}$ be the map, whose second component $\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \mathbb{G}_{m}$ is the projection, and the first component is

$$
\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\left(\mathrm{id},(m-n) \check{\omega}_{n}\right)} \check{G} .
$$

Write gRes $^{\kappa_{3}}: \mathrm{DSph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ for the corresponding geometric restriction functor. By Corollary 3 , for $\delta \in \mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ we get an isomorphism

$$
J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\delta, I_{0}\right) \leftrightharpoons \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa_{3}}(\delta), I_{0}\right)
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times M)(\theta)}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right)$. From Corollary 4 we conclude that

$$
\begin{equation*}
J_{P}^{*}: \mathrm{DP}_{(G \times H)(\vartheta)}^{\mathrm{ss}}(\Pi(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{DP}_{\left(\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right) \times G\right)(\vartheta)}^{\mathrm{ss}}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right) \tag{39}
\end{equation*}
$$

is an equivalence. The equality

$$
2 \check{\rho}_{H}-2 \check{\rho}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{1}\right)}-2 \check{\rho}_{\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{2}\right)}+n \check{\omega}_{m}-m \check{\omega}_{n}=0
$$

shows that the composition $\check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\kappa_{3}} \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \xrightarrow{\kappa} \check{H}$ equals $\kappa_{2}$.
Summarizing, for $\mathcal{T} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{H}$ we get an isomorphism

$$
J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightrightarrows} J_{P}^{*} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\mathscr{T}), I_{0}\right)
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{(G \times M)(\theta)}\left(U_{1} \otimes L_{0}(F)\right)$, and (39) garantees that this isomorphism can be lifted to the desired isomorphism of functors (35).

We will need the following version of Proposition 4. Set $\Pi_{1}=U_{0}^{*} \otimes L_{0}$. Recall the functor * : $\operatorname{Sph}(\breve{H}) \rightrightarrows \operatorname{Sph}(\check{H})$ from Section 2.1.1.

Corollary 5. - The two functors $\mathrm{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta)}^{b}\left(\Pi_{1}(F)\right)$ given by

$$
\mathcal{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(* \mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)=\mathrm{H}_{H}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \mathcal{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(\mathcal{T}), I_{0}\right)
$$

are isomorphic.

## 6. Geometric model of the Weil representation of $\mathrm{SO}_{2 m} \times \mathrm{Sp}_{2 n}$

6.1. - Let $U_{0}=k^{m}, L_{0}=k^{n}$. Set $V_{0}=U_{0} \oplus U_{0}^{*}$, we equip it with the symmetric form $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} V_{0} \rightarrow k$ as in Section 3.2. Set $H=\operatorname{SO}\left(V_{0}\right)$.

Let $P_{H} \subset H$ be the parabolic subgroup preserving $U_{0}, U_{H} \subset P_{H}$ be its unipotent radical. Write $Q_{H}=\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{GL}_{m}$ for the standard Levi factor of $P_{H}$. We equip it with the maximal torus $T_{H}$ of diagonal matrices and the Borel subgroup of upper-triangular matrices (its preimage in $P_{H}$ is a Borel subgroup, which yields our choice of positive roots).

Set $M_{0}=L_{0} \oplus L_{0}^{*}$, we equip it with the symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M_{0} \rightarrow k$ arising from pairing between $L_{0}$ and $L_{0}^{*}$, so $L_{0}$ and $L_{0}^{*}$ are lagrangian subspaces in $M_{0}$. Set $G=\mathbb{S p}\left(M_{0}\right)$. Let $P_{G} \subset G$ be the parabolic subgroup preserving $L_{0}, U_{G} \subset P_{G}$ its unipotent radical. Write $Q_{G}=\mathrm{GL}\left(L_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{GL}_{n}$ for the natural Levi factor of $P_{G}$. We equip $Q_{G}$ with the maximal torus $T_{G}$ of diagonal matrices and the Borel subgroup of upper-triangular matrices (the preimage of the latter in $P_{G}$ is a Borel subgroup, which yields our choice of positive roots).

Keep the notation of Section 4, in particular, $\theta=k[[t]]$ and $\Omega$ is the completed module of relative differential of $\theta$ over $k$. Set $L=L_{0}(\theta), U=U_{0}(\theta), V=V_{0}(\theta)$ and $M=L \oplus L^{*} \otimes \Omega$. The isomorphism $\Theta \leftrightarrows \Omega$ sending 1 to $d t$ yields an isomorphism of group schemes $G \leftrightharpoons \operatorname{Sp}(M)$ over $\operatorname{Spec} \theta$. So, we often think of $G$ as the group acting on $M$.

Set $\Upsilon=L^{*} \otimes V \otimes \Omega$ and $\Pi=U^{*} \otimes M$.

Remark 5. - In general, $L_{0}^{*} \otimes V_{0}$ is not a spherical $Q_{G} \times H$-variety. By ([11], Theorem 3.2.1), in this case the set of $Q_{G}(\theta) \times H(\theta)$-orbits on $\Upsilon(F)$ is not countable. Indeed, already for the open $Q_{G} \times H$-orbit $\left(Q_{G} \times H\right) / R$ in $L_{0}^{*} \otimes V_{0}$, the set of $R(F)$-orbits on $\operatorname{Gr}_{Q_{G} \times H}$ is not countable.

Similarly, in general $U_{0}^{*} \otimes M_{0}$ is not a spherical $Q_{H} \times G$-variety, and the set of $Q_{H}(\theta) \times G(\theta)$-orbits on $\Pi(F)$ is not countable.
6.2. - As in Section 3.2, we define the functor

$$
\begin{equation*}
\zeta: \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}^{b}(\Upsilon(F)) \leftrightharpoons \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{H} \times Q_{G}\right)(\theta)}^{b}(\Pi(F)) \tag{40}
\end{equation*}
$$

as the partial Fourier transform (32) with respect to the decomposition

$$
\Upsilon(F) \widetilde{\rightarrow} L^{*} \otimes U \otimes \Omega(F) \oplus L^{*} \otimes U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)
$$

Definition 4. - The Weil category for $G \times H$ is the category Weil $_{G, H}$ of triples $\left(\mathscr{F}_{1}, \mathcal{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$, where $\mathscr{F}_{1} \in \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\vartheta)}(\Upsilon(F)), \mathscr{F}_{2} \in \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\vartheta)}(\Pi(F))$, and $\beta: \zeta\left(f\left(\mathcal{F}_{1}\right)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} f\left(\mathcal{F}_{2}\right)$ is an isomorphism for the diagram

$$
\begin{array}{cc}
\mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}(\Upsilon(F)) & \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\theta)}(\Pi(F)) \\
\downarrow f & \downarrow f \\
\mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}(\Upsilon(F)) \stackrel{\zeta}{\rightarrow} \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times Q_{G}\right)(\theta)}(\Pi(F)),
\end{array}
$$

where $f$ are forgetful functors. Write

$$
f_{G}: \text { Weil }_{G, H} \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\vartheta)}(\Pi(F)) \quad \text { and } \quad f_{H}: \text { Weil }_{G, H} \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\vartheta)}(\Upsilon(F))
$$

for the functors sending $\left(\mathscr{F}_{1}, \mathcal{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$ to $\mathscr{F}_{2}$ and $\mathscr{F}_{1}$ respectively. Write D Weil $_{G, H}$ for the category obtained by replacing in the above definition P by DP everywhere.

By ([9], Lemma 4.8), both functors $f$ in the above diagram are full embeddings, and their image is stable under subquotients. It follows that $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}$ is abelian, and both $f_{G}$ and $f_{H}$ are full embeddings. Write $W_{e i l l i l}^{G, H} \subset \subset W_{e i l}^{G, H}$ for the full subcategory of semi-simple objects. We write

$$
\mathrm{D} \text { Weil }_{G, H}^{\text {ss }} \subset \mathrm{D} \text { Weil }_{G, H}
$$

for the full subcategory of objects of the form $\oplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} K_{i}[i]$ with $K_{i} \in$ Weil $_{G, H}^{\text {ss }}$ for all $i$.
Since $\zeta\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\leftrightarrows} I_{0}$ canonically, $I_{0}$ is naturally an object of Weil $_{G, H}^{\text {ss }}$. Combining the decomposition theorem ([2], Corollary 5.4.6) with the fact that $G$ and $H$-actions in the Weil representation commute with each other, one gets the following.

Proposition 6. - There exist natural functors $\mathrm{DSph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}$ Weil $_{G, H}^{\text {ss }}$ and $\mathrm{DSph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}$ Weil ${ }_{G, H}^{\text {ss }}$ such that the diagrams commute

& \begin{aligned}
\mathrm{DSph}_{G} & \rightarrow \quad \mathrm{DWeil}{ }_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}} \\
& \begin{array}{l}
\downarrow a_{G} \quad \downarrow f_{G} \\

\\
\mathrm{DP}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\theta)}^{\mathrm{ss}}(\Pi(F))
\end{array}
\end{aligned} \\
& \begin{array}{rlr}
\mathrm{DSph}_{H} & \rightarrow & \mathrm{DWeil}{ }_{G, H}^{\text {ss }} \\
& \searrow a_{H} & \downarrow f_{H}
\end{array}
\end{aligned}
$$

Here the functor $a_{G}$ (resp., $a_{H}$ ) sends $\mathcal{T}$ to $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ (resp., to $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ ).
Proof. - The arguments for both functors being similar, we give a proof only for the second one. Given $\mathcal{T} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{H}$, by decomposition theorem $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right) \in \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}(\Upsilon(F))$ identifies with the direct sum of its (shifted) perverse cohomology sheaves. It suffices to show that each perverse cohomology sheaf $K$ of $\zeta\left(f \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)\right)$ actually lies in the full subcategory $\mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$ of $\mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times Q_{G}\right)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$.

Denote by $P_{G}^{-} \subset G$ the parabolic subgroup preserving $L_{0}^{*}$, write $U_{G}^{-}$for its unipotent radical. By Lemma 8 , it suffices to show that $K$ admits a $U_{G}(\theta)$ and $U_{G}^{-}(\theta)$-equivariant structures. For $v \in \Upsilon(F)$ write $s_{\mathscr{L}}(v)$ for the composition

$$
\operatorname{Sym}^{2} L(F) \xrightarrow{\operatorname{Sym}^{2} v} \operatorname{Sym}^{2}(V \otimes \Omega)(F) \rightarrow \Omega^{2}(F) .
$$

Let $\operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon) \subset \Upsilon(F)$ be the ind-subscheme of $v \in \Upsilon(F)$ such that $s_{\mathcal{L}}(v): \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \rightarrow \Omega^{2}$ is regular. The $U_{G}(\theta)$-equivariance of $K$ is equivalent to the fact that $\zeta^{-1}(K)$ is the extension by zero from $\operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$. But the complex $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ itself satisfies this property, so its direct summand also does.

To get a $U_{G}^{-}(\theta)$-action on $K$, consider the commutative diagram

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}(\Upsilon(F)) \stackrel{\zeta}{\longrightarrow} \quad \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{H} \times Q_{G}\right)(\theta)}(\Pi(F)) \\
& \searrow \operatorname{Four}_{\psi} \quad \downarrow \zeta_{1} \\
& P_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}(L \otimes V(F)),
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\zeta_{1}$ is a partial Fourier transform (with respect to $\psi$ ), and Four ${ }_{\psi}$ is the complete Fourier transform (cf. Remark 3). By Lemma 6,

$$
\zeta_{1} \zeta\left(f \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \operatorname{Four}_{\psi}\left(f \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{J}, I_{0}\right)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} f_{1} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)
$$

where we have denoted by $f_{1}: \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}(L \otimes V(F)) \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}(L \otimes V(F))$ the forgetful functor.

Let $\operatorname{Char}(L \otimes V(F)) \subset L \otimes V(F)$ be the ind-subscheme of $v \in L \otimes V(F)$ such that the composition $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} L^{*} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{Sym}^{2} v} \operatorname{Sym}^{2} V(F) \rightarrow F$ factors through $\Theta \subset F$. Note that

$$
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right) \in \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\vartheta)}(L \otimes V(F))
$$

is the extension by zero from $\operatorname{Char}(L \otimes V(F))$. The $U_{G}^{-}(\theta)$-equivariance of $K$ is equivalent to the fact that $\zeta_{1}(K)$ is the extension by zero from $\operatorname{Char}(L \otimes V(F))$. We are done.

Remark 6. - As in Section 4.5, one may strengthen Proposition 6 saying that the functors $a_{G}, a_{H}$ actually take values in the $\operatorname{Aut}^{0}(\theta)$-equivariant versions of the corresponding categories.

By abuse of notation, we simply write $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right) \in \mathrm{D}$ Weil ${ }_{G, H}^{\text {ss }}$ (resp., $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathscr{T}, I_{0}\right) \in$ $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Weil}_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}}$ ) for $\mathcal{J} \in{\mathrm{D} \operatorname{Sph}_{G}}^{(\text {resp., }} \mathcal{J} \in \mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$ ).

Recall the definition of the homomorphisms $\kappa$ from Section 2.3.2. For $m \leq n$ we have $\kappa: \check{H} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{G}$. We write $\mathrm{gRes}^{\kappa}: \mathrm{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{H}$ for the corresponding geometric restriction functor.

For $m>n$ we have $\kappa: \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$. Write gRes ${ }^{\kappa}: \operatorname{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ for the corresponding geometric restriction functor.

Here is our main local result.
Theorem 7. - 1) Assume $m \leq n$. The functors $\mathrm{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}$ Weil ${ }_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}}$ given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\delta \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\delta, I_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \delta \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(* \operatorname{ges}^{\kappa}(\delta), I_{0}\right) \tag{41}
\end{equation*}
$$

are isomorphic.
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2) Assume $m>n$. The two functors $\mathrm{Sph}_{H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}$ Weil $_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}}$ given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathcal{J} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{J}, I_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad \mathcal{J} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\operatorname{gRes}^{\kappa}(* \mathcal{J}), I_{0}\right) \tag{42}
\end{equation*}
$$

are isomorphic.
The proof will be given in Section 6.4.
6.3.1. - In this subsection we assume $m \leq n$ and analyse the action of $\operatorname{Sph}_{H}$ on $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\vartheta)}^{b}(\Upsilon(F))$ in more details.

Write $V^{\check{\lambda}}$ for the irreducible $H$-module with h.w. $\check{\lambda} \in \check{\Lambda}_{H}^{+}$. For $1 \leq i<m$ let $\check{\alpha}_{i} \in \check{\Lambda}_{H}^{+}$ denote the h.w. of the $H$-module $\wedge^{i} V_{0}$. Recall that

$$
\wedge^{m} V_{0} \widetilde{\rightarrow} V^{\check{\alpha}_{m}} \oplus V^{\check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}}
$$

is a direct sum of two irreducible representations, this is our definition of $\check{\alpha}_{m}, \check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}$. Say that a maximal isotropic subspace $\mathscr{L} \subset V_{0}$ is $\check{\alpha}_{m}$-oriented (resp., $\check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}$-oriented) if $\wedge^{m} \mathscr{L} \subset V^{\check{\alpha}_{m}}$ (resp., $\wedge^{m} \mathcal{L} \subset V^{\alpha_{m}^{\prime}}$ ). The group $H$ has two orbits on the scheme of maximal isotropic subspaces in $V_{0}$ given by their orientation.

For $v \in \Upsilon(F)$ let $s_{\mathscr{L}}(v): \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \rightarrow \Omega^{2}(F)$ be the composition

$$
\operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \xrightarrow{\operatorname{Sym}^{2} v} \operatorname{Sym}^{2}(V \otimes \Omega)(F) \rightarrow \Omega^{2}(F)
$$

For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$let $N=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\alpha}_{1}\right\rangle$, define a closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon \subset{ }_{N} \Upsilon=t^{-N} \Upsilon$ as follows. A point $v \in{ }_{N} \Upsilon$ lies in ${ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon$ iff the following conditions hold:
C1) $s_{\mathscr{L}}(v): \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \rightarrow \Omega^{2}$ is regular;
$\mathrm{C} 2)$ for $1 \leq i<m$ the map $\wedge^{i} L \xrightarrow{\wedge^{i} v}\left(\Omega^{i} \otimes \wedge^{i} V\right)\left(\left\langle-w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\alpha}_{i}\right\rangle\right)$ is regular;
C3) the $\operatorname{map} \wedge^{m} L \xrightarrow{v_{m} \oplus v_{m}^{\prime}}\left(\Omega^{m} \otimes V^{\check{\alpha}_{m}}\right)\left(\left\langle-w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\alpha}_{m}\right\rangle\right) \oplus\left(\Omega^{m} \otimes V^{\check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}}\right)\left(\left\langle-w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}\right\rangle\right)$ induced by $\wedge^{m} v$ is regular.

The scheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon$ is stable under translations by ${ }_{-N} \Upsilon$, so there is a closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon \subset{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$ whose preimage under the projection ${ }_{N} \Upsilon \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$ is ${ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon$.

As in Section 4.4, we have a map $\pi:{ }_{0, N} \Upsilon \tilde{\times} \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{H}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$, it factors through the closed immersion $_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon \hookrightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$, and

$$
\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \pi_{!}\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \tilde{\boxtimes} \mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}\right)\left[\operatorname{dim}_{0, N} \Upsilon\right] \in \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}\left({ }_{N, N} \Upsilon\right)
$$

Let $\operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon) \subset \Upsilon(F)$ be the ind-subscheme of $v \in \Upsilon(F)$ satisfying C1). Note that $\operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ is preserved by the $H(F)$-action. For $v \in \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ let $L_{v}=v(L)+V \otimes \Omega$ and

$$
L_{v}^{\perp}=\left\{v \in V \otimes \Omega \mid\langle v, u\rangle \in \Omega^{2} \quad \text { for any } u \in L_{v}\right\}
$$

Let $V_{v} \subset V(F)$ be defined by $V_{v} \otimes \Omega=v(L)+L_{v}^{\perp}$, then $V_{v}$ is an orthogonal lattice in $V(F)$, that is, a point of $\mathrm{Gr}_{H}$. We stratify $\operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ by locally closed subschemes ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ indexed by $\lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$. Namely, for $v \in \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ we let $v \in{ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$ iff $V_{v} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\lambda}$.

We have ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon) \subset{ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon$. Moreover, for $N=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\alpha}_{1}\right\rangle$ there is a unique open subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0} \subset{ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon$ whose preimage under the projection ${ }_{\lambda} \Upsilon \rightarrow{ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon$ identifies with ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Upsilon)$.

Write $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}\right) \in \mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}\left({ }_{N, N} \Upsilon\right)$ for the intersection cohomology sheaf of $\lambda_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}$.

Lemma 9. - Assume $m \leq n$.

1) The map

$$
\pi:_{0, N} \Upsilon \tilde{\times} \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{H}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon
$$

is an isomorphism over the open subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}$. So, $\operatorname{dim}_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}=2 N n m+\left\langle\lambda, 2 \check{\rho}_{H}\right\rangle$.
2) For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$we have $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \leftrightarrows \mathrm{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}\right)$ canonically.

Proof. - 1) The fibre of $\pi$ over $v \in \lambda_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}$ is the scheme classifying orthogonal lattices $V^{\prime} \subset V(F)$ such that $V^{\prime} \in \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{H}^{\lambda}$ and $v(L) \subset V^{\prime} \otimes \Omega$. Given such lattice $V^{\prime}$, the inclusion $v(L)+V \otimes \Omega \subset V^{\prime} \otimes \Omega+V \otimes \Omega$ must be an equality, because for $V^{\prime} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}$ with $\mu \leq \lambda$ we get

$$
\operatorname{dim}\left(V^{\prime}+V\right) / V=\epsilon(\mu) \leq \epsilon(\lambda)=\operatorname{dim}(v(L)+V \otimes \Omega / V \otimes \Omega)
$$

We have set here $\epsilon(\mu)=\max \left\{\left\langle\mu, \check{\alpha}_{m}\right\rangle,\left\langle\mu, \check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}\right\rangle\right\}$. Thus, $V_{v} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\lambda}$ is the unique preimage of $v$ under $\pi$. The first assertion follows.

For the convenience of the reader recall that $T_{H} \xrightarrow{\leftrightarrows} \mathbb{G}_{m}^{m}$ is the torus of diagonal matrices in $\operatorname{GL}\left(U_{0}\right)$, and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\Lambda_{H}^{+}=\left\{\mu=\left(a_{1} \geq \cdots \geq a_{m}\right) \in \mathbb{Z}^{m}\left|a_{m-1} \geq\left|a_{m}\right|\right\}\right. \tag{43}
\end{equation*}
$$

In these notations one may take $\check{\alpha}_{m}=(1, \ldots, 1)$ and $\check{\alpha}_{m}^{\prime}=(1, \ldots, 1,-1)$. So, if $\mu=\left(a_{1}, \ldots, a_{m}\right) \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$then $\epsilon(\mu)=a_{1}+\cdots+a_{m-1}+\left|a_{m}\right|$.
2) From 1) we learn that $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}\right)$ appears in $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)$ with multiplicity one. So, it suffices to show that

$$
\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right), \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)\right)=\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}
$$

where Hom is taken in the derived category $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}^{b}(\Upsilon(F))$. By adjointness,

$$
\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right), \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)\right) \underset{\rightarrow}{\leftrightarrows} \operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{-w_{0}(\lambda)} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right), I_{0}\right)
$$

So, it suffices to show that for any $\lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$with $\lambda \neq 0$ one has $\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right), I_{0}\right)=0$ in $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}^{b}(\Upsilon(F))$. As above, set $N=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\alpha}_{1}\right\rangle$. We will show that

$$
\operatorname{Hom}\left(\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right), I_{0}\right)=0
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)\left(\theta / t^{d}\right)}^{b}\left({ }_{N, N} \Upsilon(F)\right)$ for $d$ large enough.
Let $i:_{0, N} \Upsilon \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$ denote the natural closed immersion. Recall that $I_{0}=i_{!} p^{!} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}[-2 N n m]$ on ${ }_{N, N} \Upsilon$, where $p:{ }_{0, N} \Upsilon \rightarrow \operatorname{Spec} k$ is the projection. By adjointness, we are reduced to show that

$$
\operatorname{Hom}\left(p_{!} i^{*} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)[2 N n m], \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right)=0
$$

in $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)\left(\theta / t^{d}\right)}^{b}(\operatorname{Spec} k)$. It suffices to show that $p_{!} i^{*} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)[2 N n m]$ is placed in degrees $<0$.

Denote by $\mathcal{Y}^{\lambda}$ the preimage of ${ }_{0, N} \Upsilon$ under

$$
\pi:_{0, N} \Upsilon \tilde{\times} \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{H}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Upsilon
$$

Then $\mathscr{Y}^{\lambda}$ is the scheme classifying $V^{\prime} \in \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{H}^{\lambda}$ and $v \in{ }_{0, N} \Upsilon$ such that $v(L) \subset\left(V^{\prime} / t^{N} V\right) \otimes \Omega$.
Stratify $\mathcal{Y}^{\lambda}$ by locally closed subschemes $\mathcal{Y}^{\lambda, \mu}$ indexed by $\mu \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$with $\mu \leq \lambda$. The subscheme $\mathcal{Y}^{\lambda, \mu} \subset \mathcal{Y}^{\lambda}$ is given by the condition $V^{\prime} \in \mathrm{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}$.

Recall that $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)=\pi_{!}\left(I_{0} \tilde{\boxtimes} \mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}\right)$, where $I_{0} \tilde{\boxtimes} \mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}$ is perverse. It remains to show that for each stratum $\mathcal{Y}^{\lambda, \mu}$ the complex

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{R} \Gamma_{c}\left(y^{\lambda, \mu},\left.\left(I_{0} \tilde{\boxtimes} \mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}\right)\right|_{y^{\lambda, \mu}}\right)[2 N n m] \tag{44}
\end{equation*}
$$

is placed in degrees $<0$. The key observation is that the map $y^{\lambda, \mu} \rightarrow \operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}$ sending $\left(v, V^{\prime}\right)$ to $V^{\prime}$ is a vector bundle, its rank equals $n(2 m N-\epsilon(\mu))$. Here $\epsilon(\mu)$ is the expression defined in 1). Indeed, for any lattice $V^{\prime} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}$, the fibre of this vector bundle over $V^{\prime}$ is

\operatorname{Hom}_{\ominus}\left(L,\left(\left(V^{\prime} \cap V\right) / t^{N} V\right) \otimes \Omega\right)
$$

and $\operatorname{dim}_{k}\left(V /\left(V^{\prime} \cap V\right)\right)=\operatorname{dim}\left(V+V^{\prime}\right) / V=\epsilon(\mu)$. So, (44) identifies with

\operatorname{R\Gamma }_{c}\left(\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\mu},\left.\mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}\right|_{\operatorname{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}}\right)[2 n \epsilon(\mu)] . \tag{45}
\end{equation*}
$$

By definition of the intersection cohomology sheaf, $\left.\mathscr{Q}_{H}^{\lambda}\right|_{\mathrm{Gr}_{H}^{\mu}}$ has usual cohomology sheaves in degrees $\leq-\left\langle\mu, 2 \check{\rho}_{H}\right\rangle$, and the inequality is strict unless $\mu=\lambda$. So, (45) is placed in degrees $\leq\left\langle\mu, 2 \check{\rho}_{H}\right\rangle-2 n \epsilon(\mu)$, and the inequality is strict unless $\mu=\lambda$.

One checks that for any $\tau \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$we have $\left\langle\tau, 2 \check{\rho}_{H}\right\rangle-2 m \epsilon(\tau) \leq 0$, and the inequality is strict unless $\tau=0$. Our assertion follows, because $n \geq m$.

For the convenience of the reader note that in the notation (43) for $\tau=\left(a_{1} \geq \cdots \geq a_{m}\right) \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$ one gets

\left\langle\tau, 2 \check{\rho}_{H}\right\rangle-2 m \epsilon(\tau)=-2 a_{1}-4 a_{2}-\cdots-(2 m-2) a_{m-1}-2 m\left|a_{m}\right| .
$$

Write $\mathscr{P}$ for the composition of functors

$$
\mathrm{D} \text { Weil }_{G, H} \xrightarrow{f_{H}} \mathrm{DP}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\vartheta)}(\Upsilon(F)) \xrightarrow{J_{P_{H}^{*}}^{*}} \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}^{b}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \text {. }
$$

Let $k_{0} \subset k$ be a finite subfield. Assume that all the objects of Section 6.1 are defined over $k_{0}$. Set $\theta_{0}=k_{0}[[t]]$ and $F_{0}=k_{0}((t))$.

Write $\mathrm{D} W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H, k_{0}}$, for the category of triples $\left(\mathcal{F}_{1}, \mathscr{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$ as in Definition 4, where now

$$
\mathcal{F}_{1} \in \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)\left(\theta_{0}\right)}^{b}\left(\Upsilon\left(F_{0}\right)\right), \quad \mathscr{F}_{2} \in \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)\left(\theta_{0}\right)}^{b}\left(\Pi\left(F_{0}\right)\right)
$$

are pure complexes of weight zero, and $\beta: \zeta\left(f\left(\mathcal{F}_{1}\right)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} f\left(\mathcal{F}_{2}\right)$ is an isomorphism as above (it is understood that (40) is normalized to preserve purity). Let $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H, k_{0}}, \subset \mathrm{D} W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H, k_{0}}$ be the full subcategory given by the condition that $\mathcal{F}_{i}$ is perverse.

We have a natural functor $\iota: \mathrm{D}_{\text {Weil }_{G, H, k_{0}} \rightarrow} \mathrm{DWeil}_{G, H}$ that restricts to $\iota:$ Weil $_{G, H, k_{0}} \rightarrow$ Weil $_{G, H}$.

Note that any object of $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}$ is $\mathbb{G}_{m}$-equivariant with respect to the homotheties on $L^{*} \otimes V \otimes \Omega(F)$, because it is equivariant with respect to the action of the center of $Q_{G}(\theta)$. Write
for the natural lifting of the functor $\mathscr{P}$, here we have denoted by

$$
\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)\left(\theta_{0}\right), \text { mixed }}^{b}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{0}\right)\right) \subset \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)\left(\theta_{0}\right)}^{b}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{0}\right)\right)
$$

the full subcategory of mixed complexes ([2], 5.1.5). By Corollary 3 , if $K \in \mathrm{D} W^{\prime}{ }_{( }{ }_{G, H, k_{0}}$ then $\mathscr{P}_{0}(K)$ is pure of weight zero. The Grothendieck group of $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)\left(\theta_{0}\right), \text { mixed }}^{b}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{0}\right)\right)$ is denoted by $K_{k_{0}}^{\prime}$. Remind that $K_{k_{0}}^{\prime}$ is $\mathbb{Z}$-graded by weights, and its component of weight $i$
is a free abelian group with base consisting of irreducible $\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)\left(\vartheta_{0}\right)$-equivariant pure perverse sheaves of weight $i$ on $U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega\left(F_{0}\right)$.

Proposition 7. - For $i=1,2$ let $K_{i} \in \mathrm{D}$ Weil $_{G, H, k_{0}}$. If $\mathscr{P}_{0}\left(K_{1}\right)=\mathscr{P}_{0}\left(K_{2}\right)$ in $K_{k_{0}}^{\prime}$ then $\iota\left(K_{1}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \iota\left(K_{2}\right)$ in $\mathrm{D}^{\text {Weil }}{ }_{G, H}$.

Proof. - Write $K_{k_{0}}$ for the Grothendieck group of the category D Weil ${ }_{G, H, k_{0}}$. It is $\mathbb{Z}$-graded by weights, and its component of weight $i$ is a free abelian group with base consisting of triples $\left(\mathcal{F}_{1}, \mathcal{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$ as in the definition of $W^{\text {Weil }}{ }_{G, H, k_{0}}$ such that $\mathcal{F}_{i}$ is an irreducible perverse sheaf pure of weight $i$. By Corollary 4,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{P}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}^{\mathrm{ss}}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \tag{47}
\end{equation*}
$$

identifies with $\operatorname{Sph}_{Q_{H}}$ (resp., with $\operatorname{Sph}_{Q_{G}}$ ) for $m \leq n$ (resp., for $m>n$ ). All the objects of the latter category are defined over $k_{0}$ and as such are pure of weight zero.

The functor (46) yields a homomorphism $J_{P_{H}}^{*}: K_{k_{0}} \rightarrow K_{k_{0}}^{\prime}$. Let us show that it is injective. Let $F$ be an object in its kernel. For any finite subfield $k_{0} \subset k_{1} \subset k$ we have the $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-vector space $W^{\text {Weil }}{ }_{G, H}\left(k_{1}\right)$ introduced in Section 3.2. The map $\operatorname{tr}_{k_{1}}$ trace of Frobenius over $k_{1}$ fits into the diagram

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
K_{k_{0}} & \xrightarrow{J_{P_{H}}^{*}} & K_{k_{0}}^{\prime} \\
\downarrow \operatorname{tr}_{k_{1}} & & \downarrow \operatorname{tr}_{k_{1}} \\
\text { Weil }_{G, H}\left(k_{1}\right) \xrightarrow{J_{k_{1}}} & \text { Funct }_{k_{1}}
\end{array}
$$

where Funct $k_{k_{1}}$ is the non ramified Hecke algebra $\mathscr{H}\left(Q_{H}\right)$ (resp., $\mathscr{H}\left(Q_{G}\right)$ ) of $Q_{H}$ for $m \leq n$ (resp., of $Q_{G}$ for $m>n$ ). By Proposition 2, the low horizontal arrow $J_{k_{1}}$ is injective. So, $\operatorname{tr}_{k_{1}}(F)=0$ for any finite extension $k_{0} \subset k_{1}$. By a result of Laumon ([18], Theorem 1.1.2) this implies $F=0$ in $K_{k_{0}}$. Since $K_{i}$ is pure of weight zero, the semi-simplifications of $K_{1}$ and $K_{2}$ are isomorphic in D Weil $_{G, H, k_{0}}$ by Remark 7 below, and $\iota\left(K_{1}\right) \rightrightarrows \iota\left(K_{2}\right)$ in D Weil $_{G, H}$.

Remark 7. - Let $Y$ be a scheme of finite type over $k_{0}$ and $K_{1}, K_{2}$ pure complexes of weight zero in $\mathrm{D}^{b}(Y)$. Write $K_{\text {mixed }}(Y)$ for the Grothendieck group of the subcategory $\mathrm{D}_{\text {mixed }}^{b}(Y) \subset \mathrm{D}^{b}(Y)$ of mixed complexes. If $K_{1}=K_{2}$ in $K_{\text {mixed }}(Y)$ then the semisimplifications of $K_{1}$ and $K_{2}$ are isomorphic in $\mathrm{D}^{b}(Y)$. Indeed, $K_{\text {mixed }}(Y)$ is $\mathbb{Z}$-graded by weights, and its component of weight $i$ is a free abelian group with a base consisting of irreducible perverse sheaves pure of weight $i$ on $Y$.

Conjecture 1. - Assume $m \leq n$. The irreducible objects of $W_{\text {Weil }}^{G, H}$ are exactly $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}\right), \lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$. The functor $\mathcal{T} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathscr{T}, I_{0}\right)$ yields an equivalence of categories

$$
\mathrm{Sph}_{H} \underset{\rightarrow}{\sim} \text { Weil }_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}}
$$

6.3.2. - In this subsection we assume $m \geq n$ and analyse the action of $\operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ on $\mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\vartheta)}^{b}(\Pi(F))$ in more details.

Let $\check{\omega}_{i} \in \check{\Lambda}_{G}^{+}$be the highest weight of the fundamental representation of $G$ that appears in $\wedge^{i} M_{0}$ (all the weights of $\wedge^{i} M_{0}$ are less than or equal to $\check{\omega}_{i}$ ). For $v \in \Pi(F)$ write $s_{u}(v): \wedge^{2} U(F) \rightarrow \Omega(F)$ for the composition

$$
\wedge^{2} U(F) \xrightarrow{\wedge^{2} v} \wedge^{2} M(F) \rightarrow \Omega(F) .
$$

Write Char $(\Pi) \subset \Pi(F)$ for the ind-subscheme of $v \in \Pi(F)$ such that $s_{u}(v): \wedge^{2} U \rightarrow \Omega$ is regular.

For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$let $N=\left\langle\lambda, \check{\omega}_{1}\right\rangle$, define the closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi \subset{ }_{N} \Pi=t^{-N} \Pi$ as follows. A point $v \in{ }_{N} \Pi$ lies in ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ if the following conditions hold:
C1) $v \in \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$;
$\mathrm{C} 2)$ for $i=1, \ldots, n$ the $\operatorname{map} \wedge^{i} U \xrightarrow{\wedge^{i} v}\left(\wedge^{i} M\right)\left(-\left\langle w_{0}(\lambda), \check{\omega}_{i}\right\rangle\right)$ is regular.
The scheme ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ is stable under the translations by $t^{N} \Pi$, so there is a closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi \subset{ }_{N, N} \Pi$ such that ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi$ is the preimage of ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi$ under the projection ${ }_{N} \Pi \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Pi$. As in Section 4.4, we have a map

$$
\begin{equation*}
\pi:{ }_{0, N} \Pi \tilde{\times} \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Pi \tag{48}
\end{equation*}
$$

and, by definition,

$$
\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \pi_{!}\left(\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell} \tilde{\otimes} \mathscr{Q}_{G}^{\lambda}\right)\left[\operatorname{dim}_{0, N} \Pi\right] \in \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(0)}(N, N \Pi)
$$

Since all the weights of the $G$-module $\wedge^{i} M_{0}$ are less than or equal to $\check{\omega}_{i}$, the map (48) factors through the closed subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi \hookrightarrow{ }_{N, N} \Pi$.

For $v \in \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$ let $U_{v}=v(U)+M$ and

$$
U_{v}^{\perp}=\left\{m \in M(F) \mid\left\langle m, m_{1}\right\rangle \in \Omega \text { for any } m_{1} \in U_{v}\right\}
$$

Let $M_{v}=v(U)+U_{v}^{\perp}$. Note that $U_{v} / U_{v}^{\perp}$ is naturally a symplectic vector space, and $M_{v} / U_{v}^{\perp} \subset U_{v} / U_{v}^{\perp}$ is a lagrangian subspace. So, $M_{v} \subset M(F)$ is a symplectic lattice, that is, $M_{v} \in \mathrm{Gr}_{G}$.

Stratify Char(П) by locally closed subschemes ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$ indexed by $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$. Namely, for $v \in \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$ we let $v \in{ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$ iff $M_{v} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$. The condition $M_{v} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\lambda}$ is also equivalent to requiring that there is an isomorphism of $\theta$-modules

$$
U_{v} / M \leadsto \Theta / t^{a_{1}} \oplus \cdots \oplus \Theta / t^{a_{n}}
$$

for $\lambda=\left(a_{1} \geq \cdots \geq a_{n} \geq 0\right) \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$. So, the stratification in question is by the isomorphism classes of the $\theta$-module $U_{v} / M$.

Clearly, ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Pi) \subset{ }_{\lambda} \Pi$, and there is a unique open subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0} \subset{ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi$ whose preimage under the projection ${ }_{\lambda} \Pi \rightarrow{ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi$ identifies with ${ }_{\lambda} \operatorname{Char}(\Pi)$.

Write $\operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}\right)$ for the intersection cohomology sheaf of ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}$.
Lemma 10. - Assume $m>n$.

1) For any $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$the map

$$
\pi:{ }_{0, N} \Pi \tilde{\times} \overline{\operatorname{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda} \rightarrow{ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi
$$

is an isomorphism over the open subscheme ${ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0} . S o, \operatorname{dim}_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}=2 N m n+\left\langle\lambda, 2 \check{\rho}_{G}\right\rangle$.
2) For $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$we have $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \xrightarrow{\leftrightarrows} \mathrm{IC}\left(\lambda_{, N} \Pi^{0}\right)$ canonically.

Proof. - 1) The fibre of $\pi$ over $v \in{ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}$ is the scheme classifying symplectic lattices $M^{\prime} \subset M(F)$ such that $M^{\prime} \in \overline{\mathrm{Gr}}_{G}^{\lambda}$ and $v(U) \subset M^{\prime}$. Given such lattice $M^{\prime}$, the inclusion $U_{v} \subset M^{\prime}+M$ must be an equality, because for $M^{\prime} \in \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\mu}$ with $\mu \leq \lambda$ we get

$$
\operatorname{dim}\left(M^{\prime}+M / M\right)=\epsilon(\mu) \leq \epsilon(\lambda)=\operatorname{dim}\left(U_{v} / M\right)
$$

We have set here $\epsilon(\mu):=\left\langle\mu, \check{\omega}_{n}\right\rangle$ for $\mu \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$. Thus, $M^{\prime}=M_{v}$ is the unique preimage of $v$ under $\pi$. The first assertion follows.
2) Is completely analogous to the proof of the second part of Lemma 9.

Conjecture 2. - Assume $m>n$. The irreducible objects of $W^{\text {Weil }}{ }_{G, H}$ are exactly $\mathrm{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}\right), \lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$. The functor $\mathcal{G} \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, I_{0}\right)$ yields an equivalence of categories

$$
\mathrm{Sph}_{G} \widetilde{\rightarrow} \text { Weil }_{G, H}^{\mathrm{ss}}
$$

REMARK 8. - i) For $n=1$ and $m>n$ the isomorphism $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \underset{\rightarrow}{ } \mathrm{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Pi^{0}\right)$ for $\lambda \in \Lambda_{G}^{+}$can also be obtained from Proposition 5. Indeed, in this case $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ identifies with a connected component of $\left(\mathrm{Gr}_{\mathrm{GL}_{2}}\right)_{\mathrm{red}}$. The desired irreducibility of $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right)$ becomes a particular case of Proposition 5.
ii) For $m=1$ and $m \leq n$ it is evident that $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \rightrightarrows \operatorname{IC}\left({ }_{\lambda, N} \Upsilon^{0}\right)$ for $\lambda \in \Lambda_{H}^{+}$.

### 6.4. Proof of Theorem 7

Step 1. - The following property of the Fourier transform functors follows from base change for proper morphisms. If $V \rightarrow S \leftarrow V^{*}$ is a diagram of dual vector bundles over a scheme $S$, let $\vartheta^{\prime} \rightarrow S^{\prime} \leftarrow V^{\prime *}$ be the diagram obtained from it by the base change with respect to a closed immersion $S^{\prime} \hookrightarrow S$. Then for the inclusions $i_{1}: V^{\prime} \hookrightarrow V$ and $i_{2}: V^{*} \hookrightarrow V^{*}$ we have $i_{2}^{*} \circ \operatorname{Four}_{\psi} \xrightarrow{\rightarrow} \operatorname{Four}_{\psi} \circ i_{1}^{*}$. Thus, the following diagram of functors commutes

\begin{aligned}
& \text { D Weil }{ }_{G, H} \\
& \swarrow f_{H} \quad \searrow f_{G} \\
& \mathrm{DP}_{\left(Q_{G} \times H\right)(\theta)}(\Upsilon(F)) \quad \mathrm{DP}_{\left(Q_{H} \times G\right)(\vartheta)}(\Pi(F)) \\
& \downarrow J_{P_{H}}^{*} \quad \downarrow J_{P_{G}}^{*} \\
& \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}^{b}\left(U \otimes L^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \quad \xrightarrow{\text { Four }_{\psi}} \quad \mathrm{D}_{\left(Q_{G} \times Q_{H}\right)(\theta)}^{b}\left(U^{*} \otimes L(F)\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Here $\check{\omega}_{m}$ is the h.w. of the $Q_{H}$-module $\operatorname{det} U_{0}$. The corresponding geometric restriction functor is denoted by

Let $\sigma_{H}: \check{H} \rightarrow \check{H}$ be the automorphism sending $g$ to ${ }^{t} g^{-1}$. It is understood that $\check{Q}_{G}=\operatorname{Aut}\left(W_{0}\right)$ and $\check{Q}_{H}=\operatorname{Aut}\left(W_{1}\right)$ canonically. Let $\kappa$ be the composition

Let $\sigma_{H}$ be the automorphism of $\check{H}$ sending $g$ to ${ }^{t} g^{-1}$. Let $\bar{W} \subset W_{2} \oplus W_{2}^{*}$ be the subspace spanned by $e_{n+1}+e_{n+1}^{*}$, equip $W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*} \oplus \bar{W}$ with the induced form and realize $\check{G}$ as $\operatorname{SO}\left(W_{1} \oplus W_{1}^{*} \oplus \bar{W}\right)$. Thus, the inclusion $i_{\kappa}: \check{G} \hookrightarrow \check{H}$ is fixed. There is a unique $\alpha_{\kappa}: \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ such that for $\kappa=\left(i_{\kappa}, \alpha_{\kappa}\right): \check{G} \times \mathbb{G}_{m} \rightarrow \check{H}$ the diagram (53) commutes. Actually, $\alpha_{\kappa}=2 \rho_{\mathrm{GL}\left(W_{2}\right)}+(m-n-1)\left(\check{\omega}_{n}-\check{\omega}_{m}\right)$. Note that if $m=n+1$ then $\alpha_{\kappa}$ is trivial.

By Proposition 7, (54) can be lifted to the desired isomorphism (42) in D Weil ${ }_{G, H}^{\mathrm{s}}$.
Remark 9. - In the special case $m=1$ we have $H=Q_{H}$. So, in this case Weil ${ }_{G, H}$ is equivalent to the category $\mathrm{P}_{(H \times G)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$, and one need not glue the categories as in Definition 4. The proof of Theorem 7 can be simplified in this case. For an integer $N$ let ${ }_{N}$ IC $\in \mathrm{P}_{(H \times G)(\theta)}(\Pi(F))$ denote the constant perverse sheaf on $t^{-N} \Pi$. The irreducible objects of $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}$ in this case are exactly ${ }_{N}$ IC, $N \in \mathbb{Z}$. For a dominant coweight $\lambda=N$ of $H$ in this case we get $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\lambda}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}{ }_{N} \mathrm{IC}$.

## 7. Global theta-lifting for the dual pair $\mathbb{G} \mathbb{L}_{n}, \mathbb{G}_{m}$

In this section we prove Theorems 5 and 6 .
Proof of Theorem 6. - Recall the notation $U_{0}=k^{m}, L_{0}=k^{n}$, and the groups $G=$ $\mathrm{GL}\left(L_{0}\right), H=\mathrm{GL}\left(U_{0}\right)$. Set $M_{0}=L_{0} \otimes U_{0}$ and $M=M_{0}(\theta)$ for $\theta=k[t t]$. Viewing $M_{0}$ as a representation of $G \times H$, one defines the functor $\operatorname{glob}_{\infty}: \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)(\theta) \rtimes \mathrm{Aut}^{0}(\theta)}^{b}(M(F)) \rightarrow$ $\mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\infty \mathcal{W}_{n, m}\right)$ as in Section 4.6. One gets $\operatorname{glob}_{\infty}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}{ }_{\infty} \mathcal{J}$. The Hecke functors (11) and (12) are a particular case of those defined in Section 4.6. Since glob $\infty_{\infty}$ commutes with Hecke functors, our assertion follows from the $\operatorname{Aut}^{0}(\Theta)$-equivariant version of Proposition 4 (cf. Remark 4).

Proof of Theorem 5. - The argument below mimics that of ([5], Section 4.1.8). To simplify notation, we will establish for $\& \in \operatorname{Sph}_{H}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{n}\right)$ ! an isomorphism

Let ${ }_{x, \infty} Z_{H}$ denote the stack classifying $\left(U, U^{\prime}, \beta:\left.U^{\prime} \widetilde{\rightarrow} U\right|_{X-x}\right) \in{ }_{x} \mathscr{H}_{H}, L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}$ and $s: \Theta_{X} \rightarrow L \otimes U^{\prime}(\infty x)$. We have a diagram, where both squares are cartesian

Here $h_{H}$ (resp., $h_{H}^{\overleftarrow{ }}$ ) sends $\left(U, U^{\prime}\right)$ to $U^{\prime}$ (resp., to $U$ ). The map $h_{Z, H}$ (resp., $h_{Z, H}$ ) sends $\left(U, U^{\prime}, L, s: \theta \rightarrow L \otimes U^{\prime}(\infty x)\right)$ to $\left(L, U^{\prime}, s: \varnothing \rightarrow L \otimes U^{\prime}(\infty x)\right.$ ) (resp., to $(L, U, \beta \circ s: \theta \rightarrow L \otimes U(\infty x))$ ).

Using base change and the projection formula, one gets an isomorphism

Let ${ }_{x, \infty} Z_{G}$ be the stack classifying $\left(L, L^{\prime}, \beta:\left.L^{\prime} \widetilde{\leftrightarrows} L\right|_{X-x}\right) \in{ }_{x} \mathcal{H}_{G}, U \in \operatorname{Bun}_{m}$ and $s: \vartheta_{X} \rightarrow L^{\prime} \otimes U(\infty x)$. As above, one has the diagram

Here $h_{G}$ (resp., $h_{G}^{\overleftarrow{G}}$ ) sends $\left(L, L^{\prime}\right)$ to $L^{\prime}$ (resp., to $L$ ). The map $h_{Z, G}$ (resp., $h_{Z, G}$ ) sends $\left(U, L^{\prime}, L, s: \Theta \rightarrow L^{\prime} \otimes U(\infty x)\right)$ to $\left(L^{\prime}, U, s: \Theta \rightarrow L^{\prime} \otimes U(\infty x)\right)$ (resp., to the collection $(L, U, \beta \circ s: Ө \rightarrow L \otimes U(\infty x))$ ).

The maps $h_{m} \circ h_{Z, G}^{\overleftarrow{T}}$ and $h_{m} \circ h_{Z, G}$ coincide. So, by base change and projection formula, (56) identifies with

## 8. Global theta-lifting for the dual pair $\mathbb{S O}_{2 m}, \mathbb{S} p_{2 n}$

8.1. - In this subsection we derive Theorem 3 from Theorem 4. We give the argument for $m \leq n$ (the case $m>n$ is completely similar).

By base change theorem, for $\delta \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}, K \in \mathrm{D}^{-}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right)$ ! we get

where id $\times \mathfrak{p}: X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \rightarrow X \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ and $\mathfrak{q}: \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \rightarrow \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ are the projections. By Theorem 4, the latter complex identifies with

and the projection formula show that (57) identifies with

This is what we had to prove.
8.2. - In this section we derive Theorem 4 from Theorem 7. To simplify notations, fix $x \in X$, we will establish isomorphisms (8) and (9) over $x \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$. The fact that these isomorphisms depend on $x$ as expected is left to the reader (one uses Remark 6 to check that the isomorphisms we obtain are independent of a trivialization $\left.\theta_{x} \widetilde{\leftrightarrows} k[t]\right]$ ).

Keep notations of Section 2. As in Section 6.1, let $L=\emptyset_{x}^{n}$, set $M=L \oplus L \otimes \Omega_{x}$ with the corresponding symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M \rightarrow \Omega_{x}$. Let $U=\bigoplus_{x}^{m}$, set $V=U \oplus U^{*}$ with the corresponding symmetric form $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} V \rightarrow \Theta_{x}$. Sometimes we view $M$ (resp., $V$ ) as the trivial $G$-torsor (resp., $H$-torsor) over $\operatorname{Spec} \theta_{x}$.

In view of Theorem 7, Theorem 4 is reduced to the following result, which we actually prove.

Proposition 8. - There is a natural functor $\mathrm{LW}: \mathrm{D}$ Weil $_{G, H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}\right)$ commuting with the actions of both $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ and $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$. There is an isomorphism $\mathrm{LW}\left(I_{0}\right) \xrightarrow{\hookrightarrow} \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$.
8.2.1. - The proof is based on the following construction from [16]. Let $\mathscr{L}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ denote the scheme of discrete lagrangian lattices in $M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)$. Let $\mathscr{Q}_{d}$ be the line bundle on $\mathscr{L}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ with fibre $\operatorname{det}(M \otimes V: R)$ at $R \in \mathscr{L}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ (cf. loc. cit. for the definition of this relative determinant). Note that $\mathscr{G}_{d}$ is $(G \times H)\left(\theta_{x}\right)$-equivariant, so it can be viewed as a line bundle on the stack quotient

Write $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right) /$ $(G \times H)\left(\Theta_{x}\right)$ for the corresponding $\mu_{2}$-gerb over $\mathscr{L}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right) /(G \times H)\left(\Theta_{x}\right)$.

Let $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}^{x}$ be the stack classifying $\mathcal{M} \in \operatorname{Bun}_{G}, V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ and isomorphisms

of the corresponding $G$-torsors and $H$-torsors over Spec $\theta_{x}$. One has a morphism of schemes

The group $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right)$ acts on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}^{x}$ as follows. An element $g \in G\left(F_{x}\right)$ sends the above point of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}^{x}$ to $\left(\mathcal{M}^{\prime}, \gamma_{G}^{\prime}, \mathcal{V}, \gamma_{H}\right)$, where $\gamma_{G}^{\prime}=g \gamma_{G}$ and $\mathcal{M}^{\prime}$ is the $\Theta_{X}$-module whose sections over an open subset $U \subset X$ are $s \in \mathrm{H}^{0}(U-x, \mathcal{M})$ such that $g \gamma_{G}(s) \in M\left(\theta_{x}\right)$. The action of $H\left(F_{x}\right)$ is similar.

The morphism ${ }_{0} \xi_{x}$ is equivariant with respect to natural actions of $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right)$. Taking the stack quotient by $(G \times H)\left(\theta_{x}\right)$, it yields a morphism of stacks

is equipped with an isomorphism $\mathscr{B}^{2} \leftrightharpoons \operatorname{det} R \Gamma(X, \mathcal{M} \otimes V)$ given by Lemma 1 .
For $r \geq 0$ write ${ }_{r x} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \subset \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ for the open substack given by $\mathrm{H}^{0}(X, \mathcal{M} \otimes \mathcal{V}(-r x))=0$ for $\mathcal{M} \in \operatorname{Bun}_{G}, \mathcal{V} \in \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$. If $r^{\prime} \geq r$ then $_{r x} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H} \subset r_{r^{\prime} x} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ is an open substack, and we have a natural functor from the projective 2 -limit to the whole derived category

Its fibre at $1 \in \operatorname{Gr}_{S L\left(M_{0}\right)}$ is canonically trivialized, so the line bundle itself is canonically trivialized.

By Lemma 11, for $g \in G\left(F_{x}\right), h \in H\left(F_{x}\right)$ we have a canonical $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-graded isomorphism

$$
\begin{aligned}
\operatorname{det}(M \otimes V: g M \otimes h V) \widetilde{\rightrightarrows} \operatorname{det}(M \otimes V: g M \otimes V) \otimes & \operatorname{det}(g M \otimes V: g M \otimes h V) \widetilde{\rightrightarrows} \\
& \operatorname{det}(M: g M)^{2 m} \otimes \operatorname{det}(V: h V)^{2 n}
\end{aligned}
$$

It yields a canonical section $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)$ sending $\left(g \in G\left(F_{x}\right), h \in H\left(F_{x}\right)\right.$ to $\left(g \otimes h, \mathcal{B}, \mathscr{B}^{2} \rightrightarrows \operatorname{det}(M \otimes V: g M \otimes h V)\right)$, where

$$
\mathcal{B}=\operatorname{det}(M: g M)^{m} \otimes \operatorname{det}(V: h V)^{n} .
$$

The canonical sections $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)$ and $\mathbb{S p}(M \otimes V)\left(\theta_{x}\right) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)$ are compatible over $(G \times H)\left(\theta_{x}\right)$.

The group $\widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)$ acts naturally on $\tilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$. Let $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right)$ act on $\tilde{\mathcal{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ via the canonical section $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)$. Let

$$
{ }_{0} \tilde{\xi}_{x}: \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}^{x} \rightarrow \tilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)
$$

be the morphism sending $(\mathcal{M}, \mathcal{V})$ to $\left({ }_{0} \xi_{x}(\mathcal{M}, \mathcal{V}), \mathscr{B}\right)$ with $\mathscr{B}$ given by (59). Then ${ }_{0} \tilde{\xi}_{x}$ is naturally $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right)$-equivariant. For this reason, (60) commutes with the actions of $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ and $\mathrm{D} \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$ on both sides (cf. Proposition 11).
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8.2.5. Proof of Proposition 8. - Recall the notation $\Upsilon=L^{*} \otimes V \otimes \Omega_{x}$ and $\Pi=U^{*} \otimes M$ from Section 6.1. Consider the decomposition $M \otimes V=(L \otimes V) \oplus\left(L^{*} \otimes V \otimes \Omega_{x}\right)$. In ([16], Definition 5) we associated to this decomposition a functor

$$
\mathcal{F}_{L \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}: \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\Upsilon\left(F_{x}\right)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)\right)
$$

exact for the perverse t -structures (its definition is also found in Appendix A). Let also

$$
\mathcal{F}_{M \otimes U\left(F_{x}\right)}: \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)\right)
$$

denote the corresponding functor for the decompositioon $M=(M \otimes U) \oplus\left(M \otimes U^{*}\right)$. By ([16], Theorem 2 and Proposition 5), the diagram is canonically 2-commutative

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\Upsilon\left(F_{x}\right)\right) \xrightarrow{\mathscr{F}_{L \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}} \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\tilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)\right) \\
& \quad \downarrow \zeta \\
& \mathrm{D}^{b}\left(\Pi\left(F_{x}\right)\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\zeta$ is the partial Fourier transform (40).
Let $(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right)$ act on $\tilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)$ via the canonical section

$$
(G \times H)\left(F_{x}\right) \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathbb{S p}}(M \otimes V)\left(F_{x}\right)
$$

Then $\mathcal{F}_{L \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}$ commutes with the action of $H\left(F_{x}\right)$, and $\mathcal{F}_{M \otimes U\left(F_{x}\right)}$ commutes with the action of $G\left(F_{x}\right)$ (cf. [16], Section 6.6). So, if $\left(\mathscr{F}_{1}, \mathscr{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$ is an object of $W_{\text {eil }}^{G, H}$ as in Definition 4 then $\mathscr{F}_{L \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}\left(\mathscr{F}_{1}\right)$ is $H\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)$-equivariant, and $\mathscr{F}_{M \otimes U\left(F_{x}\right)}\left(\mathscr{F}_{2}\right)$ is $G\left(\vartheta_{x}\right)$-equivariant. We get a functor

$$
\mathrm{LW}_{d}: \text { Weil }_{G, H} \rightarrow \mathrm{P}_{(G \times H)\left(\Theta_{x}\right)}\left(\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)\right)
$$

sending $\left(\mathscr{F}_{1}, \mathscr{F}_{2}, \beta\right)$ to $\mathscr{F}_{L \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}\left(\mathcal{F}_{1}\right)$. By definition, we get $\mathrm{LW}_{d}\left(I_{0}\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} S_{M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)}$. Extend $\mathrm{LW}_{d}$ to a functor

$$
\mathrm{LW}_{d}: \mathrm{D} \text { Weil }_{G, H} \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{(G \times H)\left(\theta_{x}\right)}\left(\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}\left(M \otimes V\left(F_{x}\right)\right)\right)
$$

by $\mathrm{LW}_{d}(K[r])=\mathrm{LW}_{d}(K)[r]$. By Proposition 10 from Appendix A, $\mathrm{LW}_{d}$ commutes with the actions of both $\mathrm{DSph}_{G}$ and $\mathrm{DSph}_{H}$. Finally, we set $\mathrm{LW}=\tilde{\xi}_{x}^{*} \circ \mathrm{LW}_{d}$. Our assertion follows.

Thus, Proposition 8 and Theorem 4 are proved.
8.3. - In this subsection we establish some additional properties of Aut $_{G, H}$. Write $S_{i}$ for the stratum of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ given by $\operatorname{dim} \mathrm{H}^{0}(X, M \otimes V)=i$ for $M \in \operatorname{Bun}_{G}, V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$.

Proposition 9. - i) The complex Aut $_{G, H}$ is placed in perverse degrees $\geq 0$.
ii) For any $n, m$ the complex Aut $_{G, H}$ has nontrivial perverse cohomologies in degrees larger than any given integer.

Proof. - i) Recall that $\operatorname{Bun}_{P(G)}$ is the stack classifying $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}$ and an exact sequence $0 \rightarrow \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \rightarrow$ ? $\rightarrow \Omega \rightarrow 0$ on $X$. Let ${ }^{0} \operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H} \subset \operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H}$ be the open substack given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{H}^{0}\left(X, \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L\right)=0 \quad \text { and } \quad \mathrm{H}^{1}\left(X, L^{*} \otimes \Omega \otimes V\right)=0 \tag{62}
\end{equation*}
$$

for $V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{H},(L \subset M) \in \operatorname{Bun}_{P(G)}$.

Let $\mathscr{Y}_{P(G)}$ be the stack classifying $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}$ and $s: \operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \rightarrow \Omega^{2}$. So, $\mathscr{Y}_{P(G)}$ and $\mathrm{Bun}_{P(G)}$ are generalized dual vector bundles over $\mathrm{Bun}_{n}$.

Denote by ${ }^{0}\left(\mathscr{Y}_{P(G)} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right) \subset \mathscr{Y}_{P(G)} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ the open substack given by (62). We have the Fourier transform

$$
\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}: \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(y_{P(G)} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}^{\prec}\left(\operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H}\right) .
$$

Write $\nu: \operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H} \rightarrow \operatorname{Bun}_{G \times H}$ for the projection. Its restriction ${ }^{0} \nu:{ }^{0} \operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H} \rightarrow$ $\operatorname{Bun}_{G \times H}$ is smooth and surjective.

Let $V_{n, H}$ be the stack classifying $L \in \operatorname{Bun}_{n}, V \in \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ and $v: L \rightarrow V \otimes \Omega$. Let ${ }^{0} V_{n, H} \subset V_{n, H}$ be the open substack given by (62). We have an affine map $\pi_{\mathscr{L}}: V_{n, H} \rightarrow$ $y_{P(G)} \times \operatorname{Bun}_{H}$ sending $v$ to the composition

$$
\operatorname{Sym}^{2} L \xrightarrow{v \otimes v} \operatorname{Sym}^{2}(V \otimes \Omega) \rightarrow \Omega^{2} .
$$

Set

$$
J=\left(\left.\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\right|_{V_{n, H}}\right)\left[\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{H}+\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{n}+a_{H}\right],
$$

where $a_{H}$ is the function of a connected component of $V_{n, H}$ sending ( $L, V, v$ ) to $\chi\left(L^{*} \otimes \Omega \otimes V\right)$. By ([20], Proposition 1), there is an isomorphism over $\operatorname{Bun}_{P(G) \times H}$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{Four}_{\psi}\left(\pi_{\mathscr{L}}\right)^{\prime} \mathscr{\rightarrow} \nu^{*} \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}(\nu)] . \tag{63}
\end{equation*}
$$

The complex $g$ is perverse over ${ }^{0} V_{n, H}$ and coincides with $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}\left[\operatorname{dim}\left({ }^{0} V_{n, H}\right)\right]$. Since $\pi_{\mathscr{L}}$ is affine, $\left(\pi_{\mathscr{f}}\right)$ ! is left exact for the perverse t -structure. So, (63) implies that

$$
{ }^{0} \nu^{*} \operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}\left[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}\left({ }^{0} \nu\right)\right]
$$

is placed in perverse degrees $\geq 0$.
ii) Consider two cases.

CASE $2 n>m-1$. Pick a $k$-point $M$ of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ and a rank $m$ vector bundle $E$ on $X$ of degree zero. Let $\mathscr{C}$ be a line bundle on $X$ of degree $a>0$ large enough in the sense below. Set $U=E \otimes \mathscr{G}$ and $V=U \oplus U^{*}$ with the symmetric form $\operatorname{Sym}^{2} V \rightarrow \theta_{X}$ as in Section 3.2. The pair $(M, V)$ can be viewed as a closed substack $Y:=B(\operatorname{Aut}(M) \times \operatorname{Aut}(V))$ of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$. We will let $a$ go to infinity, below we write const for quantities independent of $a$.

The dimension of the group of automorphisms $\operatorname{Aut}(M)$ is constant, whence $\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Aut}(V)=m(m-1) a+$ const. Since $a$ is large enough, $Y \subset S_{i}$ for $i=2 n m a+$ const. Assuming that $\mathrm{Aut}_{G, H}$ is placed in perverse degrees $\leq C$ for some $C>0$, we get

$$
\text { const }-m(m-1) a=\operatorname{dim} Y \leq \operatorname{dim} S_{i} \leq \operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}-i+C=\text { const }-2 n m a .
$$

Since $2 n>m-1$, this is a contradiction.
Case $2 m>n+1$. Pick a $k$-point $V$ of $\mathrm{Bun}_{H}$ and a rank $n$ vector bundle $E$ on $X$ of degree zero. Let $\mathscr{G}$ be a line bundle on $X$ of degree $a>0$ large enough. Set $L=E \otimes \mathscr{G}$ and $M=L \oplus L^{*} \otimes \Omega$ with symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M \rightarrow \Omega$ as in Section 6.1. As above, we get a closed substack $Y=B(\operatorname{Aut}(M) \times \operatorname{Aut}(V))$ of $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$. Write const for quantities independent of $a$.

In this case $\operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Aut}(M)=n(n+1) a+$ const. For $a$ large enough we have $Y \subset S_{i}$ for $i=2 n m a+$ const. If Aut ${ }_{G, H}$ is placed in perverse degrees $\leq C$ then

$$
\text { const }-n(n+1) a=\operatorname{dim} Y \leq \operatorname{dim} S_{i} \leq \operatorname{dim} \operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}-i+C=\text { const }-2 n m a .
$$

Since $2 m>n+1$, this is a contradiction.
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Any pair of integers $n, m>0$ satisfies one of the above inequalities. We are done.
Remark 10. - The complex $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$ on $\operatorname{Bun}_{G, H}$ is not pure in general. Let us show that for $m=1$ and any $n$ the complex $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$ is not pure.

Recall that $\mathrm{Bun}_{G}$ is irreducible. We have $\operatorname{Bun}_{H}=\operatorname{Pic} X$. Consider the connected component $\left(\operatorname{Pic}^{0} X\right) \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$, the intersection $U$ of this component with $S_{0}$ is nonempty. Indeed, take $V=\theta_{X}^{2}$, the corresponding point of $\operatorname{Pic}^{0} X$ is $\theta_{X}$. There is $M \in \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ with $\mathrm{H}^{0}(M)=$ 0.

Over $\mathcal{U}$ the complex $\operatorname{Aut}_{G, H}$ identifies with the constant perverse sheaf $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}[\operatorname{dim} \mathscr{U}]$. Its intermediate extension to $\left(\mathrm{Pic}^{0} X\right) \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ is the constant perverse sheaf. If Aut ${ }_{G, H}$ was pure, this constant perverse sheaf would be its direct summand. However, $\left(\operatorname{Pic}^{0} X\right) \times \operatorname{Bun}_{G}$ contains points of $S_{i}$ for some $i>0$. The $*$-fibre of $\mathrm{Aut}_{G, H}$ at such point is the trivial onedimensional space placed in usual degree $i-\operatorname{dim} \mathcal{U}$. It cannot contain $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}[\operatorname{dim} \mathcal{U}]$ as a direct summand.

## Appendix A

## Complement to [16]

A.1. - In this appendix independent of the rest of the paper we prove Proposition 10 below. We freely use the notations from [16].

Let $\theta=k[[t]] \subset F=k((t))$, let $\Omega$ be the completed module of relative differentials of $\theta$ over $k$. Let $U$ be a free $\theta$-module of $\operatorname{rank} d$, set $M=U \oplus U^{*} \otimes \Omega$. Equip $M$ with a natural symplectic form $\wedge^{2} M \rightarrow \Omega$, so that $U$ and $U^{*} \otimes \Omega$ are lagrangian.

For a c-lattice $R \subset R^{\perp} \subset M(F)$ remind that $\mathscr{G}_{R}$ is the line bundle on $\mathcal{L}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$ with fibre $\operatorname{det} L \otimes \operatorname{det}(M: R)$ at $L$. Write $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$ for the gerb of square roots of $\mathscr{Q}_{R}$.

Let $g \in G(F)$ be a $k$-point and $\tilde{g}=(g, \mathcal{B}) \in \tilde{G}(F)$ with $\mathscr{B}^{2} \rightrightarrows \operatorname{det}(M: g M)$ its lifting to $\tilde{G}(F)$. One has a canonical isomorphism

$$
\begin{equation*}
\tilde{g}: \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(g R^{\perp} / g R\right) \tag{64}
\end{equation*}
$$

defined as follows. It sends $\left(L, \mathscr{B}_{1}\right) \in \tilde{\mathcal{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$ with $\mathscr{B}_{1}^{2} \rightrightarrows \operatorname{det} L \otimes \operatorname{det}(M: R)$ to $\left(g L, \mathcal{B} \otimes \mathcal{B}_{1}\right)$ equipped with

Let $H_{R}=\left(R^{\perp} / R\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1}$ be the corresponding Heisenberg group. Then (64) gives rise to the isomorphism

$$
\tilde{g}: \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right) \times \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right) \times H_{R} \widetilde{\leftrightarrows} \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(g R^{\perp} / g R\right) \times \tilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(g R^{\perp} / g R\right) \times H_{g R}
$$

for which one has canonically

$$
\begin{equation*}
\tilde{g}^{*} F \rightrightarrows F . \tag{65}
\end{equation*}
$$

Here, by abuse of notation, for each finite-dimensional symplectic $k$-space $M_{0}$ we denote by $F$ the perverse sheaf on $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(M_{0}\right) \times \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(M_{0}\right) \times H_{M_{0}}$ from (loc. cit., Theorem 1).

For any $L_{R}^{0}, Q_{R}^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$ the diagram is canonically 2-commutaive

$$
\begin{array}{ccc}
\mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{Q_{R}} & \xrightarrow{\mathcal{F}_{L_{R}^{0}, Q_{R}^{0}}} & \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{L_{R}} \\
\downarrow g & & \downarrow g \\
\mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{g\left(Q_{R}\right)} \xrightarrow{\mathcal{F}_{\tilde{g}\left(L_{R}^{0}\right), \tilde{g}\left(Q_{R}^{0}\right)}} \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{g\left(L_{R}\right)}
\end{array}
$$

for the functors $\mathcal{F}_{L_{R}^{0}, Q_{R}^{0}}$ from (loc. cit., Section 6.2). Here the categories in the top (resp., low) row are categories of certain sheaves on $H_{R}$ (resp., on $H_{g R}$ ).
A.2. - We let $\mathrm{GL}(U)(F)$ act on $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))$ via the section

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{GL}(U)(F) \rightarrow \tilde{G}(F) \tag{66}
\end{equation*}
$$

defined in (loc. cit. just after Definition 5).
For a $k$-point $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathcal{L}}_{d}(M(F))$ in (loc. cit., Proposition 5) we introduced the functor

\mathscr{F}_{U(F), L^{0}}: \mathrm{D}\left(U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{L} .
$$

Let us reformulate its definition. Given two c-lattices $T \subset S$ in $U(F)$, let

' T=\left\{x \in U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F) \mid\langle x, u\rangle \in \Omega \text { for all } u \in T\right\},
$$

similarly for 'S. Then 'S $\subset$ ' $T$ are c-lattices in $U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)$. Let $R=T \oplus{ }^{\prime} S$ then $R \subset R^{\perp}=S \oplus^{\prime} T$, and $R^{\perp} / R$ is a symplectic space.

Set $U_{R}=S / T \in \mathscr{L}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$. Let

$$
U_{R}^{0}=\left(U_{R}, \operatorname{det}(U: T)\right) \in \widetilde{\mathcal{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)
$$

equipped with a canonical $\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z}$-graded isomorphism $\operatorname{det}(U: T)^{2} \rightrightarrows \operatorname{det} U_{R} \otimes \operatorname{det}(M: R)$. One has a canonical isomorphism $\mathrm{P}\left({ }^{\prime} T /{ }^{\prime} S\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathscr{H}_{U_{R}}$ exact for the perverse t-structures. Then $\mathscr{F}_{U(F), L^{0}}$ is the limit of the functors

$$
\mathrm{D}\left(^{\prime} T /^{\prime} S\right) \xlongequal{\rightrightarrows} \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{U_{R}} \xrightarrow{\mathcal{I}_{L_{R}^{0}, U_{R}^{0}}^{0}} \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{L_{R}}
$$

as $T$ becomes smaller and $S$ becomes bigger inside $U(F)$.
Proposition 5 from loc. cit. can be strengthened as follows.
Lemma 12. - Let $g \in \operatorname{GL}(U)(F)$. For a $k$-point $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))$ the diagram is canonically 2-commutative

$$
\begin{array}{cc}
\mathrm{D}\left(U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \xrightarrow{\mathcal{F}_{U(F), L^{0}}} \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{L} \\
& \downarrow g \\
& \downarrow g \\
\mathrm{D}\left(U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \xrightarrow{\mathcal{G}_{U(F), \tilde{g} L^{0}}} \mathrm{D} \mathscr{H}_{g L},
\end{array}
$$

where $\tilde{g}$ is the image of $g$ under (66). Here the left vertical arrow sends $K$ to $g_{*} K$.

Proof. - Given c-lattices $T \subset S \subset U(F)$ set $R=T \oplus^{\prime} S$. For the corresponding decomposition $g R=g T \oplus g^{\prime} S$ one gets $g\left(U_{R}\right)=U_{g R} \in \mathscr{L}\left(g R^{\perp} / g R\right)$. Moreover, $\tilde{g}\left(U_{R}^{0}\right)=U_{g R}^{0}$, where $\tilde{g}$ is the map (64). As in Section A.1, the following diagram is canonically 2 -commutative

Our assertion follows by going to the limit as $T$ becomes smaller and $S$ becomes bigger in $U(F)$.

The diagram

is canonically 2 -commutative, where the right vertical arrow sends $K$ to $\left(\tilde{g}^{-1}\right)^{*} K$ (cf. loc. cit., Section 6.3-6.4). Combining this fact with Lemma 12, we get that the functor

Let now $H \subset \mathrm{GL}(U)$ be a closed connected reductive subgroup. The line bundle $\mathscr{Q}_{d}$ on $\mathscr{L}_{d}(M(F))$ is $H(\theta)$-equivariant, so we have a $\mu_{2}$-gerb $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F)) / H(\theta)$ of square roots of $\mathscr{Q}_{d}$ over the stack quotient $\mathscr{L}_{d}(M(F)) / H(\theta)$.

Proposition 10. - The functor

\mathcal{F}_{U(F)}: \mathrm{D}_{H(\theta)}\left(U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{H(\theta)}\left(\tilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))\right)

commutes with the Hecke functors for $H$ acting on both sides.
Let us first give a proof at the level of functions. Remind that if $R \subset M(F)$ is a c-lattice then

is the open substack of $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))$ such that $L \cap R=0$. Let $T \subset S \subset U(F)$ be c-lattices, set $R=T \oplus^{\prime} S$. By definition, if $K \in \mathrm{D}\left({ }^{\prime} T /{ }^{\prime} S\right)$ then the restriction of $\mathcal{F}_{U(F)}(K)$ to $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R}$ is given by

for $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R}$. Here $L_{R}^{0}$ is the image of $L^{0}$ under the natural map $\delta_{R}: \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R} \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(R^{\perp} / R\right)$, and $(-y, 0) \in\left(R^{\perp} / R\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \rightrightarrows H_{R}$. We denoted by $d y$ a suitable Haar measure.

Now let $\mathcal{G} \in \mathrm{Sph}_{H}$ and $K \in \mathrm{D}_{H(\vartheta)}\left(U^{*} \otimes \Omega(F)\right)$. Recall that, at the level of functions, $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{G}, K)$ is the function

where $d g$ is a Haar measure on $\mathrm{Gr}_{H}$.
Let us check the equality of functions $\mathcal{F}_{U(F)} \mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, K)=\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathscr{T}, \mathcal{F}_{U(F)}(K)\right)$ at a given point $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))$. Pick $T$ sufficiently small and $S$ sufficiently large with respect to $\mathcal{T}$, $K$ and such that $L^{0} \in \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R}$. The value of $\mathscr{F}_{U(F)} \mathrm{H}_{H}(\mathcal{T}, K)$ at $L^{0}$ is

\int_{y \in^{\prime} T /^{\prime} S, g \in H(F)} F_{L_{R}^{0}, U_{R}^{0}}((-y, 0)) K\left(g^{-1} y\right) \mathcal{T}(g) d y d g .
$$

After the change of variables $g^{-1} y=z$, in view of (65) the above expression becomes

& \int_{z \in g^{-1}(' T) / g^{-1}(' S), g \in H(F)} F_{\tilde{g}^{-1}\left(L_{R}^{0}\right), \tilde{g}^{-1}\left(U_{R}^{0}\right)}((-z, 0)) K(z) \mathcal{T}(g) d z d g .
\end{aligned}
$$

Here $\tilde{g}$ is the image of $g$ under (66). Recall that $\tilde{g}^{-1}\left(U_{R}^{0}\right)=U_{g^{-1} R}^{0}$ for any $g \in \operatorname{GL}(U)(F)$. We have also $\tilde{g}^{-1}\left(L_{R}^{0}\right)=\left(\tilde{g}^{-1} L^{0}\right)_{g^{-1} R}$.

Since $g^{-1} L \in \mathscr{L}_{d}(M(F))_{g^{-1} R}$, the value of $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}\left(\mathcal{T}, \mathscr{F}_{U(F)}(K)\right)$ at $L^{0}$ is

$$

& \int_{g \in H(F)}\left(\mathcal{F}_{U(F)}(K)\right)\left(\tilde{g}^{-1} L^{0}\right) \mathcal{T}(g) d g= \\
& \quad \int_{g \in H(F), z \in g^{-1}\left('^{\prime} T\right) / g^{-1}\left('^{\prime} S\right)} F_{\left(\tilde{g}^{-1} L^{0}\right)_{g^{-1} R_{R}, U_{g^{-1} R}^{0}}((-z, 0)) K(z) \mathcal{T}(g) d z d g .} .
\end{aligned}
$$

So, both expressions coincide. This completes the proof of Proposition 10 at the level of functions.

Remark 11. - Let $\bar{T} \subset T \subset S \subset \bar{S}$ be c-lattices in $U(F)$. Set $\bar{R}=\bar{T} \oplus^{\prime} \bar{S}$ and $R=T \oplus^{\prime} S$. The fact that (67) does not change if $R$ is replaced by $\bar{R}$ is a consequence of the following claim (obtained from loc. cit. Lemma 5 and Proposition 3). Let $V=\bar{T} \oplus^{\prime} S$, so that $V^{\perp}=S \oplus^{\prime} \bar{T}$. Let $H_{\bar{R}}=\left(\bar{R}^{\perp} / \bar{R}\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1}$ and $H_{V}=\left(V^{\perp} / V\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1}$ be the corresponding Heisenberg groups. Set $i_{V}: H^{V}=\left(V^{\perp} / \bar{R}\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \hookrightarrow H_{\bar{R}}$, this is a closed subgroup. Let $\alpha_{V}: H^{V} \rightarrow H_{V}$ be the map $(u, a) \mapsto(u \bmod V, a)$. Then

up to a shift. Further, let $H^{R}:=\left(R^{\perp} / V\right) \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \subset H_{V}$, let $\alpha_{R}: H^{R} \rightarrow H_{R}$ be the map sending $(u, a)$ to $(u \bmod R, a)$. Write $i_{R}: H^{R} \hookrightarrow H_{V}$ for the natural closed immersion. Then

$$

up to a shift (both claims are also true in families as $L^{0}$ varies in $\left.\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R}\right)$. Actually, the complex $i_{R}^{*} F_{L_{V}^{0}, U_{V}^{0}}$ is constant along the fibres of $\alpha_{R}$.
A.3. - The precise definition of the Hecke functors

$$

Here $\tilde{\mathcal{L}}\left(Z^{\perp} / Z\right) / H\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$ denotes the corresponding $\mu_{2}$-gerb over the stack $\mathcal{L}\left(Z^{\perp} / Z\right) / H\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)$.
If $r$ is large enough then the restriction of $\mathrm{H}_{H}^{\leftarrow}(\mathscr{T}, K)$ to $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R}$ is the inverse image under the natural map $\widetilde{\mathscr{L}}_{d}(M(F))_{R} \rightarrow \widetilde{\mathscr{L}}\left(\bar{Y}^{\perp} / \bar{Y}\right)_{R}$ of the complex

\operatorname{pr}_{1!}\left(\mathcal{G} \otimes \tau_{\mathscr{L}}^{*} K\right)
$$

(up to a shift depending on a connected component of ${s_{1}, s_{1}}^{\mathrm{Gr}_{H}}$ ).
A.4. - The geometrization of the proof from Section A. 2 is quite formal, so we only give a sketch. Recall that for a free $\theta$-module $\mathcal{V}$ and $N+r \geq 0$ we write ${ }_{N, r} V=t^{-N} V / t^{r} V$.

Let $K \in \mathrm{D}_{H(\theta)}\left(N_{1}, r_{1} U^{*} \otimes \Omega\right)$. be the map sending $\left(L_{R}^{0}, y\right)$ to $\left(L_{R}^{0}, U_{R}^{0},(-y, 0)\right)$.
From Remark 11 together with (65) one gets the following. There is an isomorphism

The above diagram gives rise, by taking the corresponding stack quotients, to the following one

## Appendix B

## Ind-pro systems and Hecke functors

## B.1. Ind-schemes with an action of $G(F)$

B.1.1. - On the referee's request we add this appendix where we generalize to some extent the ind-pro systems and Hecke functors used in this paper. We will use the terminology from ([13], Section 4).

Let $I$ be a partially ordered set filtering in both directions, that is, for $\alpha_{1}, \alpha_{2} \in \mathscr{I}$ there are $\alpha, \beta \in I$ such that $\beta \leq \alpha_{i} \leq \alpha$ for $i=1,2$. The limit by $I$ will be the limit as $\alpha$ becomes bigger in $\mathcal{I}$. Let $\mathcal{J}^{0}$ be $\mathcal{I}$ with the reversed order. Set $I=\{(\alpha \in \mathcal{J}, \beta \in \mathscr{J}) \mid \beta \leq \alpha\}$.

Assume given an ind-pro system $\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ indexed by pairs $(\alpha, \beta) \in I$. Assume that $X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ is a $k$-scheme of finite type, and
(1) For each $\alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in I$ the structure $\operatorname{map} i_{\beta}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}: X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \rightarrow X_{\beta}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ is a closed embedding.
(2) For each $\beta \leq \beta^{\prime} \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$ the structure map $p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}: X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha} \rightarrow X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ is an affine morphism smooth of some relative dimension $d\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right)$ independent of $\alpha$.

is cartesian.
(4) there is $(\alpha, \beta) \in I$ such that $X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ is smooth.
 locally compact over $k$. By (loc. cit., Proposition 4.4.2), one has canonically

Set $X_{\beta}^{\infty}=\lim _{\longrightarrow \alpha \in \mathcal{J}} X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ and $X_{\infty}^{\alpha}=\lim _{\square}^{\leftrightarrows \in \mathcal{J}^{0}} X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$. Passing to limits, one gets the structure maps $i_{\infty}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}: X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ and $p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\infty}: X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\infty} \rightarrow X_{\beta}^{\infty}$.

Assume in addition that each fibre of the map $p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}$ is isomorphic to an affine space of dimension $d\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right)$.

Under these assumptions, define the derived category $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ of étale $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-sheaves on $X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ as follows.

The functor $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}\right)$ given by $K \mapsto\left(p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}\right)^{*} K\left[d\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right)\right]$ is exact for the perverse t -structures and fully faithful, and similarly for the functors $\left(i_{\beta}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}\right)!$. We let $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ be the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}, \beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$. Similarly for the category $\mathrm{P}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ of perverse sheaves.

The function $d$ is initially defined on pairs $\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right) \in \mathscr{I}$. We extended it to a function $d: I \times I \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ as follows: if $\beta^{\prime} \leq \alpha$ and $\beta \leq \alpha$ for some $\alpha \in I$ then $d\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right)=$ $d\left(\alpha, \beta^{\prime}\right)-d(\alpha, \beta)$.
B.1.2. - Let now $G$ be a connected reductive group over $k$, set $\theta=k[[t]] \subset F=k((t))$. Assume that $G(\theta)$ acts (on the left) on each $X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ via its finite-dimensional quotient $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$ for some $r$ depending on $\alpha, \beta$. Assume that the maps $i_{\beta}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}$ and $p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}$ are $G(\theta)$-equivariant. Then $G(\theta)$ acts on each $X_{\infty}^{\alpha}$ (in the sense of functors), namely $g \in G(\theta)$ sends the projective system $\left(x_{\beta}\right)$ to the projective system $\left(g x_{\beta}\right)$. The induced maps $X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ are $G(\theta)$-equivariant, so $G(\theta)$ acts in the sense of functors on the ind-scheme $X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ (cf. loc. cit and [8], appendix).

One defines the equivariant derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ as follows. For $(\alpha, \beta) \in I$ the group $G(\theta)$ acts on each $X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ via its finite-dimensional quotient $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$, and for $r_{1} \geq r$ the projection between the stack quotients

$$
G\left(\theta / t^{r_{1}}\right) \backslash X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \rightarrow G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right) \backslash X_{\beta}^{\alpha}
$$

yields an equivalence of the derived categories, exact for the perverse $t$-structures equivalence of the derived categories

$$
D_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{r}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{r_{1}}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) .
$$

Denote by $D_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ the equivariant derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{r_{1}}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for any $r_{1} \geq r$.

For $\beta \leq \beta^{\prime} \in \mathcal{J}^{0}, \alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathcal{I}$ the diagram (70) yields a diagram

$$
\begin{array}{cc}
\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}\right) & \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \\
\uparrow \uparrow & \uparrow \\
\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) & \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right)
\end{array}
$$

where each arrow is fully faithful and exact for the perverse t -structures functor. Define $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ as the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ as $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}, \beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$.

Along the same lines, one defines the category $\mathrm{P}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ of perverse sheaves on $X_{\infty}^{\infty}$.
Define also the derived category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ as follows. Let $K \subset G(F)$ be a closed subscheme $G(\theta)$-invariant on the left and right and such that $K / G(\theta)$ is of finite type. Given $(\alpha, \beta) \in I$ let $r$ be large enough so that $G(\theta)$ acts on $X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)$ via $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$. For any $s \geq r$ one has a canonical equivalence exact for the perverse t -structures

$$
\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{D}_{G\left(\theta / t^{s}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right) .
$$

Define $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ as $\mathrm{D}_{G\left(\vartheta / t^{s}\right)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ for any $s \geq r$. Then the category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ is defined as the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ under $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}, \beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$ and $K$ becoming bigger and bigger. We similarly have the category $\mathrm{P}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ of perverse sheaves.
B.1.3. - Now assume in addition that each $X_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ is equidimensional then for $\alpha, \alpha^{\prime} \in J$ one defines the relative dimension $\operatorname{dim}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}: X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right)$ as $\operatorname{dim} X_{\beta}^{\alpha}-\operatorname{dim} X_{\beta}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ for any $\beta \in \mathscr{I}$ with $\beta \leq \alpha, \beta \leq \alpha^{\prime}$.

Assume that the action of $G(\theta)$ on $X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ is extended to an action of $G(F)$ (in the sense of functors). Write act : $X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times G(F) \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ for the map $(x, g) \mapsto g^{-1} x$. We need the following well known result.

Lemma 13. - If $A$ is a commutative ring and $A_{i}$ is an inductive system of flat $A$-algebras indexed by a filtering poset then $\xrightarrow{l i m} A_{i}$ is a flat A-algebra.

Let $K \subset G(F)$ be a closed subscheme $G(\theta)$-invariant on the left and right and such that $K / G(\theta)$ is of finite type. For any such $K$ we assume the following.
(A) For any $\alpha \in \mathscr{I}$ there is $\alpha^{\prime} \in \mathscr{I}$ such that act : $X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ factors through $X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$. For any $\beta^{\prime} \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathscr{J}$ there is $\beta \leq \alpha \in \mathscr{I}$ and a commutative diagram

$$
\begin{array}{cc}
X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K & \xrightarrow{\text { act }}
\end{array} X_{\infty}^{\alpha_{\infty}^{\prime}},
$$

(By Lemma 13, $p_{\beta \infty}^{\alpha}$ is faithfully flat and quasi-compact. So, there may be at most one morphism act $_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}$ making the latter diagram commutative. Though it is not reflected in the notation, the map act ${ }_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}$ depends also on $K, \alpha, \alpha^{\prime}$.) Besides, for any $\beta \leq \alpha$ there are $\beta^{\prime} \leq \alpha^{\prime}$ and a commutative diagram

$$
\begin{array}{rlll}
X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K & \xrightarrow{\text { act }} & X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}} \\
& \downarrow p_{\beta \infty \infty}^{\alpha} & & \downarrow p_{\beta^{\prime} \infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}} \\
X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K \xrightarrow{\operatorname{act}_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}} & X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}} .
\end{array}
$$

Remark 12. - Let $\bar{\beta} \leq \beta \leq \alpha \in \mathscr{f}$ and $\bar{\beta}^{\prime} \leq \beta^{\prime} \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathscr{I}$, assume that act $_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}$ and $\operatorname{act}_{\bar{\beta} \bar{\beta}^{\prime}}$ exist then the diagram commutes

be the map $(m, g) \mapsto\left(g^{-1} m, g\right)$. Let $(a, b) \in G(\theta) \times G(\theta)$ act on the source sending $(m, g)$ to $(a m, a g b)$. Let it act on the target sending $\left(m^{\prime}, g^{\prime}\right)$ to $\left(b^{-1} m^{\prime}, a g^{\prime} b\right)$. Then $a$ is equivariant for these actions, so yields a morphism of stack quotients

{ }_{q} \text { act }: G(\theta) \backslash\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right) \rightarrow\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} / G(\theta)\right) \times\left(G(\theta) \backslash \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right),

where the action of $G(\theta)$ on $X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ is the diagonal one.
Assuming (A), in the rest of this subsection we define the inverse image functor

{ }_{q} \operatorname{act}^{*}(\cdot, \cdot): \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(\operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right) \tag{72}
\end{equation*}
$$

satisfying the following properties.
A1) For $S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ and $\mathcal{T} \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(\operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ one has

$$
\mathbb{D}\left({ }_{q} \operatorname{act}^{*}(S, \mathscr{T})\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow}_{q} \operatorname{act}^{*}(\mathbb{D}(S), \mathbb{D}(\mathscr{T}))
$$

naturally.
A2) If both $S, \mathcal{G}$ are perverse then ${ }_{q} \operatorname{act}^{*}(S, \mathcal{T})$ is perverse.
Let $K \subset G(F)$ be a left and right $G(\theta)$-invariant closed subscheme. The map $X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K \xrightarrow{\operatorname{act}_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}} X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ is $G(\theta)$-equivariant, where $h \in G(\theta)$ acts on $(x, g) \in X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K$ as $(x, g h)$ and on $y \in X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ as $h^{-1} y$. Let $r$ be large enough so that $G(\theta)$ acts on $X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ via $G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right)$. Then act ${ }_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}$ induces a morphism of stack quotients

Assume in addition $r$ large enough so that $G(\theta)$ acts diagonally on $X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times(K / G(\theta))$ via its quotient $G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right)$. The latter map being equivariant under this action, we get a diagram of stack quotients

\| & \| \\
\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) & \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(K / G(\vartheta))
\end{array}
$$

sending $(S, \mathcal{G})$ to

$$
\left({ }_{r} \operatorname{act}_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}\right)^{*} S \otimes \operatorname{pr}_{2}^{*} \mathcal{G}\left[d\left(\beta^{\prime}, \beta\right)+\operatorname{dim} G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right)+\delta\right] ;
$$

here $\delta: \pi_{1}(G) \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ is some group homomorphism, we then view $\delta$ as a function of $K / G(\theta)$ sending $(K / G(\theta)) \cap \operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}$ to $\delta(\theta)$. Here $\operatorname{Gr}_{G}^{\theta}$ is the connected component of $\mathrm{Gr}_{G}$ corresponding to $\theta \in \pi_{1}(G)$. We will precise $\delta$ later.

Now for any data as in Remark 12 consider the commutative diagram (71), it yields a commutative diagram

& \uparrow \\
\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \times & \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta)) \xrightarrow{t_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}} \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right),
\end{aligned}

where vertical arrows are the transition functors. Let $t_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\prime}$ denote $t_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}$ followed by the inclusion into $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$. Passing to the limit by $\beta^{\prime}$, the functors $t_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\prime}$ yield a functor

t^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)
$$

Define a functor

$$
t_{K}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times K / G(\theta)\right)
$$

as follows. Let $S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\gamma}\right)$ for some $\gamma \in \mathscr{J}, \mathcal{J} \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta))$. There are $\bar{\alpha}, \bar{\alpha}^{\prime}$ sufficiently large in $I$ with the following properties:
$-\gamma \leq \bar{\alpha}^{\prime}$ in $\mathcal{J}$, and there is a map act : $X_{\infty}^{\bar{\alpha}} \times K \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\bar{\alpha}^{\prime}}$ as in (A);

- for any $\alpha \geq \bar{\alpha} \in I$ and $\alpha^{\prime} \geq \bar{\alpha}^{\prime} \in I$ such that act : $X_{\infty}^{\bar{\alpha}} \times K \rightarrow X_{\infty}^{\bar{\alpha}^{\prime}}$ the images of $(S, \mathcal{J})$ under $t^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}$ are canonically isomorphic in $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$.
This defines the desired functor $t_{K}$. The functors $t_{K}$ are compatible with the trasition functors, passing to the limit by $K$, one gets the desired functor (72). One checks that there is a unique $\delta$ as above such that A2) holds for this functor.
B.1.5. - Define an action of $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ on $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ as follows. Let $K \subset G(F)$ be a left and right $G(\theta)$-invariant closed subscheme. Assume that $r$ is large enough so that $G(\theta)$ acts on $X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)$ via $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$. For the projection

the functors $\mathrm{pr}_{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ are compatible with the transition functors, so yield a functor $\mathrm{pr}_{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty} \times K / G(\theta)\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$. Finally, we define the Hecke functor

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\cdot, \cdot): \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)
$$

by $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{J}, S)=\operatorname{pr}_{!}\left({ }_{q} \operatorname{act}^{*}(S, \mathcal{J})\right)$ for $\mathscr{J} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}, S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$.
By A2), they commute with the Verdier duality, namely

\mathbb{D}\left(\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, S)\right) \widetilde{\rightarrow} \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathbb{D} \mathcal{T}, \mathbb{D} S)
$$

They are compatible with the tensor structure on $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ (as in [5], Section 3.2.4). For $\mathcal{J} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ and $S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ set $\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\rightarrow}(\mathcal{T}, S)=\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(* \mathcal{T}, S)$. Here $*: \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \rightarrow \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$ is the covariant equivalence of categories induced by the map $G(F) \rightarrow G(F), g \mapsto g^{-1}$. The functors

$$
K \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\mathcal{T}, S) \quad \text { and } \quad K \mapsto \mathrm{H}_{G}(\mathbb{D}(\mathscr{T}), S)
$$

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are mutually (both left and right) adjoint.

## B.2. Ind-pro systems of scheme type

B.2.1. - Now assume given an ind-pro system $\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ indexed by $g$ as in Section B.1.1 satisfying the properties (1)-(4) with the only difference that the maps $i_{\beta}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}$ are now open immersions.

Then for each $\alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathcal{J}$ in the limit, one gets an open immersion $i_{\infty}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}: X_{\infty}^{\alpha} \hookrightarrow X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$, and each $X_{\infty}^{\alpha}$ is a scheme (not necessarily of finite type). Since $J$ is filtering, the inductive limit $X_{\infty}^{\infty}=\varliminf_{\alpha \in \mathcal{J}} X_{\infty}^{\alpha}$ exists, it is a scheme, which is a union of its open subschemes $X_{\infty}^{\alpha}$ for $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}$. We will say that $\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ is an ind-pro system of scheme type.

Assume in addition that each fibre of the map $p_{\beta \beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}$ is isomorphic to an affine space of dimension $d\left(\beta, \beta^{\prime}\right)$.

Under these assumptions, define the derived category $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ of étale $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$-sheaves on $X_{\infty}^{\infty}$ as follows. The categories $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ are defined as in Section B.1.1, they are inductive 2-limits of $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$. Further, $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ is defined as the projective 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\alpha \in J$.
B.2.2. - Assume that the group $G(\theta)$ acts on each $Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ via its finite-dimensional quotient $G\left(\theta / t^{r}\right)$ for some $r$. Then as in Section B.1.2 one defines the categories $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$, and $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ is the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$. Further, $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ is defined as the projective 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}$.

The category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \times \operatorname{Gr}_{G}\right)$ is defined as the inductive 2-limit of the following categories $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$, where $K / G(\theta) \subset \operatorname{Gr}_{G}$ is a closed $G(\theta)$-invariant subscheme of finite type (as $K$ becomes bigger and bigger). The category $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ is defined as in Section B.1.2, this is an inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ for $\beta \in g^{0}$. Further, $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \times K / G(\theta)\right)$ is the projective 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times K / G(\vartheta)\right)$ for $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}$.

Let $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ be the inductive 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\beta \in \mathcal{J}^{0}$. Further, $\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ is defined as the projective 2-limit of $\mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$ for $\alpha \in \mathcal{J}$. Thus, if $S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ then over each open subscheme $Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}$ it is placed in cohomological degrees less than or equal to some integer (depending on $\alpha$ ).
B.2.3. - Assume each $Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ equidimensional. Assume that the action of $G(\theta)$ is extended to an action of $G(F)$ on $Y_{\infty}^{\infty}$ in the sense of functors (on the category of $k$-schemes). Assume the condition (A). Under this condition, one defines a functor

as follows.
First, one defines the functors $t^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}$ exactly as in Section B.1.4. They preserve boundedness as well as the corresponding categories $\mathrm{D}^{-}$, so we view them as a functor

t^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha} \times(K / G(\theta))\right) .
$$

Further, if $\alpha \leq \bar{\alpha} \in \mathcal{I}, \alpha^{\prime} \leq \bar{\alpha}^{\prime} \in \mathcal{I}$ assume we have a diagram

Then $t^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}$ commutes with the functors $\left(i_{\infty}^{\alpha \bar{\alpha}}\right)^{*}$ for this diagram, so passing to the projective 2-limit, one gets a functor

t_{K}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{b}(K / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \times(K / G(\theta))\right) .
$$

Passing further to the inductive 2-limit by $K$, one gets the desired functor (73).
If $\alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime}$ then for the cartesian square

the functors $\mathrm{pr}_{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}} \times(K / G(\theta))\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right)$ commute with $\left(i_{\infty}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}\right)^{*}$; so passing to the projective limit, one gets a functor

\mathrm{pr}_{!}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \times(K / G(\theta)) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) .\right.

The Hecke functors

\mathrm{H}_{G}^{\leftarrow}(\cdot, \cdot): \operatorname{Sph}_{G} \times \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)
$$

for $\mathscr{G} \in \operatorname{Sph}_{G}$, which is an extension by zero from $K / G(\vartheta)$, is then defined as

$$

B.2.4 - Now assume we are given two ind-pro systems of scheme type $\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ and $\left(\mathcal{Y}_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ with $\alpha, \beta \in \beth$ satisfying all the assumptions of Section B.2.

Assume for each $(\alpha, \beta) \in I$ we are given a morphism $\pi_{\beta}^{\alpha}: Y_{\beta}^{\alpha} \rightarrow \mathcal{Y}_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ commuting with the actions of $G(\theta)$. Passing to the limit, we get a morphism $\pi_{\infty}^{\infty}: Y_{\infty}^{\infty} \rightarrow Y_{\infty}^{\infty}$.

Assume each $Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}$, $\mathcal{Y}_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ to be smooth of pure dimension, so we may consider the functors $\left(\pi_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)^{*}\left[\operatorname{dim} \cdot \operatorname{rel}\left(\pi_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)\right]: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{-}\left(\mathcal{Y}_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{-}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$. They are compatible with the transition functors, so yield a functor

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\pi_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)^{*}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}^{\prec}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right) . \tag{74}
\end{equation*}
$$

The proof of the following is left to the reader.

Proposition 11. - Assume that $\pi$ is $G(F)$-equivariant. Then (74) commutes with the action of $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$.

## B.3. A functor given by a kernel

B.3.1. - Assume given an ind-pro system $\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ satisfying all the assumptions of Section B.1. Let $\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ be an ind-pro system of scheme type satisfying all the assumptions of Section B.2. They are indexed by the same set $(\alpha, \beta) \in \mathcal{I}$.

Assume for each $(\alpha, \beta) \in \mathscr{I}$ we are given a complex $K_{\beta}^{\alpha} \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$. It gives rise to a functor

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathcal{F}_{\beta}^{\alpha}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}^{b}\left(Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \tag{75}
\end{equation*}
$$

sending $S$ to $\left(\operatorname{pr}_{2}\right)!\left(\operatorname{pr}_{1}^{*} S \otimes K_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right)$ for the diagram of projections

$$
G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right) \backslash X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \stackrel{\mathrm{pr}_{1}}{\longleftrightarrow} G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right) \backslash\left(X_{\beta}^{\alpha} \times Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}\right) \xrightarrow{\mathrm{pr}_{2}} G\left(\Theta / t^{r}\right) \backslash Y_{\beta}^{\alpha}
$$

for $r$ large enough (with respect to $\alpha, \beta$ ). The quotients here are stack quotients.
In the only example we have the following happens. For $\alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathscr{I}$ and $\beta^{\prime} \leq \beta \in \mathscr{I}$ the diagram is canonically 2 -commutative

& \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha}\right) \\
& \downarrow \\
& \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \xrightarrow{\mathcal{F}_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}} \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\beta^{\prime}}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

The two arrows which have no names in this diagram are the corresponding transition functors.

The above diagram shows that in the limit by $\beta$ the functors $\mathcal{F}_{\beta}^{\alpha}$ yield a functor

\mathcal{F}_{\infty}^{\alpha}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)
$$

Define a functor $\mathcal{F}^{\alpha}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$ as follows. Let $S \in \mathrm{D}_{G(\theta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right)$. For any $\alpha \leq \alpha^{\prime} \in \mathscr{I}$ we declare the restriction of $\mathcal{F}^{\alpha}(S)$ to $Y_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}$ to be the image of $S$ under the composition

$$
\mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha}\right) \xrightarrow{\left(i_{\infty}^{\alpha \alpha^{\prime}}\right)!} \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right) \xrightarrow{\mathscr{F}_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}} \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\alpha^{\prime}}\right)
$$

The corresponding projective system is naturally an object of $\mathrm{D}_{G(0)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)$.
Passing to the inductive limit by $\alpha \in \mathscr{I}$ the functors $\mathscr{F}^{\alpha}$ yield a functor

$$
\mathscr{F}: \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(X_{\alpha}^{\alpha}\right) \rightarrow \mathrm{D}_{G(\vartheta)}\left(Y_{\infty}^{\infty}\right)
$$

In the only example we have the functor $\mathscr{F}$ commutes with the action of $G(F)$.
An analog of Proposition 10 would be the claim that, possibly under some additional assumptions, the functor $\mathcal{F}$ commutes with the action of the Hecke functors $\mathrm{Sph}_{G}$ on both sides.

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
